

From the Rector:

"We acknowledge ONE BAPTISM for the forgiveness of sins."

In strictly spiritual terms, we understand the day of your Baptism to be the most important day in your life. Far more deep and profound than graduation or marriage or receiving tenure or making partner or any other socially-proscribed rite of passage, the Church claims Baptism as the ONE sacred moment in your life when the truth of your identity is most clear and unpolluted.

"You are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever." (BCP, p. 308).

Since at least the fourth century, the Church has been clear that each person needs to be baptized only once. Again, Baptism is not primarily about what you do or fail to do. There is never a need to be re-baptized because you have made mistakes since being baptized. The truth of Baptism is about God's claim, the Holy Spirit's seal, and the mark of Christ. And, forgive me for bursting your bubble of self-confidence, but you do not have the power to undo these things.

In strictly human terms, we have the need to communicate about our loves and desires, our commitments and values. We need to tell others about who we are. For those of us who were baptized as children, this presents a challenge. Without being baptized again, what other major action can we undertake to tell everyone that we love God, that we understand ourselves as members of the body of Christ? The Church has developed a number of ways to address this need to "renew" one's Baptism, to make a public statement of faith. Confirmation is the most prominent example of this, but it is not the only way.

On <u>June 14 at 5 PM</u>, everyone is invited to participate in a special event where you can renew your one Baptism and claim once again your true identity as a person "marked as Christ's own for ever." This will be our **BAPTISM IN THE BAY**. We will gather at <u>Falmouth Town Landing</u> to bless the waters of Casco Bay, a number of souls will be baptized for the very first time, and the rest of us will be invited into the waters to renew our Baptism and to be blessed!

Do you know anyone who has not yet been baptized? Tell me who that person is, and I'll personally invite him or her to join us on June 14. Do you want to stand in the waters with friends as the sun goes down over Casco Bay and say to the world,

"Yes! I am sealed with the Holy Spirit and I am marked as Christ's own for ever"? I know that I want to do this, and I hope that you will join us. Even if you only want to watch from the safety of the dry rocks and cheer the rest of us on, please come. It's going to be fantastic! And God will be praised.

From the Deacon's Corner:

Dear Friends in Christ,

I was in the sacristy on a recent Friday preparing for a graveside service that afternoon. It is very quiet at Saint Mary's on a Friday, and I seemed to be the only one around. It was a beautiful day, and I had left the door open to let in the sun and fresh air. Suddenly a man I did not know appeared in the doorway and shyly asked if he could go into the church. I said, of course, and he stepped into the church and stood next to the pulpit. I put the lights on for him, and then walked up behind him. Tears were streaming down his face, and he explained to me that he had been going through some hard times and was try-



ing to reconnect with the faith of his youth. He needed to feel that connection with God that he had known in his earlier life before things started to fall apart. He needed to feel the love of a forgiving and compassionate God. He needed to be heard, and I felt so blessed that I was there to listen. I said very little but before he left I told him that God can be powerfully present in sacred places like a church, but God is also powerfully present in other ways and that no matter where we are or what we are going through God is right there with us and never leaves us. We have only to reach out. He thanked me and left, and I thanked God for bringing him to Saint Mary's and allowing me to be there just at that moment.

We never know what other people are going through or who God may put in our pathway each day who may need a smile or words of encouragement and hope. We don't know what may be going on for a co-worker or a neighbor or the bag boy at the market. We carry Jesus in us and with us, and we do not dare keep Him to ourselves. We are meant to share Jesus' love and compassion with our fellow humans, even the ones who are hard to love! May your days be blessed and may you be a blessing to others. Faithfully,



Zenith Journey 2015: Trip to Katahdin August 19 – 22



We gathered on May 20, 2015 for our monthly meeting and began with an opening prayer.

David Robinson shared an update of the issues with the undercroft. The flooring has been completed. Testing of the rooms will be

done at the beginning of June. It takes 10-20 days to receive results.

Hugh Smith represented the Buildings and Grounds Committee with some information on possibly converting the campus to natural gas. He provided a conversion analysis. We are just beginning this discussion.

Garry Bowne presented the 2014 Audit. No irregularities were revealed by the audit. We continue to work on ensuring the financial reports are accurate and complete. The volume of work going through the Par-



ish Office is large and mistakes happen. The Budget and Finance Committee is looking for ways to improve accuracy and efficiency and overall financial controls. The audit was accepted and approved as presented.

We discussed the various 125th Anniversary events. Everyone agreed

the three events we've had were very successful. The historical presentation was well attended and drew in many non-parishioners. The Service Day was a great effort, all volunteers and recipients of service were very positive about the day. Everyone felt we should have Service Day a few times a year and the word will get out. There has been great feedback from the Presiding Bishop's visit and the Historical Evening. The Picnic on June 13th will be the last event, with games, music, and food.

Saint Mary's 125th Anniversary Celebration

We were blessed with good weather for the Presiding Bishop and Bishop Steve Lane's visit on April 26th. Bishop Katharine's gentle presence and wise words were blessings we all shared. For anyone who missed it,

her sermon can be found on our web site. If you don't have access to the inter-



net, please call Beth for a printed copy. Following the service, we enjoyed a sumptuous coffee hour and a Q and A with Bishop Katharine which lasted for about 90 minutes. Members of the audience asked many insightful questions including some asked by our children. Questions ranged from her favorite animal (squid or octopiharkening back to her days as a marine biologist) to complex questions about the Middle East. We are working to get the Q and A session edited to be available for all to enjoy.



On May 6th, about 100 people gathered to hear State of Maine Historian, Earle Shuttleworth's presentation on the Brown Family, our founders. Prior to the presentation, we hosted a reception enabling the attendees to view the many historical photo albums and display boards prepared for the event. We were blessed to have about 10 descendants of John Bundy Brown (John Marshall Brown's father) in attendance as well as many community visitors.

On May 17th, we held our first ever Day of Service. Approximately 70 parishioners gathered for a brief prayer at 9:30 and then went off to several sites around the area to serve the community. Participating parishioners donned blue St. Mary's t-shirts and headed out to volunteer their time to help others. The sites included cleaning up Route 1



(and counting plastic bags as research for the Town of Falmouth's study on the use of plastic bags), hymn singing and visiting at Falmouth by the Sea nursing home, yard work and landscaping for physically challenged





folks whoare unable to care for their lawns. Following the service time, everyone came back to the Parish House for an informal Eucharist and lunch.

So many parishioners helped make these events so successful.

Outreach Ministry - Serving Near and Far

This "Outreach Musings" is going to begin differently than prior ones. Right from the beginning, first thing, I am asking you to take a moment or more to do something. Here goes. First. Read the paragraph under the picture and then focus on the picture with the simple phrase "Drop a Pebble." Step Two: Close your eyes and picture yourself near your favorite body of water, reaching into your pocket to pull out a pebble and dropping it in that water. You watch the pebble fall, break the surface and see the ripples fan out from that entry point. Outside of a small "plop" when the pebble entered the water, there is no sound as the ripples grow to cover more and more of the water's surface. Soon you will not be able to see any more ripples fanning out. Although you may think that is the end of ripples and the end of the influence the pebble had on that surface of water, could it be that there are still more ripples fanning out that you are just not able to see? In fact, could it be the ripples continue on until they silently and gently reach the distant shore? The pulse in the water started by the dropped pebble continues on and on and on andImagine.



Each day we are given one or more pebbles. Every time we help someone or reach out to someone in need, one of those pebbles is dropped into water sending out ripples of hope, compassion, caring and love. Who knows how many people are touched by those ripples...but touched they are! Have you dropped a pebble today?

Imagine and feel the power of a dropped pebble. Is that real? You bet! There is and can be no doubt.

On Sunday, May 17th, more than 70 members of our parish went out into our community for our first Day of Service. Beginning after a short program of hymns and prayers in the parish hall, groups went to five different locations to offer services to portions of our community who had needs of varying kinds. Some traveled to the Falmouth Food Pantry and helped it settle into its newly renovated surroundings to better serve the evergrowing number of clients. Another group went to help clean up trash from Route One as this area is in the midst of considerable changes aimed at making this entry way into Falmouth more attractive to residents and visitors alike. Other parishioners traveled to a local nursing home where they shared hymns, conversation and smiles with the residents there. Still another group traveled to a local resident's home to garden, bringing beauty to that plot of land and preparing it for even more beauty as the spring and summer progress. Finally, two other groups went to the homes of other residents to help rake leaves, pull weeds, wash windows and help with other household chores.

As each group completed its work and service, members all returned to St. Mary's for the remainder of our service, including the Eucharist. Lunch followed, and we shared stories of the morning of service at our tables. These were indeed great conversations.

While it is doubtful that any of our members had a pebble in their pocket as they ventured out to his or her own area of service on this day, there can be no doubt that pebbles were symbolically dropped through the work that was done. There were indeed ripples of caring, compassion, love and just plain willingness to help fanning out to the owners of the homes visited, to take care of gardens and yards, to wash windows, to sing and converse with residents of the nursing home, to stock the food pantry, and to serve countless residents and visitors to Falmouth who will have a more attractive entry to, and memory of, our community. Yes, pebbles were indeed dropped, and the ripples are still moving out from each of those service locations.
