



From our Rector: "Grant us, Lord, not to be anxious about earthly things..." (BCP, p. 234)

The leaves are falling, and winter is coming. We all know intellectually that change is the one constant reality of life. I wonder, though, how many of us have taken this to heart and, in fact, have allowed this reality to shape our understanding of life. It seems that many of us fall prey to the illusion of permanence, even when we know that everything is in constant change and motion. Consider what we think we know currently about reality:



- Our solar system moves at 560,000 mph in orbit around the center of our galaxy.
- The earth orbits our sun at 66,000 mph.
- The earth spins on the poles at 1,000 mph at the equator.
- Each rock on the earth's surface is being broken apart by the daily effects of weather.
- Nearly every cell in our bodies is in a constant process of death and replacement by new cells.
- Within nearly every atom are electrons in constant motion.
- Every atom is comprised of tiny subatomic strings which vibrate with movement.

We could go on and on with such a list, but the point (hopefully) is clear. Why then do we live our lives as if things will continue forever as they currently are? One day, the USA will no longer exist, every skyscraper in Manhattan will be gone, and California will be an island!

Does this line of thinking produce feelings of anxiety within you? I hope not. Deep interior peace comes when we learn that we cannot hold on to any material thing, even our own bodies. All of it is changing and passing away, and that's okay.

The other thing we now understand about reality is that everything is in relationship at the most fundamental level. This speaks volumes about our spiritual lives. Energy is continually being exchanged between living beings. This is true physically and spiritually. And what matters for us – what we can control – is the intentional way in which we choose to be in relationship with God and with others. Our faith tells us that these relationships will endure in an arena that we call "life eternal." This is a dimension of reality in which everything that we do matters. Choose to invest your energy and your passion in this arena, my friends, and you will never, ever be disappointed. "Grant us, Lord, not to be anxious about earthly things, but to love things heavenly; and even now, while we are placed among things that are passing away, to hold fast to those that shall endure." This is wise counsel for a life of eternal significance.

Vestry Highlights for October

The major focus of our October vestry meeting was the presentation of the draft budget for 2015. We are blessed with a talented Budget & Finance Committee (BFC) that has spent many hours meeting with staff and committee/guild chairs and then reviewing each of the lines in the budget in detail.

As you may remember, the budget for 2014 included a deficit of approximately \$42,000. We have recently communicated that revenue from pledges year to date, is running significantly behind what we budgeted for the current year and asked that parishioners "catch up" their giving as soon as possible. The vestry directed the BFC to draft a budget for 2015 that had a deficit of no more than \$20,000. Our belief and intent was that we could narrow the deficit to zero in one to two years with extra effort in our annual campaign.

The BFC presented and explained how they came pretty close to a target of a \$20,000 deficit for 2015, but it was achieved through some painful cuts and not investing in priorities we value. The vestry had a lengthy discussion regarding both our revenues and expenses as outlined in the draft budget and decided that we need to hold an extra vestry meeting in two weeks to discuss the budget in further detail, especially how we can increase revenue so that we can continue to execute the many programs that make S. Mary's the caring community it is.

The vestry is grateful for the effort the BFC put into the draft budget and anticipates addi-




tional work with the committee as we hammer out a plan for 2015. We are also grateful that Janet Bowne, chair of the annual campaign, was able to attend the meeting to give us her input and update us on the annual campaign plans for this fall.

Earlier this year, Garry Bowne completed an audit of the parish's finances as required by Diocesan Canons for the years 2011, 2012 and 2013. Garry offered to conduct the audit for 2014 and an appreciative vestry appointed Garry as auditor.

The Budget & Finance Committee has begun the implementation of some of the recommendations that Garry offered in his earlier audit and that effort continues.



Our Godly Play Lessons in November

The Flood and the Ark: We learned "The Ten Best Ways" in October. God's people loved them so much they wanted to have them always with them. They built an ark, on poles, so the people could always carry it with them wherever they went.

Baptism: This lesson introduces/recounts the rite of baptism, the gateway into the family of families we call the Church.

Work Day: In Godly Play, child's play is their work, in which children are encouraged to do the "work" of discovering answers. Once a month, we offer a Godly Play session with an extended work time. On these days, we begin with our circle and instead of hearing a story, we go directly into work time. This gives the children time to finish ongoing projects, explore materials more deeply, and have an opportunity to work with more stories.

Jonah: Jonah did everything wrong, yet everything comes out right except, perhaps, his own relationship with God. The story leaves us with many questions, and we are left to finish the story for ourselves. What happened to Jonah next?

November 30: Advent Lessons and Carols: The children will join their parents in church this morning to celebrate the First Sunday of Advent with this special service of lessons and carols. *No Godly Play lesson that morning*.

Legacy Project - Post Construction Update

"Why the heck can't we use the lower level of the Parish House?"

Inquiring minds want and need to know!

As background, parishioners will remember that the primary impetus for the Legacy Project was to correct the air quality and construction issues affecting the lower level of the then existing Parish House – and, in so doing, provide safe, healthy and efficient spaces for parish programs. To that end, extensive measures were taken to divert ground water and improve drainage, a section of the parish house was demolished and the remaining portion of the parish house was fully renovated following equally extensive remediation, using advanced moisture prevention techniques.

Following construction, users of the Guiding RAY spaces noticed an odor that was identified as normal "off- gassing" of new building materials (all of which met very restrictive OSHA and EPA standards). Throughout that period, suggested protocols were followed, centering on increasing air flow through the spaces to mitigate the "off-gassing" odor. Over the winter and early spring/summer, this odor dissipated.

In a possibly related development, some tiles in the Guiding RAY "great room" began "bubbling." The sub-contractor replaced the offending tiles. Some tiles began bubbling again. Suspecting a moisture-related issue associated with the adhesive,



the sub-contractor ultimately proposed replacing the flooring with a material that would not require adhesive.

Late this summer, the "odor" returned. Unable to identify or determine its source, S. Mary's moved to ensure the odor did not present health issues and conducted an air quality test in the Guiding RAY spaces as a precaution. The testing revealed NO mold in this area but did indicate "elevated "volatile organic compounds" or "VOCs." We note that neither OSHA or EPA offer any guidelines regarding VOC levels. The air testing company indicates the levels as "elevated" as compared with levels found in widespread testing of other buildings. Taking no chances with the health of our parishioners—most particularly our youngest—we discontinued use of all the downstairs spaces and put the suggested floor replacement on hold until the root cause of the now three issues (tile bubbling, odor and VOCs) could be identified. Scott Simons Architects and Ledgewood immediately pledged to do the necessary work and to see these issues through to the end and have been working assiduously to test for the many possible sources of the problems.

During the last weeks, SSA and Ledgewood have determined: that the downstairs air exchanger is working appropriately and that it is free of contaminants; whatever is causing the tile bubbling in the Guiding RAY great room is also causing issues under the carpet tiles in the individual classrooms; that there appears to be ground moisture interacting with the adhesive of both tiles and carpet in the Guiding RAY spaces —moisture that is migrating from the ground to the adhesive despite a sealant that had been applied throughout during construction to prevent this. Further testing is underway to determine the extent of the suspected moisture issue. We are collecting air humidity data in both the Guiding RAY and the MIDDLER rooms. As of this writing, SSA suspects that the resulting emulsification of the adhesive that is causing bubbling may also be causing the elevated VOC readings (and the odor.)

As readers will appreciate, this is a complex set of issues that may—or may not—be related. S. Mary's, Ledgewood and SSA are committed to determining the cause(s) before implementing solutions. We are working diligently and as quickly as possible, acutely aware of the inconvenience to S. Mary's programs that our inability to use these spaces is causing.

This will take time. S. Marians have already given so very much—time, treasure, patience, sweat and tears to the Legacy project. We understand this to our core, and we will keep you apprised as we have reliable updates and progress to relate.


