#### From the Rector: "SAVE US FROM THE TIME OF TRIAL."

Change seems to be difficult for most human beings, even though it is the only reality that any of us ever know. Nothing ever stays the same – not even the cells in our bodies, which are continually being replaced by new ones.

One of the changes that will be coming in the next few years in the Episcopal Church is a change in the language of the Lord's Prayer. These words are not new, of course. The newer, more contemporary language of the prayer has been in our Prayer Book since 1979 as an alternative to the traditional Elizabethan language. But even this older form has been changed a number of times since the first Book of Common Prayer was published in 1549.

There are two primary reasons for making this change in the Lord's Prayer. The first has to do with the principle that worship must always be in the language of the people. There is no sacred language, no special form of human words that is more holy than another. The Church utterly rejects that idea which is dominant among many religions of the world. What matters, according to the teachings of Jesus, is the intention of our heart rather than the sound of our words. Insisting on an old form of language has the potential to lead to idolatry, in which our human words are valued more highly than the living presence of God.

The second reason for changing the language that we use in this family prayer of the Church is theological. Towards the end of the Elizabethan version, we pray "and lead us not into temptation." This is, frankly, a very poor translation of the original Greek, and it is just plain bad theology. God is pure goodness. It is impossible for God to lead us into temptation. "God cannot be tempted by evil, and God himself tempts no one" (James 1:13). Why would we make such a request? It is completely nonsensical to ask God to "lead us not into temptation." However, the newer form of the Lord's Prayer replaces this petition with "save us from the time of trial." That is much more faithful to the sense of the original text, and it makes theological sense as well. It is right to ask God for help whenever we face a difficult test in life.

Don't worry; it will be years before this change becomes mandated, and I have no control over this. But it is coming. One small step in preparing for this has been our use of the contemporary form in our noonday services in the Chapel. And in the meantime, you might try the newer form in your own personal prayers. Just look on Page 97 of the Prayer Book where both forms are found side-by-side. No matter which form you use, make sure that you keep on praying and maintain that on-going dialogue with God throughout the course of your ever-changing days.

#### From the Deacon's Corner:

Dear Ones,

In the latter part of the first century as the numbers of Jesus' followers grew, the Church needed to organize and designate leaders who would have specific duties. As the Book of Acts tells us, the Apostles saw the need early on and appointed seven men of good character, filled with the Holy Spirit, to be table waiters and to make sure that the widows and orphans in the community had food. They are considered to be the first deacons. Among the original seven was Stephen, the first martyr, who also preached the gospel and was stoned to death for doing so.



The Greek word *diakonos* means "one who serves." They were assistants at the Eucharist, sometimes handled the community's funds and decided how those funds would be spent. They were concerned with the care of the sick and others in need. The apostle Paul mentions "bishops and deacons" in his letter to the Philippians. In the letter to the Romans, Paul speaks of Phoebe and refers to her as a deacon.

Deacons today are heirs of this rich Biblical tradition. In addition, deacons model their lives after the servanthood of Christ, as we all do, serving the disenfranchised, sharing the gospel, serving the Church and doing so without counting the cost. As an expression of that service, deacons today are not paid for their work on behalf of the Church.

As the deacon assigned to Saint Mary's by our bishop, part of my responsibility to you is to be sure you know about the diaconate and the purpose of deacons in the Church, in part so that you have the opportunity to consider the diaconate as a call on your life.



# Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

The Vestry met on May 18<sup>th</sup>. Father Nathan led us in a teaching moment about our Book of Common Prayer. We discussed our financial situation. Our pledge commitments are just under \$273,000, which is over our goal of \$265,000; however, the budget for 2016 is a deficit budget. We continue to work to close the gap. Thank you to all of our parishioners who support us financially. Fuel oil was cheaper this past winter, and our usage was down due to the warm winter. If anyone would like more detailed information on our current situation, please contact the Wardens or Father

Jim Stoddard led a discussion about a possible conversion to natural gas for Saint Mary's. We had several questions about the incentives and what's covered by the incentives. Jim Stoddard will work to have a representative attend the next Excom meeting to address questions. Jim Stoddard and Barbara Bell discussed the proposed new chairs for the Guild Room. We need the final pricing (non-profit discount) from the vendor before proceeding.

The Mutual Study of Ministry interviews are underway with a goal of completing by 5/26. Once completed, all of the responses will be sent to Canon to the Ordinary Reverend Michael Amber for review and syn-

thesizing. He will return a report to us during the summer. We discussed the Safe Church Policy and asked all

members present to sign a form indicating they understood the policy.

We also discussed the Youth Christian Formation Program (Pre-K through 12) and future leadership of the program. Jim Kane is leading a process to determine how we will proceed. We also discussed the repairs to the Casavant Organ currently underway. The repairs do not affect the use of the organ but will give us an understanding of any issues that may be surfacing so that we can address them in a timely and responsible manner.

Saint Mary's continues to be blessed with so many parishioners volunteering their time, talent and treasures. We are also so grateful to our staff members who help us in so many ways. Together we truly are able to Celebrate, Honor and Serve!





Still another group created a beautiful collage that will brighten the walls of the **Fal**-





#### Buildings & Grounds Update

In the April Ave report, we mentioned that B&G felt obligated to again consider converting to natural gas even as we had a very favorable 2015-16 heating season with heating oil. Summit Gas has increased its rebate for making the conversion. Last year, the costs to convert were not fully covered by the rebate which would have meant an overage to B&G major project budget and thus dipping into the church's reserves. So for that reason and the fact that heating oil prices were coming down, we did not choose to convert. This year with the increase in the rebate, we will be able to make the conversion without it affecting our bottom line. The project has been presented to Vestry which will make its decision very soon. The market for heating oil is very volatile as it is very much reactive to world events and the financial market. The forecast for heating oil seems to be stable over the near term but you never know what will adversely affect it. On the other hand, natural gas prices are more stable as they are regulated by the Public Utility Commission.



The August Lobster Bake and December Sparkles are our two big events that support Saint Mary's programs throughout the year. Fundraising and Fun for ALL!!

*Sparkles* is a series of events during Advent that attract people from many communities as well as our own church family. We begin with the first Sunday in Advent and continue throughout the season. 
