# From our Rector: "My Soul Waits For The Lord, More Than Watchmen For the Morning" (Psalm 130.5)



Patience is the key word for Advent. How much of our lives are spent waiting? The average American commuter spends around 40 hours each year just waiting in traffic jams. And all of us are forced to pass large amounts of time waiting in reception areas, waiting for test results, waiting for a video to stop buffering, waiting in check-out lines. But here is the question: do we wait well? Are we skilled in the practice of patience as we wait?

Advent is a time of waiting. It is like the early morning when we first wake up. We need to get ready for the day to come, but how we prepare ourselves is super important. Are we intentional enough to ensure that we are physically and spiritually nourished for the day to come? Advent is an invitation to slow down, to go back to the beginning and remember what the story of Jesus is all about. In the past, the earth was waiting for God to act, to redeem, to restore the life of this world. We live today on the other side of the Messiah's Birth, Passion and Resurrection, but we are still waiting. Even with all of our technological knowledge and skill, we cannot save ourselves. We must still wait for God to act once again and complete "the time of universal restoration" (Acts 3.21).

Advent is a time of waiting for the church as well. Yes, this means no Christmas carols! And I hope that you will experience Advent as an opportunity to grow in the practice of patience. Christians ought to be the most patient people of all. After all, patience is a fruit of the Holy Spirit, a reliable sign that we are maturing in Christ. With the eyes of faith we can see that everything is safely held in God's hands. We are free to wait and to watch, knowing that in God's good time all will be well. So let Advent be an intentional time for you to grow in patience. You will not regret it.



## From the Deacon's Corner



She stood in line in front of me at the grocery store. Her darling little boy, probably around three years old, sat quietly in the shopping cart, his big brown eyes looking me over with a casual curiosity. He had a new warm jacket on, but he had sandals on his feet and it was cold outside. Then I noticed his mom was wearing sandals too and a knit hat, but no warm jacket. There were three items on the conveyer belt, maybe their evening meal? The cashier, a young woman wearing a head scarf, told the mom how much she owed. She dug around in her pockets and came up with a couple of bills and some change and showed them to the cashier who patiently counted the money and then tried to explain to the mom, whose English was minimal, that she didn't have enough to pay for her items. I was touched by the patience and kindness the cashier showed to this mom. I could not begin to imagine what it must be like for her to be in a new country struggling with a strange language, super markets, a cold climate for which she was not prepared and a mon-

etary system that was a mystery. Her precious little boy had a jacket, but she did not, and I bet she worried that he needed shoes and socks.

Mary had a precious little boy. She and Joseph traveled far from home and she had her baby in a stable. She and Joseph had so little. Were they fearful being away from home and alone when the baby came? Did they have enough food? Were they cold at night? When they felt threatened and they fled to save their baby's life, they had to depend on God for everything, even their lives. Even though they had already put all their trust in God, they must have had moments of fear.

This mother and child in front of me in line at the grocery store strangers in a strange land, like so many mothers and fathers love their children and want them to be safe, warm, happy and healthy and will suffer and sacrifice and struggle to give them that. She becomes a stranger no longer as I watch her. We are connected. We are God's daughters, mothers doing our best for our children, fellow travelers on a journey of faith. Soon it is my turn at the cash register. I smile goodbye to her and her little boy and wish them a good day. She is smiling too, her groceries in a bag and her money back in her pocket.

# Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The Vestry met on November 14th. Jennifer Gregg, representing the Outreach Committee, and members of the Budget and Finance Committee, Garry Bowne and Pat Mordecai, joined the meeting.

Jennifer presented the Outreach list of grants being given for this year as well as a plan for a focus for 2019 on the opioid crisis.

The Budget and Finance Committee presented the 2019 Budget for the vestry's review to be voted on in December. Again this year, due to our fixed costs, this budget carries a deficit of about \$20,000. Thank you to the Budget and Finance Committee for its work on the Budget.

The Nominating Committee presented the slate for 2019.

We discussed a by-law change that would allow but not require vestry members to serve two consecutive terms if they wished to do so. Doing so would allow for retention of institutional memory. The Executive Committee will consider this at the December meeting. We discussed the importance of Sparkles and the need for volunteers and help with spreading the word to



friends and colleagues.

Father Nathan shared a chart that showed the decline in affiliation across the Episcopal provinces based on parochial report numbers. Our province has seen a decline, but we have increased after the drop in numbers after Father James' death. However, we should continue to focus on membership as we start a new year.

The Stewardship campaign is underway. We hope to get pledge commitments in by the end of the year. Our goal for the Grace Given campaign is \$285,000.



# Digesting the Scriptures

The Collect for last Sunday is one of my favorites. It's about our relationship to the Scriptures. We pray that we may *hear*, *read*, *mark*, *learn and* (I love this) *inwardly digest* them. The prayer describes a process of slow assimilation.

We read the same set of lectionary passages from the Bible in a three-year cycle. That means that every three years I get to hear the same story again. The words are the same. Perhaps the translations vary a bit, but the narrative is well known. Yet I am not the same person I was three years ago. I have experienced more of the ups and downs, the joys and griefs of life. I am older than I was the last time I heard that passage. Perhaps I'm with a different community this time around.

All this means that I am invited to hear the Scriptures fresh. I am invited to pay attention from my new vantage point. I am invited to learn something new that I never saw there before. Then I can begin the process of layering this new insight over all the other understandings I've gleaned over the years. I have a layer cake of Biblical story that grows more complex and nuanced year by year. My patience and appreciation for the apocalyptic readings from Mark, for instance, have grown as I have read the newspapers and watched TV news during recent years.

The process of digestion is perfect for our relationship with scripture. It reminds me of the moment when "the word of the Lord" came to the prophet Ezekiel. The voice said, "O mortal, eat what is offered to you; eat this scroll, and go, speak to the house of Israel. So I opened my mouth, and he gave me the scroll to eat. He said to me, Mortal, eat this scroll that I give you and fill your stomach with it. Then I ate it; and in my mouth it was as sweet as honey.

Yet I know well that the Scriptures are not always sweet. There are tough passages to read and inwardly digest. Revelation is a good example of another scroll-eating prophet. In his revelatory trance, John of Patmos is given a little scroll. The voice from heaven said, "Take it, and eat; it will be bitter to your stomach, but sweet as honey in your mouth." So I took the little scroll from the hand of the angel and ate it; it was sweet as honey in my mouth, but when I had eaten it, my stomach was made bitter. That's inward digestion for you. It's a lifelong process.

# Be Still Monday Evenings in Advent at 5:30PM in the Fr. James Chapel

There is so much to enjoy during this season of Advent: the Sparkles Fair, the St. Mary Schola Concert, the shopping, the wrapping and the gathering of family of friends. Or perhaps you have some anxiety about the coming weeks. In either case, wouldn't it be nice to set aside a little time to "be still" in the beauty of holiness. The phrase comes from Psalm 96:9. It's the psalm that urges us to "sing to the Lord a new song." Isn't there a new song your heart and soul would like to learn? Or maybe you just long for a little peace and quiet in the midst of your hectic schedule. And there is no place more evocative of "the beauty of holiness" than a

candlelit Father James Chapel. So come to BE STILL every Monday in Advent from 5:30 to 6:30. Give yourself the gift of the refreshing silence

offered by the practice of Centering Prayer.

Center yourselves with a few minutes of accompanied Taize chanting before entering into 20 minutes of UNguided, silent contemplation/meditation. We will then offer Lectio Divina, during which we listen and contemplate a brief scriptural reading, ending with the opportunity to share, if desired, the feelings this reading evokes.
