From the Rector: Your Ministry within This Local Church

In the Canons (governing rules) of The Episcopal Church, there are seven recognized orders of licensed lay ministry that the Church envisions taking place in each local parish setting. (You can find these Canons fairly easily through an internet search. They are publicly available.)

These seven include the ministry of Worship Leader, Preacher, Eucharistic Minister, Eucharistic Visitor, Catechist, Evangelist and Pastoral Leader. Let me briefly describe each one so that you can prayerfully consider if the Holy Spirit is pulling on your heart to exercise one of these ministries.

Worship Leaders are those who regularly lead public worship under the direction of the clergy in charge of a congregation. In today's church, these people primarily lead the daily offices (Morning Prayer, Noonday Prayer, Evening Prayer and Compline). Some also assist the clergy with the first part of the Holy Eucharist (the ministry of the Word). In former times, these persons were generally known as "Lay Readers".

Preachers are quite self-explanatory, I hope. These are lay people who have a Godgiven gift for explaining the meaning of Scripture and for applying it to the realities of everyday life. However, they are not called to ordained ministry. Preachers assist the clergy with the task of preaching the Word of God within the local parish.

Eucharistic Ministers are the licensed lay ministers with whom many of us are most familiar. These people are trained and approved to administer Holy Communion (both bread and wine) to the people at the Eucharist. They assist the clergy with the task of distributing the Sacrament.

Eucharistic Visitors are those who take Holy Communion in a timely manner to members of the congregation who, because of illness or infirmity, are unable to be present at the community's Eucharistic celebration. They assist the clergy with the task of bringing the Sacrament to all the members of the parish family, including those who have been separated from the parish because of various life circumstances.

From the Deacon's Corner:

Dear Friends,

Last month I wrote to you about the biblical origins of the vocational diaconate. I want to continue the story by writing about the diaconate as it functions today. The most visible aspect of the diaconate is the way deacons function in the Sunday liturgy. The deacon carries the gospel book into the midst of the gathered community and proclaims the Gospel story for the day. The book is carried high to call attention to the centrality of the Word of God in our worship.

The deacon has some responsibility for the Prayers of the People which offers the opportunity to pray for the people and situations which are of particular concern to the community. The prayers are also an opportunity for the deacon to inform the people of the needs and concerns of the world around them. One of the deacon's most important responsibilities is to be a bridge between the Church and the world, bringing the needs of the world to the Church and sending the Church out to meet those needs.



The deacon prepares the table for the Eucharist and clears the table afterwards representing the service of preparation and cleaning up. The stole the deacon wears represents a towel worn over the shoulder, ready to use for the table service. The stole also represents the towel used to wash feet, as Jesus did, a service of comfort, care and inclusion.

At the end of the worship service, the deacon stands at the door, to dismiss the people, encouraging the people to go out into the world to serve the Lord by serving those in need.

Catechists are those who help to prepare persons for Baptism, Confirmation, Reception, and the Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows. They teach the catechism to the parish and take responsibility for basic instruction in the way of Christ. Catechists assist the clergy with the task of teaching the faith to all people, including children and youth.

Evangelists are those who present the good news of Jesus Christ in such a way that people are led to receive Christ as Savior and to follow Christ as Lord within the fellowship of the Church. They assist the clergy in growing the parish's ministry of evangelism within the broader community.

Pastoral Leaders are those called and prepared to exercise pastoral or administrative responsibility within a local congregation under special circumstances. This is a newer category of lay ministry which is a bit more difficult to define. It is most often exercised in rural areas or other places where clergy leadership for a congregation is difficult to secure. These people assist the diocesan Bishop in providing oversight for a local parish.

Which of these kinds of ministry are you being called to exercise? Anyone 16 years of age or older is invited to explore these avenues of ministry. Just as the Sacraments are regular means of grace without being the only means by which God works, so these categories are regular patterns of ministry among the people of God, but they most certainly are not the only kinds of ministry. There are a myriad of spiritual gifts and a myriad of ways that each of us can exercise our gifts "to God's glory and the welfare of God's people" (BCP, p.833).

The truth is that Saint Mary's needs more of all these ministers (with the possible exception of Pastoral Leaders). Will you consider taking on one of these roles within this parish family? One which corresponds to your gifts and passions and abilities? If so, please be in touch with me and we can discuss this further. And to all of you who have already made the commitment to serve God's people in one of these ways, I offer my sincere thanks. May your numbers increase! And may Saint Mary's continue to grow as a community in which each person is actively engaged in some aspect of the mission of Christ in our time and place.

Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

Deacon Christine joined us at our June 15th Vestry furnace and Meeting to teach us about Deacons and their role in the the Church. The Diaconate is based on the calling of The system as is. Seven Acts (6:1-7). She is a vocational deacon who is called to this special ministry. Those called to the would take priesthood serve as transitional deacons for a minimum of six months. Christine shared that we need more vocational deacons who serve as a bridge between the Church and the World. Deacon Christine has conducted prison ministry programs among others in her tenure as a deacon. She is available to anyone who feels called to be a deacon. Anyone interested should contact her directly to start a conversation on the ministry and the process.

Bill Gowen, Treasurer, reported that the Budget and Finance Committee met and is beginning the budget discussion for 2017. He also shared that our year to date actual is in good shape. We continue to benefit from generous support from our parishioners. He cautioned that summer revenue drops off and he will put Ministry survey results are with Canon Michael Amannouncements in the AVE and eNEWS to explain the importance of staying current on pledges during the summer vacation months.

Hugh Smith, representing the Buildings and Grounds Committee presented the final details on the Summit Natural Gas conversion proposal. B & G has been working to get three estimates for all the work and they strongly recommend we convert now. Fuel oil prices are still low but over time natural gas trends lower than fuel oil. And while no one has a crystal ball, this recommendation takes advantage of Summit's significant incentives. There is no cost to us to convert the Parish Hall and the Church building due to the rebate program being offered. B and G presented two options for the Rectory. Option A would convert the existing

steam Option В advantage of the full re-



bate and re- Janet Bowne, Jr. Warden and Jim Kane, Sr. Warden place the furnace and hot water heater. The new system would be baseboard hot water radiators. The current Rectory furnace is old and the steam system is a challenge to repair.

The Vestry voted to make the conversion for all three buildings w/option B for the Rectory. The net cost to Saint Mary's is \$9,560.

Pat Mordecai reported on the Nominating Committee. They will soon begin work on developing the slate for 2017.

Father Nathan reported that the Mutual Study of bler who will send us a report in July for our consideration. He also ran through the schedule for the Bach Festival, a very exciting event for Saint Mary's. Mass on the Grass begins on Wednesday, 6/29 and will feature a casual Eucharist at the labyrinth in front of the Rectory. Following the Eucharist, all are welcome to stay and share a picnic dish with fellow parishioners. We'll have croquet, bocce ball and other games. Dessert for the picnic will be s'mores! All are welcome. Bring a blanket and a dish to share. Parishioners are welcome to leave after the Eucharist or stay for the picnic.

Thanks to the entire Vestry for their service. We are blessed to have your thoughtful leadership.

The Root Cellar was established in 1984 in a dirt floor church basement in Portland, Maine, rrecognizing the need for a place where teens could come as an alternative to the streets, and in some cases their homes. Over the next decade, programs for kids and adults began to take shape as The Root Cellar became an independent non profit organization supported by volunteers from multiple area churches and denominations.

In 2001, completion of a brand new facility at 94 Washington Ave. in Portland enabled the organization to properly host the dozens of programs offered as well as allow for new program ideas.

In 2009, The Root Cellar opened a second site in Lewiston - Maine's 2nd largest city. Located in the heart of residential downtown neighborhoods, the Root Cellar is committed to bringing enriching services to neighboring youth and their families.

After more than 30 years of hard work and determination, The Root Cellar is still as committed as ever to serving and loving our neighbors.



Churchyard Burial Lots

The Churchyard Committee encourages you to take a walk about the property, experience the beauty of our Churchyard, and consider your plans for a final resting place. There are lots available in two areas of our beloved Churchyard - the Burial Garden and Saint Mary's Woods. Lots in southern Maine are increasingly hard to find and costs reflect the market.



Churchyard Areas:

<u>Churchyard</u> refers to the original Churchyard. It's located directly behind the rectory and contains 192 4' x 11' burial plots. All the plots in the Churchyard section are already in perpetual use.

<u>Saint Mary's Woods</u> is the area formerly known as the Columbarium. It was designed for the interment of ashes. Saint Mary's Woods is located at the southern end of the Churchyard and is 75' x 100'. It borders on Pine Grove Cemetery. Pine Grove Cemetery is a separate, non-related entity. Saint Mary's Woods will always remain natural. Lots are available to parishioners for perpetual use.

<u>The Burial Garden</u> refers to the newest area. It was approved by the Vestry in 1987 and is located to the right of the Rectory. The Burial Garden also borders on Pine Grove Cemetery. The Burial Garden includes a beautiful allée of pear trees that forms a spectacular canopy of blossoms in the spring and colorful foliage in the fall. Burial Garden lots may be used for interment of ashes or burials in a full plot. The Burial Garden includes 198 lots. Many of the lots remain available to parishioners for perpetual use.



Adopt a Bed

Interested in "adopting" a bed on our beautiful campus? Pick any area and think of it as your own! Check out the bulletin board near the elevator in the Parish House for available beds. The area may be small or large, prominent or tucked away. Your commitment would simply be to keep an eye on it and weed it, as needed.
