From our Rector: Thy Kingdom Come



Once again this year, during these Great Fifty Days, the Archbishop of Canterbury has invited churches all around the world to join together with intention by praying for God's Kingdom to come. This idea grew out of the ancient practice of praying a Novena. Now, in case you do not know, Novena comes from the Latin word for nine, and it refers directly to the nine days between the Ascension and the day of Pentecost. Do you remember what Jesus instructed his followers to do? He told them to "stay in the city until you have been furnished with heavenly power" (Luke 24:49). So that is what they did, even though they had no idea what was coming! Mary was there in the upper room with the disciples and

for nine days they "all were united in their devotion to prayer" (Acts 1:14). Ever since those days, other disciples have been inspired by their example and have committed themselves to an intentional prayer practice for the Novena between Ascension (May 10) and Pentecost (May 20).

When we join together to pray "thy kingdom come," we are participating in a vast revolutionary movement that is intended to change the way the world works. No more "business as usual"! All around the world, disciples of Jesus are bringing hope to the hopeless, fighting against oppression and poverty, lifting up those who are brokenhearted, and guiding the young and old into the experience of God's abundant life. My friends, you and I get to be part of this! I hope that the thrill of this reality has not yet worn off for you. God is doing a new thing in us by Pastor Sara D'Angio White

Spring is here! I know this less because of the promise of tulips and daffodils outside, and more because my rain jacket has become my constant companion. Before moving to Maine, I had never heard the term "mud season," but I would say I now understand the nomenclature. And isn't it so true that what we want to be harbingers of a particular season or event are often so different from the signs we actually receive?

Being people who celebrate life over death, light over darkness, we are particularly good at looking for signs of light and life. The green shoot poking out of the ground, the sun creeping earlier and higher into the sky. It can be harder, and messier, to root about in the mud. But just as mud season is integral to

spring, and eventually summer, muck is a part of life. The muck of broken relationships, failed resolutions and dead ends is muck that we have in common. And each of these is messy, and hurts us and others more or less, depending on how much muck we've turned up. And each of these can be a mud season, a sign that, while we aren't perfect, we're dirty but not irrevocably buried.

As we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, we are constantly invited into new life whenever we fall short of perfection. That is why Jesus lived and died and rose again for us – because perfection just isn't human, and God wants us to know that no matter how many times we are reminded of our own imperfections, we are forgiven and loved and asked to be in relationship again. The mud of our imperfections is part of the reality of life, a sign that we are but human, and a reminder that we ARE human – a reminder that we are part of God's awe-some creation, and that God is always doing a new thing in us.

Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

The Vestry met on April 25th and welcomed Father Nathan back from the first segment of his sabbatical. This meeting is a week later than usual due to school spring break week. He shared a teaching moment from the writings of the Desert Fathers.

Lucy Ellis attended to present the garden redesign on behalf of the Saint Mary's Garden Club (SMGC). For those who don't know, the SMGC started many years ago and was primarily made up of parishioners. Over the years, the membership has opened to the community. As part of their mission, they maintain the garden behind the Parish House and other gardens including a garden at the Falmouth Middle School. Access and visibility of the garden behind the Parish House changed when the office wing and chapel were built. The SMGC has also been working to eradicate Bishop's Weed, an invasive plant. All of these issues led to the SMGC deciding to redesign. They formed a design team composed of extremely talented garden experts. The proposed redesign will take 3 years to complete and will ultimately include an accessible path as well as a natural setting for ceremonies like weddings. The Vestry voted to support this project. Saint Mary's will work in collaboration with the SMGC. SMGC is providing a great deal of the funding for this three-year project.

Bill Gowen, Treasurer, was absent, but he sent a report. Our cash position is good now, but we still have a deficit projected for the year end. We are still receiving pledges. Thank you for all who pledged. If you didn't pledge for 2018 and would like to do so, Beth Shaw, our




Parish Manager, can get you the information to do so.

The second chapter of Mark contains one of my favorite Bible stories. It's the one where several men carry a paralyzed man to a house where Jesus is teaching. Upon arrival, they find the place so crowded they can't get in the door. They have to haul the stretcher up to the roof, somehow make a hole in the roof and let him down with a kind of rope arrangement. Think of all that work! It couldn't have been easy, making the stretcher, putting him on it, carrying him the distance to where Jesus was teaching, hauling him up the stairs, to say nothing of making a hole in the roof. How would you even go about doing that? And then they had to lower him without dropping him in Jesus's lap!

Who were these guys? How did they know the paralyzed man? Why go to so much trouble?

I think I have an idea. They loved him. They probably wouldn't have said those words; you know how guys can be. But they showed their love just the same.

Here's a story from 2018. Some of you know my brother is ill with a form of blood cancer. He is waiting for a bone marrow transplant and in the meantime, his doctor has strictly forbidden any skiing. My brother faithfully, if unhappily, followed the doctor's advice until one Sunday a friend from church said," Let's go skiing this week." "Can't do it," my brother said, "Doctor's orders." He explained that his doctor was worried he'd fall and injure his enlarged spleen. "I've got just the answer. Wear one of the life vests we keep in our boat. That should protect you."

My brother took up the suggestion. He went skiing with his friend. He wore the life vest. What's more, his church friend brought along two other friends who skied with them. They all skied around my brother so no other skier could accidently bump into him. They all had a ball. At the top of the mountain, the ringleader took a photo of my brother who had the biggest grin on his face since his diagnosis.

Christian love can be a blast! Who do you know that could use a lift?

Saint Mary's Team Participating in 2018 Trek Across Maine

The Trek Across Maine is a 3-day, 180-mile cycling event from the mountains of Sunday River to the sea in Belfast. As the largest fundraising event of its kind in the nation for the American Lung Association, the Trek has raised more than \$24 million in the past 30+ years. Nearly 2,000 cyclists and 750 volunteers participate in this one of a kind annual journey on Father's Day Weekend.

The Saint Mary's Trek team, named **Godspeed**, is currently comprised of Father Nathan, Bruce Fithian, John Henson, Greg Fergin and Charlie Hurdman. Other members of the Parish are welcome to join the Godspeed team, and should simply speak to Charlie Hurdman or

hosting coffee hour following the 10:00 service on Sunday, May 6th. During that time members of the team will be happy to answer any questions parishioners may have about the Trek and explain how anyone interested in doing so can support the team's fundraising goal of \$2,000 it has pledged to raise to support the mission of the American Lung Association.

CHORAL EVENSONG, MAY 6, 4:00 PM

One of the great Anglican traditions is the choral evensong. This service is held in the late afternoon and is associated with particularly beautiful prayers, responses and musical anthems. If you go to a cathedral town in England, the evensong is sung every day. St. Luke's Cathedral presents an evensong on the first Sunday of every month from October through May. It is our fervent desire to celebrate an evensong in the fall and spring at Saint Mary's in the future.

This service is listed in the Book of Common Prayer as Evening Prayer and begins with the *Phos Hilaron* (O gracious light), which is an ancient Christian hymn originally written in Koine Greek. It is the earliest known Christian hymn recorded outside of the Bible that is still in use today. The RSCM St.Cecilia Choir, directed by Priscilla Rigg, will sing this mystical work accompanied by our newly acquired handbells.

O gracious Light,

pure brightness of the everlasting Father in heaven, O Jesus Christ, holy and blessed!

Now as we come to the setting of the sun, and our eyes behold the vesper light, we sing thy praises, O God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Thou art worthy at all times to be praised by happy voices, O Son of God, O Giver of life,

and to be glorified through all the worlds.



Following the *Phos Hilaron* will be a setting of psalm 98 sung by the combined choirs. This will be sung using another great tradition: Anglican chant, in which the choirs sing the verses of the psalm to a well-known harmonization by Luther (A Mighty Fortress is our God).

Every evensong includes the Magnificat - Mary's song of praise and the Nunc Dimittis - the song of thanksgiving by Simeon who upon seeing the baby Jesus in the temple sang these beautiful words:

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace according to thy word.

For mine eyes have seen thy salvation,

Which thou hast prepared before the face of all people;

To be a light to lighten the Gentiles and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

The Saint Mary Choir will present these two famous texts with a setting by the eminent English composer, Herbert Howells (1892-1985), with tenor soloist Jonathan Scott.



The Apostle's Creed and Lord's Prayer are intoned by all, followed by Mozart's greatly loved anthem *Laudate Dominum*, with Lesley Dolinger as soloist.

There are wonderful evening hymns that we never get to sing on Sunday mornings, but we will May 6: hymn 24, 'The day thou gavest, Lord, is ended.' Finally the service ends with the ancient Prayer of St. Chrysostom (c. 349-407), an early Church Father.

This will be a wonderful way to celebrate spring and support our growing children's choirs.

Naturally, there will be lovely goodies provided as well.




hristian Formation - RAY Beams - Easter 2018
