The Feast of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ is fast approaching. It brings to mind many thoughts and feelings, and it particularly makes me think of the joy of children who take such delight in the magical atmosphere of Christmas. But it is also sad to consider how many children in Maine will not experience the joy

of Christmas because their homes are not havens of blessings and peace. Far too many homes do not offer positive, godly conversations that support the education and healthy formation of children.

What can we, as followers of Christ, do about this sad situation? We can help one child at a time. Erin and I have gone through all of the required steps to become a "Resource Family" in the system of the state's Office of Child and Family Services. Our official license is likely to be issued any day and that will permit us to provide tem-

porary foster care for a child who needs a good and safe place to be.

Do you know that there is a desperate need for foster parents in Maine right now? State budget cuts have reduced the resources available to help children in the system, while the drug crisis has simultaneously increased the number of children who need a safe place to live.

These are innocent children who never made the choice to be born into difficult circumstances. These are thousands of Maine children who just need a safe place to be and someone to care for them. These are the poorest of the poor because they have no way at all to provide for themselves. And we all know far too well that many of the world's problems are created by young people who carry deep scars from broken childhoods and who now search desperately for meaning and purpose in life.

As you prepare once again to welcome the coming of the Christ Child into the world, will you consider welcoming a foster child into your home? If you have an extra bedroom, will you consider being inconvenienced by the needs of a child with nowhere else to go? Will you sacrifice your comfort and routine for the future of a child at risk?

Erin and I are hoping that all of you will help us to care for the children who are placed with us in the rectory. And we hope that a number of you will be touched by this need and respond to the call. Together, we can change the trajectory of the lives of many children at risk. Together, we can show them that God loves them and has a beautiful plan for their lives. Perhaps there is no more important thing that we could ever do.

Celebrate Honor and Serve - Stewardship 2016

At press time for the AVE, we have just passed the \$100,000 level toward our goal of \$265,000 for our 2016 pledge goal. Thank you to the over 65 households who have sent in their pledge forms. We hope to hear from many more Saint Marians!! We are hoping to have all the pledge intentions turned into the parish office by the end of December

There are several companies who offer "canned" pledge campaign materials. The conventional wisdom shared in the promotional materials for these packages advise to stay away from discussing fixed or administrative costs because donors are bored by such topics. We can all agree it's much more engaging and interesting to talk about mission, programs, and lives changed, souls enriched. There's no question that here at Saint Mary's we are serving Christ in each other and in the broader community in many ways. However, the reality is that if we can't cover our administrative costs and overhead expenses, we don't have a platform on which to build our programs. The truth is that mission and ministry are inexorably tied to insurance and utilities.

How could we serve our Souper Supper guests if the stove isn't working or the parking lot isn't plowed? How would any of our programs run if the buildings aren't heated? And what about our staff? Could we do what we do without them? In addition to salaries, it's only right to offer them health care and pension options. Our founders

left us these buildings in trust for the generations to come. It is important to pass them on in good repair. It's all connected to who we are and what we do. So just as we sign up to work on committees and support our outreach efforts, near and far, we need to support our mission with our financial support. The amount is up to you and what fits into your budget. Pledges can be a few dollars per week or over a hundred dollars per week. You can choose to give weekly, transferring electronically from your bank, or by asking for pledge envelopes for checks or cash. Some choose to give monthly, quarterly or annually.

Please take some time to consider what your pledge will be in 2016. If you've just joined us, you may not be ready to make a pledge. You can elect to pledge at any time during the year. Perhaps you'd like to know more about our governance and finance. We would be pleased to share that information with you. Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

Your Vestry held its November meeting on Wednesday the 18th. Good fellowship and a cooperative spirit were present as they have been all year. Attendance was OK, and the meeting moved along nicely


Vestry discussion highlights included:

* Long Term Planning ... A "Mutual Study of Ministry" (which is the name/format/process for our long term planning) was discussed and will likely be formalized at our 2/6/16 Vestry Retreat that will include our new Vestry members. It has been several years since our last Study so please convey your thoughts/suggestions to any Vestry member. This planning process is designed to be inclusive, thoughtful and deliberate.

* Finances ...

Current financial situation ... on a positive note ... The Legacy Capital Campaign continues to be very successful. The pledge payments coming in are now going directly into the endowment, and our total assets continue to increase for the fourth year in a row, both positive signs. On a not so positive note ... our operational budget for 2015 currently projects a deficit of ~\$26,000. We started off 2015 having not met the pledge goal but we've had a great deal of success with other revenue lines. However some expenses have come in higher than expected. We urge everyone to complete their 2015 pledges and to invite your friends and neighbors to support all of the Sparkles events, especially the December 5th fair. 2016 Operating Budget: It is extremely important to meet our \$265,000 pledge goal. We encourage all parishioners to turn in their completed pledge forms as soon as possible but by the end of 2015. We are also hoping for a 10% increase in individual pledges but want all of our parishioners to know that every pledge is valued, appreciated and spent carefully. Our budget for 2016 is in its second DRAFT and various items were discussed by the Vestry. We will conduct a further review at our December Vestry meeting and we will bring forward our proposal at our Annual Meeting on 1/31/16.

Stewardship campaign for 2016 is underway ... all parishioners have been sent a letter in US-Mail asking for pledge commitments for 2016.

Buildings & Grounds Update

A BIG THANK YOU to all who pitched in on Saturday, November 21, for the Fall cleanup. Mother Nature cooperated and all went smoothly, and a good time was had by all. The leaves were vacuumed up on Monday, and the campus looks better than ever and is a tribute to all who helped. The vacuuming was done by Bill's Property Maintenance who is also doing the snow plowing this winter. Also on November 21, B&G put up garlands, trees and lights in preparation for Advent. Thanks to all who helped.

We received the first heating oil delivery from Fielding Oil at \$1.699. Quite an improvement from last year

(\$3.17), which bodes well for great savings on our fuel bill. Keep our fingers crossed.

Johnson & Jordan serviced all three heating systems and corrected a problem with the Parish House furnace. There was air in the line which inhibited hot water and heat from getting to the wool room and bathrooms outside the auditorium. All the rest of the heating systems are in good working order.

The B & G committee has drawn up a draft comprehensive 'to do' list that gives timetable goals to complete minor and major projects which needs to be finalized with the B&G Committee. As time permits, the pro-

jects will be tackled.





Advent at Saint Mary's

8AM Experiment in Advent

The Episcopal Church has begun the process of preparing for a new Book of Common Prayer. We don't know exactly when this will happen (in 9 or 12 years perhaps), but it seems clear that, when this process is complete, the traditional liturgy found in Rite One



will no longer be authorized. In order to prepare ourselves in a thoughtful way for this eventual change, we will begin a series of small experiments at our 8 AM liturgy. Our goal in these experiments will be to distinguish what is non-essential.

Our first experiment will take place in Advent as we begin a new liturgical year together. For the 4 Sundays of Advent (beginning on November 29), we will use the Rite Two form of the Eucharist as it begins on page 351 in the BCP. Feedback from our 8 AM community will be crucial as we discern our way forward together.

The inclusion of Rite One in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer was intended to provide a transition for those who felt strongly attached to the Elizabethan language and structure of the 1928 Prayer Book. We are now approaching 40 years in this transition. One of the foundational principles of the 16th century Reformation, which the Church of England adopted, is that true worship must always take place in the language of the people. This is clearly stated in Article 24 of the 39 Articles, first published under the authority of Queen Elizabeth I in 1563 and found in our Prayer Book on page 872. It states:

"It is a thing plainly repugnant to the Word of God, and the custom of the Primitive Church, to have public Prayer in the Church, or to minister the Sacraments, in a tongue not understanded of the people." The English language, like every piece of the universe, continues to change. There is no form of human language which is holier and more acceptable to God than any other. What God desires is heartfelt love and devotion. Let's spend some time thinking about what enables us to offer that kind of devotion and what things are just comfortable and familiar. Music Ministry at Saint Mary's

Sacred Repetition

We repeat words and music many times in a service, and sometimes it may be that we become somewhat disengaged by repetition. If this happens, it is useful to think about the mysterious connection that binds us to the past. This became abundantly clear to me while watching a BBC broadcast of the music of Monteverdi. I have been fortunate to sing Monteverdi's towering masterpiece *The Vespers of 1610* in Boston and France, and it was always very moving to join other singers and instrumentalists in bringing this glorious music to life. In the BBC broadcast, the solo singers were fortunate to handle and sing from the actual parts from 1610. Imagine the thrill of holding the same music score that the original singers in 1610 held - to reproduce the same notes and melodies from these precious documents!

There is a wonderful poem by James Elroy Flecker called "To A Poet A Thousand Years Hence" that expresses this link between the ages:

I who am dead a thousand years, And wrote this sweet archaic song, Send you my words for messengers The way I shall not pass along.

I care not if you bridge the seas. Or ride secure the cruel sky. Or build consummate palaces Of metal or of masonry.

But have you wine and music still, And statues and a bright-eyed love, And foolish thoughts of good and ill, And prayers to them who sit above?

How shall we conquer? Like a wind That falls at eve our fancies blow, And old Mæonides* the blind Said it three thousand years ago.

O friend unseen, unborn, unknown, Student of our sweet English tongue, Read out my words at night, alone: I was a poet, I was young.

Since I can never see your face. And never shake you by the hand. I send my soul through time and space To greet you. You will understand. (*Maeonides is a name for Homer)

I have been fortunate to visit libraries in which I was able to hold in my own hands ancient documents. At the Vatican library and the library of the Santa Cecilia Conservatory in Rome, I gazed upon a Sistine Chapel singer's "Salmi Passaggiati of 1615" (alas, I could not sing the music, because I was in a library! At the Harry Ransom Center's Manuscript Collection at the University of Texas in Austin, I got to look upon a Schubert song and a piano piece by Rayel. To actually see the hand-written music by these idols of mine was a real thrill. We are not so lucky to be able to read or sing from historical documents during our worship services (although, take a look at the beautiful Gregorian chant in the narthex the next time you come to Saint Mary's), but we can *imagine* that we are linked to our ancestors. We may even be breathing the same molecules they breathed as we repeat these texts and songs, as will maybe countless others in the future. Or maybe there should be an eleventh commandment: "Thou shalt not go on automatic pilot." Not easy, of course, but worth the effort, right?
