From the Rector: Theotokos: Mary the God-bearer

May is Mary's month. Since the 13th century, May has been a month specially dedicated to the honor of Mary as the Mother of our Lord. This practice was spread widely by Jesuit missionaries and is now marked by acts of popular devotion throughout the Roman Catholic world. I do not know of any special devotions that have taken place in our parish over the years, but May gives us an opportunity to remember the one in whose name we gather as a parish family.

This May, we will continue with our 125th Anniversary Celebration. As you read through 125 Years: From Grief to Grace (the new history book written and compiled by our own Marge Devine), and as you see various historic artifacts from the last 125 years, you will notice different mentions of "Saint Mary the Virgin" and "Saint Mary the Blessed Virgin." In times past, the designation of "the Virgin" was used to differentiate Mary the

Mother of our Lord from other biblical Marys, such as Mary Magdalene and Mary of Bethany. The addition of "blessed" before Virgin was meant to recognize the prophetic promise in her Magnificat that "from now on all generations will call me blessed" (Luke 1:48).

If you are an astute reader, you will notice that parish publications in recent years have moved away from use of "the Virgin" or "the Blessed Virgin." This has been an intentional choice due primarily to my discernment. Language matters. What we choose to say, and not say, matters.

It is true that Mary's choice to pursue celibacy is one that deserves respect, if indeed she did make that choice. However, Mary is honored among us and among all Christians, not because of how she may have abstained from certain actions, but because she gave birth to the divine Son of God. Her decision to consent to Gabriel's message and to cooperate with the desire of God began the great shifting of human history brought about by the Incarnation. Her openness to God has earned her the official name of Theotokos, Greek for God-bearer. (See the decree of the Council of Chalcedon in 451 AD found in the Prayer Book on page 864.)




From the Deacon's Corner:

Vestry Highlights from the April Vestry Meeting

Your vestry convened at its regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday, April 15th. Vestry member Mark Winter was able to join us remotely from Guantanamo Bay, Cuba via a technology called FaceTime that allows two computers, one on each end, both with

built-in cameras and microphones, to connect via the internet with both audio and video! So Mark was right there on our computer screen with his military haircut wearing casual fatigues and his friendly smile.

Good fellowship and a cooperative spirit were present as the vestry assembled.

After opening prayer, our Legacy Project Committee presented their very thoughtful and considered consensus recommendation that work continue as planned on the lower level of the main building. The most significant challenge has been deciding among several options to ensure the flooring materials and construction will provide a safe environment. After a lengthy discussion the vestry accepted the recommendation of the Committee and the work is expected to be completed in the near future. The vestry thanked all members of the Committee for their diligent and ongoing work.

Other discussion highlights included:

125th Anniversary Celebration ... our many planned activities surrounding the weekend of April 25th and 26th.

- Stewardship ... moving along nicely as we finish out 2015 and start planning for an even more comprehensive effort for 2016.
- Finances ... needed to improve and are continuing to improve ... thank

Repairs to the lower level of the main building ... are moving forward.

Father Nathan led us in our continuing discussion of the rich history of the Episcopal Church which will likely be a year-long exploration of "Renewing The Episcopal Identity". Themes include: "change", "relevance", "growth" and "Living as Disciples". More on this exploration in future AVE's.



Young Life is making a difference in the lives of millions around the world because we are supported by adults who care about kids in their community. For every talented Young Life staff person (ours is Jordan Droge), there are hundreds of supporters in each community — comprised of parents, pastors and other concerned adults — who provide a foundation of financial, administrative and moral support for the local Young Life outreach ministry.

Casco Bay Young Life meets every Monday night at 7:31pm at 2 Town Landing Rd. (the Herdrich family house), All high schoolers are invited to come and bring a friend!

Why do we support Young Life?

You can buy a red bandana for less than two dollars at Target, but for a kid like DeMarco, a red bandana could cost him his life. DeMarco was an active member of the Bloods, a street gang that identified membership with - among other signs and symbols - red bandanas. The Bloods did not take kindly to defectors, but after only four days at Young Life camp, DeMarco was ready to make a trade.

"I don't' want this anymore," DeMarco said, with tears in his eyes, as he placed the crumpled red cloth in the hands of the camp speaker, Sam.

DeMarco had listened to Sam detail the death of Jesus on the cross for the past half hour. Hundreds of campers had dispersed into the darkness to sit in silence for 20 minutes beneath the stars and consider what they had heard. But it took DeMarco less than 20 seconds to understand the offer on the table.

He could give Jesus his red bandana, and Jesus would give him life. And it wouldn't be life behind bars, like some of his friends were facing. It would be life lived freely, full of forgiveness, hope and love - the abundant life promised us in John 10:10. After hearing Sam's message, it was clear: Enough blood had been shed enough blood on the streets and enough blood on the cross. DeMarco was ready to trade bad blood for good blood and follow Jesus.

One month later, Sam showed up at a different Young Life camp with kids from his own area. As he stepped off the bus, Sam couldn't believe his eyes. There was DeMarco, unloading luggage from the bottom of the bus with a smile. Clearly, he had joined a new "gang." DeMarco was now a work crew kid, serving for a month with no pay, living his new life of freedom with great joy.

Today, DeMarco is a husband, a father and a sergeant serving in the army.

According to the FBI, there are 1.4 million gang members in this country. Last year, we reached about 1.7 million kids through Young Life around the world. Clearly, we're competing fiercely for kids' lives. And while most kids who come to camp are not affiliated with gangs, impoverished kids are the most likely to be recruited. Let's increase **Voung** our winning edge. Let's get disadvantaged kids to camp. Let's recruit them to God's family instead. Jesus is ready to make a trade.



HAPPY PROM SEASON!

Saint Mary's hopes that everyone has a safe and fun prom or graduation. This is a special time to celebrate! Casco Bay CAN (Create Awareness Now) has provided a few tips for parents to make sure that our teens and young adults are celebrating safely:

- Talk to your teen about expectations for the time before, during and after prom.
- Talk to the parents of your teens' friends to confirm plans for the evening and make sure to exchange cell phone numbers.
- Have your teen check in at different times.
- Make sure that you know the address of where your teen will be going.
- Remind your teen that cameras are everywhere and they should be cautious about their actions, as anything could end up on a social media site.
- Let your teen know that colleges have been known to take away what they have offered. Illegal behavior could lead to a loss in scholarship funds or acceptance to a college.
- Consider hosting an after-prom party that is substance-free and ask other responsible adults to help in hosting the party.
- Stay up and check in with your teen when they get home.
- \Rightarrow If you are hiring a limo driver:
- ⇒ Review expectations and ask the driver to refrain from making stops.
- ⇒ Inspect the limo yourself before they leave for the prom.
- ⇒ Provide the driver with cell phone numbers for each teen's parents.
- ⇒ Ask the driver for his/her cell phone number and/or business card.


Outreach Ministry - Serving Near and Far

Buildings & Grounds Update

Spring has finally come to Maine; rejoice and be glad in it. The 125th Celebration is promising to be a wonderful event. The Buildings and Grounds Committee did its part by sprucing up the campus prior to the celebration. Special thanks go to Chuck Horton. Lucy Ellis, Jan Mordarski and Greg Unfricht. We were small in number but mighty in effort.

B&G's major project is to investigate natural gas conversion. As you no doubt know, Summit Gas is installing a natural gas pipeline which includes Falmouth. The pipeline is expected to arrive in the neighborhood in late August or early September. We are preparing a report to be presented to the Vestry this month which will outline costs and procedures involved in converting from oil heat to natural gas. The report will show various price points for heating oil versus natural gas price and detail the payback period from lower heating costs. From this report and other valuable information, the Vestry can make the decision to go forward with the conversion or stay with heating oil. We will report the next steps in June.

Another project that B&G is considering is the removal of the three Norway maple trees in front of the church. They have reached their life expectancy. They have also been struck by lightning and create a danger; we recommend removal. We will make a recommendation to the Vestry. If approved we will notify the congregation and seek comment. If it is approved, B&G will cut down the trees, remove the stumps, fertilize and seed the area. The wood will be auctioned off as firewood at the upcoming Lobster Bake/Auction. More info will be forthcoming.

Lastly, we might call for a more thorough Spring Cleanup, but so far the campus is good. Stay tuned. Let's hope for a warm and sunny rest of spring.

Dan-Herley attends Saint Mary's quite often since traveling to Maine in August 2014. He is realizing his dream and is studying at Southern Maine Community College in South Portland. He plans to become a dentist and return to serve the people of Haiti. He loves philosophy class and writing, so here is his latest work.



Colorless

Let me reveal a secret that will change how we perceive the world forever and ever. It's really hard not to be a writer when one is a thinker by nature. I spend 90% of my time reading and thinking, which is how I came up with this brilliant theory. It is harder and harder for me to sleep at night because I cannot stop thinking. The spirit who lives in my body wants to reveal that secret to the rest of the world. I do not have any other choice but to obey. The secret is, we humans are colorless. I know that this declaration sounds crazy but let me explain.

Color is a huge issue in the world. Racial differences are based on color. Color categorizes societies. Color was such a big deal many years ago that leaders such as Adolf Hitler felt like it was important to separate the white race from the others. Hitler wanted to preserve the purity of the white race. I have to tell you that this was one of the biggest mistakes that one could ever make. The reason why is simple. Humans are colorless, so how can we be separated based on color?

Some of you may be asking what makes me think that humans are colorless in a world where some people have many privileges because of their skin color. The answer to that question is that my concept of "human" is different from what most people seem to believe. I believe that humans are more than just bodies. Humans are spiritual beings living in a material world; therefore those spirits need physical envelopes to be on earth. Humans are invisible.

My understanding of our spiritual reality means that you have never and you will never see me as I have never and I will never see you. Dan-Herley Mathieu is the spirit inside this Haitian body, which is 5.6 ft high, black skin, frizzy hair, and so on. I could have been in any other physical body, but I am inside this one for some reason. I did not choose to be in this body. If I had a choice, I would not have chosen to be in a body because I suffer physical pain in it. I am not what you see. I am more than just my physical appearance. My body has a color, height, weight, and all the biological traits, but I do not have any of those. I am the spirit who guides a body; so are you.

I am free and colorless; I am limitless, therefore do not judge me based on what I am not- a body. I am neither black nor white. I have no skin. I am just colorless.

If every one of us could picture humans as we really are, colorless, that would be the end of racism in the world. The concept of color is the main cause of all the discrimination in the world. One hates others just because their skin is not the same color. Now, it is the time to start seeing each other not only at the physical level, but as spirits. Let's consider each person in a different way than we are used to considering them. We are spiritual beings, invisible. We are colorless. If only we could see each other without those physical envelopes, we would realize that we are similar. There are no differences of color among us.


