From our Rector:

Stewardship 2015 Update

Our annual stewardship campaign is underway. The packets have all been mailed. Thank you to those who have already returned their pledge forms!! St. Mary's is so blessed to have so much support! Your financial support is critical to our ability to carry out our mission. If you've been following our stewardship story, you know that we have been through several years of transition where we have had to draw upon our reserve or savings accounts to meet our obligations. The Vestry in concert with the Budget and Finance Committee is committed to closing our deficit and getting us on a sustainable path. They have trimmed the budget. We are hoping that our current pledgers will consider an increase of 10% over last year's pledge if they are able. And those who don't yet pledge will consider doing so!

Why pledge?

By pledging to St. Mary's, the Vestry knows what to expect for revenue. Added to our other sources of income (Sparkles, Lobster Bake, etc), that revenue helps us meet our expenses, many of which are fixed expenses (salaries, insurance, utilities).

So check your mail, look for the packet. We hope you'll give prayerful consideration to a pledge. You can scan and email your form to Beth (admin@smary.org), mail it to the Parish Office (43 Foreside Rd, Falmouth), or drop it in an envelope into the collection plate.

How should I pay my pledge?

You can pay weekly, monthly, quarterly or annually. You can elect to use a check in envelopes we provide. Many in the parish opt to transfer from their bank automatically as they do with other payments. And you can use the online link thru our website to pay on your pledge.

Some people like to pay their pledge with matured securities/stock. The pledge form has the information on how to transfer a security. Please let Beth, our Parish Center Manager, know when the transfer happens so you can be credited. The gifts come to us without any identification which often causes confusion.

Thank you for being with us on this journey of faith. Thank you for sharing your many resources with St. Mary's.

Saint Marians Moving the Mission by Becky Pride

The first in a series on "What Saint Mary's means to me"

Saint Mary's is a place where I bask in God's love, often palpable through you. Saint Mary's is not simply a building; it is a living, breathing dynamic presence in our world. I came across a powerful poem by Teresa of Avila a few days ago that I think speaks to all of us here at Saint Mary's:

"Christ has no body now but yours: No hands, no feet on earth but yours.

Yours are the eyes with which he looks compassion on this world.

Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good,

Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world."

This week Saint Mary's was at **St. Elizabeth's Essentials Pantry**, where Portland's needy persons go to receive clothes, essentials such as soap and toilet paper, and household items that you and I help to provide. A middle-aged woman almost cried with joy as she put on a new parka to keep out the cold. With tears in her eyes and her hands on her cheeks, she said: I can't believe I could find such a beautiful warm jacket here, and it's new ~ I didn't know I could be so lucky. Judith, Betsy, Margaret and I feel lucky to serve such need and to witness such gratitude.

Last month Saint Mary's visited the young men ~ in some cases, mere boys ~ who are incarcerated at **Long**Creek Youth Development Center,. The boys patiently reminded me how to play gin after we ate hot dogs and hamburgers that Jim Stoddard prepared for us. Every time Jim cooks, his eyes suffer, and he comes back indoors with the most bloodshot pair I have ever seen. Yet back again he goes to cook for those kids. Marian, Jim, Betsy and Rayle and I have formed a merry band, and we look forward to our time with our Long Creek friends.

Agonizing over a spiritual or financial dilemma with my fellow Vestry members...

Seeing Dan's enthusiasm for attending college in America and his gratitude for all of God's gifts are reminders of all that we have and all that we are called to be as God's children...

Discovering ways to do mission work with Harold and our Outreach Committee...

Witnessing Nathan's faith, Christine's service especially with her prison ministry, and Hugh's constant presence

Experiencing Beth Shaw's wisdom and compassion as she lovingly listens to my struggling with an often mundane issue...

Watching young Joseph Herlihy heft heavy soup tureens as he regularly serves his adoring clients at our own **Souper Supper**...


Finding myself transported by Bruce's musical genius and our choir....

For me all these scenarios ~ and so many more ~ are part of the living and breathing Saint Mary's that you and I are building ~ by the Grace of God and through the Goodness of God.

Dear Ones,

Vestry Highlights from the November meeting

Again this month the key work of the vestry was to continue work on the budget for 2015. We met twice this month reviewing the expenses and revenue in detail trying to balance them. After several hours going line-by-line the draft budget currently has a deficit of about \$14,000. At our second meeting, we reviewed possible revenue sources but some are long-term in nature and will not impact 2015.

The consensus of the vestry is that it would be difficult to reduce expenses further without impacting our programs and that the key to balancing the budget is to increase revenue. While we will continue to look for alternate revenue sources, the annual pledge campaign, currently underway is critical to the financial health of the parish if we want to continue to provide for the excellent staff and many programs that we offer. Please complete your pledge for 2014 and consider increasing your pledge for 2015. The vestry will finalize the budget at its December meeting.



The vestry has also been developing for about a year, a vision statement to guide our focus and efforts in the coming few years. After several surveys and a small group input from parishioners and much discussion at vestry meetings, we have a vision statement and specific goals ready to share with the parish. It appears elsewhere in this edition of the AVE and will be a key topic for the annual Parish Meeting in January.

Legacy Project-Post Construction Update

Consultations and testing continued during the last month in an on-going effort to determine the sources of tile bubbling, odor and air quality issues downstairs in the Parish House.

The consultation on October 15th between Ledgewood Construction, Scott Simons Architects (SSA), Paul White Tile Company, and the JJ Flooring representative pointed towards ground moisture interacting with the adhesive of both tiles and carpet in the Guiding RAY spaces. The moisture appeared to be migrating from the ground to the adhesive despite the Koster sealant that had been applied throughout during the construction to prevent this. Subsequent calcium chloride testing suggested by Paul White and JJ Flooring to determine the extent of this migration was inconclusive as it was subsequently determined by Paul White that such testing is not appropriate in cases where such a sealant has been applied.

SSA and Paul White Tile called in the services of a concrete floor expert, Peter Craig, who took three core samples in a Guiding RAY classroom on November 10. While Mr. Craig indicated he has several theories about what may be causing the breakdown among the layers under the tile/carpet, he made it clear that only the laboratory testing of these core samples would provide the necessary information for him to theorize with any confidence.

Paul White Tile has since been seeking quotes from the testing agencies and will choose one soon. Normally, the turn-around time for receiving results from the laboratory is 4 weeks.

S. Mary's has stressed to SSA that we expect this, as well as all efforts associated with this issue, to be undertaken and completed on a priority basis. We continue to stress to all parties that we seek a determination not only about what is causing tile bubbling and migration of substances to the surface under the tiles, but also what is causing the odor and the air quality issues.





Outreach Musings:

Election and voting results--moving forward!!

How many of you voted **twice** this past month? The answer is about **100!** Now, before anyone starts an investigation looking into voter fraud, we are not talking about voting twice in the elections for various town, city, state and national elected positions and various initiatives and referendums. What we are talking about is voting once in that election and once in the Outreach Committee voting also held a several weeks ago. We know that 100 voted on the Outreach question and believe those same people voted in the election. Two votes....entirely legal.

Now we all know the results of the elections just past. Candidates won, candidates lost, and the various bonds, initiatives and referendums were supported or not. We have the results of that election, know the feelings of the voters on various candidates and issues, and we are now moving forward.

As with the just concluded elections, the Outreach voting was held to find out the feelings of parishioners about what areas the Outreach Committee and parish should focus on for hands-on opportunities to serve those in need in our community and beyond. Thanks to everyone who voted and here are the official results:

> **Hunger-26 votes Environment-16** Poverty-13 Literacy-12 **Elderly-10 Hospice-8 Animal Welfare-8 Housing-7**



In addition to these "official results," we heard from some members of the congregation that our focus going forward should be more concentrated on local hands-on opportunities in our immediate communities and state rather than national or international opportunities.

What is important about any voting or election, is that you look at the results and move forward in a way that reflects and respects the results of that voting and election. The last Outreach Committee meeting we had in early November was focused on deciding what organizations and groups would be receiving support from the Outreach Committee, and by extension, St. Mary's this year. Remember the \$14,000 check? As we discussed which organizations to support this year, the committee had the results of the voting in front of us and in mind. The result of our conversations, discussions, and decisions was that approximately 72% of the our Outreach and parish support will be going to local and state organizations. This is a considerable shift in the distribution of these funds from years past and mirrors the desire of the parish for a more local focus on our efforts to serve those in need. The organizations receiving funding and support will be posted in the Parish house and will also be included in the parish annual report early next year.

As this year winds down, we are thankful for all who have voted, and by their vote, have helped set the focus and course for organizational support this year and for hands-on efforts in 2015. Next year promises to be an eventful and exciting year for the Parish as we celebrate 125 years. We look forward to your support, ideas, thoughts and involvement as we continue to serve those in need.

SPARKLES CONCERT: SING WE NOEL

On December 14 at 4pm, the St. Mary Schola offers its annual SPARKLES Concert to benefit S. Mary's Church. This year, the Schola presents Sing We Noel, a joyous celebration of the season. This program includes medieval processions, a mystical chant by Hildegard von Bingen, magnificent motets by Praetorius and Schütz, as well as haunting masterworks by Poulenc. 
