Can you believe that it is Advent season once again? Time to prepare our hearts and our homes for the celebration of the birth of Christ – the pivotal point of all human history. I know that it is very difficult to do in our culture today, but I do sincerely hope that we will all enter into this season as an intentional time of spiritual preparation. The Feast of the Nativity begins at sunset on December 24. Until that moment, the Church is patiently waiting, patiently praying, patiently preparing for the time of celebration.

Why does Advent matter? In one sense, it is true that every day is Christmas. We can also say that every day

is Thanksgiving; every day is the day of your birth, and every day is the day of your death. Within the realm of eternity, time has no meaning and all things are contemporaneous. However, you and I live primarily within the realm of earth's timing. We need the calendar to mark important events and to remember the story of God. By keeping the patient preparations of Advent, instead of rushing ahead into premature feasting, we remember the generations of our ancestors who waited for divine intervention to change the painful, bloody history of humanity. And we remember the countless millions alive today who are waiting for justice and for their share of earth's abundance. To ignore Advent is to ignore the sufferings of humanity for the sake of our own pleasure.

We can do better than that, and we do not have to do what everyone around us is doing. "Be strong! Take heart!" Together, let's keep Advent and wait as best as we can for the 12 days of feasting between sunset on December 24 and sunset on January 5. Then we will once again sing the praises of Jesus the Son of Mary and the Son of God who was born to turn the tide of human history.

Alleluia!



Be Still Mondays in Advent at 5:30PM in the Fr. James Chapel

There is so much to enjoy during this season of Advent: the Sparkles Fair, the St. Mary Schola Concert, the shopping, the wrapping and the gathering of family of friends. Or perhaps you have some anxiety about the coming weeks. In either case, wouldn't it be nice to set aside a little time to "be still" in the beauty of holiness. The phrase comes from Psalm 96:9. It's the psalm that urges us to "sing to the Lord a new song." Isn't there a new song your heart and soul would like to learn? Or maybe you just long for a little peace and quiet in the midst of your hectic schedule. And there is no place more evocative of "the beauty of holiness" than a candlelit Father James Chapel. So come to BE STILL every Monday in Advent from 5:30 to 6:30. Give yourself the gift of the refreshing silence offered by the practice of Centering Prayer.

Center yourselves with a few minutes of accompanied Taize chanting before entering into 20 minutes of UNguided, silent contemplation/meditation. We will then offer Lectio Divina, during which we listen and contemplate a brief scriptural reading, ending with the opportunity to share, if desired, the feelings this reading evokes.

We can promise that you will leave the chapel with a sought-for sense of peace and calm and renewal. Please join us.



A Blessed Advent

There is something about Advent that always gives me a lump in my throat. We sing "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here" The yearning ache of that line, and the rest of the hymn, always moves me.

We are in "lonely exile" in so many ways. We are isolated from each other. We are alienated from members of our families. We have abandoned our highest hopes. We have somehow lost our best selves. As one form of the confession says, "we have not loved God with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbor as ourselves."

And perhaps the worst part is that we are painfully aware of our condition.

The liturgical season of Advent puts us in touch with this estrangement. We might not have the will or courage to look at our lives if we didn't have to spend time in Advent on the way to the joyful season of Christ-

mas. For these four Sundays, we take a "long, loving gaze at the real," sometimes a painful thing to do.

There is another song that pulls at my heart too. Part of it goes like this: "The honest cries of breaking hearts/are better than a Hallelujah/sometimes." Amy Grant gets at the paradox of an alienation that is heard and healed in our honesty before a loving God. This is wisdom.

The same paradox ends "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." As you know, the mournful hymn's refrain is "Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel!" There are no conditions or qualifications. The certain hope of Advent is simultaneous with its challenge. Even as we confess our shortcomings and yearn for an end to our brokenness, God hears our longing and sends a Comforter.



Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

The Vestry met on 11/15. We welcomed Marian McCue and Becky Pride from the Outreach Committee to share the list of grantees to receive this year's grants. We discussed their process and the list presented. Vestry action was needed to make a grant of \$2,000 to support hurricane relief for Puerto Rico. The Vestry voted to do so.

We continued our review of the proposed budget for 2018. We resolved some of the questions from the presentation in October but still have a significant deficit to deal with. Several things will help us minimize the need to draw from our 1241 savings account next year. First of all for this year, it's important for Sparkles to have a successful sale on 12/2 and Schola Concert. It is also critical that we reach our pledge goal of \$285,000. Typically we have approximately 150 households pledge support in a given year. We know that many people give occasionally without pledging.

If we could add 15 new pledging households pledging a minimum of \$675, we would hit our goal of \$285,000. To help ensure we don't miss a single pledge, the Vestry will make reminder calls to the parish in December.

Jonathan says, "I wake, most mornings, open to being surprised." We anticipate Jonathan covering many of Nathan's duties while he is on Sabbatical in 2018.

Saint Mary's Snowman Advent Giving Tree






We, at Saint Mary's look forward to having a Giving Tree once again! Here is an opportunity to become engaged in the spirit of giving this Christmas.







The choirs and clergy from the Church of Saint Mary, the Falmouth Congregational Church, the Foreside Community Church, Emmaus Lutheran Church and the Church of the Holy Eucharist (cluster of 5 Catholic churches including Holy Martyrs in Falmouth and Sacred Heart in Yarmouth) met and joined together in glorious harmony to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation on Sunday, October 29.



It was such a pleasure to join together in fellowship and sing together the great hymns associated with Msartin Luther, accompanied by a brass quartet. This service was so successful that many of us hope to plan for another ecumenical service next fall.

The Faith Family Sunday on the first Sunday of Advent is celebrated with the beautiful service known as 'Lessons and Carols.' Similar to the service at the Vigil of the Resurrection, this service begins with readings from Genesis and continues with the great messages from the prophets (Isaiah), and ends with the Christ-

The service begins with the beloved hymn 56 'O come, o come Emmanuel,' with hand bells accompanying. This hymn comes from an ancient collections called *The Great O's*, which were medieval antiphons for the

service of vespers (our evensong service) during the last days of Advent. They are referred to as the "O Antiphons" because the title of each one begins with the interjection: "O." Each antiphon is a name of Christ, one of his attributes mentioned in Scripture. They are:

- December 17: O Sapientia (O Wisdom)
- December 18: O Adonai (O Lord)
- December 19: O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse)
- December 20: O Clavis David (O Key of David)
- December 21: O Oriens (*O Dayspring*)
- December 22: O Rex Gentium (O King of the nations)
- December 23: O Emmanuel (O With Us is God)

Hymn 56 combines all of the antiphons with a verse for each day.

Following the ensuing readings, there are anthems that expand on the messages of the written texts. The story of Adam and Eve is followed by a wonderful 15th-century English carol text set by Boris Ord. It includes the wonderful lines:

Adam lay ybounden, Bounden in a bond; Four thousand winter, Thought he not too long.

And all was for an apple, An apple that he took. As clerks finden, Written in their book.

Nay had the apple taken been, The apple taken been, Nay had never our lady, Of been heaven queen.

Blessed be the time That apple taken was, Therefore we maun singen: *Deo gratias!*

Adam lay bound, Bound in a bind

Four thousand winters, Were not too long for him.

And all was for an apple, An apple that he took As clerks have found, Written in their book.

For, if he had not taken the apple Not taken the apple Then our lady would never have been Our heavenly queen.

Blessed be the time That the apple was taken.

Therefore, we must sing: Give thanks to God!

The reading from Isaiah 40:1-11, in which God promises the people and prepares them for redemption, is followed by a very powerful anthem based on the poem by Thomas Troeger, *The Dream Isaiah Saw*. The refrain of this anthem is particularly moving:

Little child whose bed is straw, take new lodgings in my heart. Bring the dream Isaiah saw: life redeemed from fang and claw.

(and in the ensuing verses: Bring the dream Isaiah saw: justice purifying law; and knowledge, wisdom, worship, awe.)

Further readings are followed by another anthem based on a 14th-century English carol *Gabriel to Mary Came*, and the exquisite carol by Peter Warlock *Come to Bethlehem*.

The Third reading, Isaiah 7:10-15, in which God promises that a child shall be conceived who will be known as "God with Us", is followed by an anthem by our newly formed Angel and Saint Cecilia choir: *Prepare a Way for the Lord*. This will be an occasion for us to admire the beautiful blue cassocks that the Saint Cecilia Choir members will be wearing.

We are so excited about the children's choirs that have been formed, and we are deeply grateful for the direction of Priscilla Rigg. Mrs. Rigg has a lifetime experience with training young singers. It's no accident that young people and their families are so eager to join her in this worthy ministry. Her enthusiasm and love of teaching young people the joys of singing are greatly appreciated.

The success of any ensemble will depend upon the loyal commitment the children and their families can offer as a worthy 'living sacrifice.' There are presently 30 registered members of the Angel/Saint Cecilia choirs.

The children's choir will participate in the Pageant on Sunday, December 24 at 10 a.m., and we are all excited about this new program. As a singer and musician, I can tell you that my most meaningful experience with music began at church. It truly endows one with 'a voice for life.'



Greetings from the Saint Mary's Church Treasurer:

In 2017, while we have remained relatively close to budgeted expenses, we will most likely end the year with an expected deficit as the revenue position has not grown as hoped.

The Budget and Finance Committee along with the Executive Committee and the Vestry have been working since September on a budget for 2018 with the expectation of vestry approval at its December meeting. Supporting programs for families, as well as education and developing a strong pledging base, has been an emphasis in this process. The Budget and Finance Committee (BFC) is also defining the process to receive designated and un-designated bequests and will make a recommendation to the Vestry. We are fortunate to have capable parish members serving on the BFC; our thanks to Garry Bowne, Pat Mordecai, David Robinson, Mary Smith and Bill Gowen.

One final comment I would like to make in regard to the 2018 annual pledge campaign as it relates to the 2018 parish budget. The leadership has selected \$285,000 as an attainable goal. If we exceed that goal by \$20,000, we might just come very close to a deficit-free 2018. Please keep this in mind when filling out your 2018 pledge form.
