## From the Rector: On Fasting and Feasting

Do you know why we gather for Coffee Hours after our Sunday morning Eucharists? Yes, these provide us with opportunities for social interaction, for fellowship, for meeting new people and building community. However, the practice has much deeper roots. By the fourth century, it was a universal practice in the Church for people to fast before the Eucharist. As Augustine of Hippo taught: "It pleased the Holy Spirit to appoint, for the honor of so great a sacrament, that the body of the Lord should take the precedence of all other food entering the mouth of a Christian" (Letter to Januarius). In ordinary practice, this has become a fast of at least three hours before the Eucharist. After receiving Communion, it only makes sense to continue the celebration with more ordinary food. This has grown into our contemporary Coffee Hour gatherings.

Someone will ask: "Isn't that old-fashioned and out-of-date? Why does this kind of fasting even matter?" So let's be clear: God does NOT require anyone to fast in this way or any other. But the Church has recognized this as a useful tool for encouraging greater devotion to the Lord. How? By gathering together before God in a state of physical hunger, we acknowledge our dependence upon our Creator and our deep spiritual hunger for Truth. "Lord, I hunger and thirst for you" becomes our heart-felt prayer when we gather for worship. Yes, this practice may be old-fashioned, but I will argue that it is even MORE important in our age when food of all kinds is so abundant and our ultimate dependence upon God is so easily forgotten. Real, concrete practices of this type become more important when we are so easily distracted by a thousand different devices and screens. For me, every time my stomach growls with hunger, it prompts me to pray: "Lord, truly I do not need more food. We have more than enough. What I need is more of your grace and power and energy and wisdom. I need more of you."

This weekly "mini-fast" before Eucharist is only a reflection of the large cycles of fasting and feasting that frame the entire Christian year. Each major feast is preceded by a period of fasting. The primary example, of course, is the fast of Lent before the Feast of the Resurrection. The pivot between each fast and feast takes place in a spe-

cial liturgy called a vigil. Each vigil takes place after nightfall (when the new day of the feast has begun in biblical time-keeping) and grows directly out of the Jewish practice of Havdalah, the ceremony marking the end of Shabbat.



Our Great Vigil this year, marking the transition from the Lenten fast to the Paschal feast, will take place on Saturday, April 15. It will begin at 7:24 PM, the time of sunset. And this year's Vigil will be even more memorable with one adult baptism, that of Averyl Dawn Hill.

I hope that all of you will consider these ancient fasting practices, especially as we move toward Holy Week. And consider joining together to mark the transition from fast to feast at the Great Vigil. All are invited. Children who make it through are given a special treat at the end, and adults get a glass of champagne or sparkling cider. And, yes, they can have some chocolate as well. After all, at that point we will be in the Great Fifty Days of feasting and celebration! And that is something I'm sure we are all anticipating eagerly.

"Therefore, let us keep the feast! Alleluia!"

## Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

The new Vestry met for our first meeting on March 15th. We welcomed members of the Outreach Committee who came to present an update to discussions from the Annual Vision Meeting. They shared plans to reach out to new Mainers settling in Portland. Watch the AVE for more details on how each of us can become involved with this enriching program.

We reviewed the budget report and heard a stewardship update. Pledges are still coming in. We are short of our goal of \$285,000 but hope that the remaining pledges will come in before Easter. Saint Mary's has been notified that we were granted a New Initiatives Grant by the Maine Episcopal Diocese for the Royal School of Church Music program which will start later this year. The grant is for \$7,606 and will go toward start-up costs.

We approved the memberships of Building and Grounds, Churchyard, Budget and Finance and Outreach Committees as required by our by-laws.

Vestry members will be calling parishioners with children who are eligible for confirmation. We also discussed the importance of being hospitable to people with disabilities like hearing issues and vision problems.

The Long Range Financial Planning Ad Hoc committee is being formed by the Budget and Finance Committee and hopes to begin work soon.




The Bible offers us dozens of instructive words inviting us to hear and follow God's call to us.

# The St. Mary Schola Lenten Concert 'As Pants the Hart'

This concert features some sublime music, including Bach's poignant aria from Cantata 42, for mezzo soprano, oboe, violin and strings as well as a rousing sinfonia for the instrumental ensemble.

There are two major master works by Gesualdo ('O vos omnes' Oh ye people, see if there is any sorrow like my sorrow) and Lassus ('Timor et tremor' Fear and trembling) that are profoundly moving.

Another Bach aria for bass, oboe and strings ushers us into the passion week.

The final works from the first half include a mysterious medieval setting of 'Ave Regina Caelorum' by Guillaume Dufay and an absolutely radiant five-part setting of the famous 'Ave Maria' text by Palestrina.

The second half presents Handel's Chandos Anthem number six called 'As Pants the Hart' based on the text from Psalm 42. It begins with a vigorous sinfonia for oboe and strings and continues with a six-part setting of the opening lines with contrapuntal majesty equal to Bach's great choral writing. Handel's genius for writing for the human voice includes some heartfelt arias and duets for soprano and tenor and a final vigorous fugue for the whole ensemble.



## Navy Reserve Chaplain Commissioning: Date to be determined

Plans are being made for Fr. Nathan to be commissioned as a Chaplain in the Navy Reserves. Final approval has not yet been announced, but all signs point toward a successful outcome of the application process. The US Navy has a great need for Chaplains to serve in New England. As a reservist, Fr. Nathan will serve for approximately two days each month and two weeks each year. For Chaplains, the Navy provides a "flex-drill" arrangement that does not require weekend drilling. His duties will vary each month according to the needs of the Navy and the Sea Services, but it is likely to include veterans' funerals and visits at the VA Hospital in Togus. He will



be required to attend a two-week DCOIC (Direct Commission Officer Indoctrination Course) at the Navy Education and Training Center in Newport, Rhode Island in July. Fr. Nathan was recruited by our own (USN Lieutenant) Shea Bickerstaff. In addition, our own (USN Captain) Mark Winter will administer the oath of office at the brief Commissioning Ceremony. Afterward, there will be a celebratory reception in the Auditorium. All are welcome to come and join the celebration!


