# From the Rector: Freedom and A ccountability



On Saturday, February 9, God willing and weather permitting, the Episcopal Church in Maine will gather to elect a new Bishop. This entire process is an excellent example of our Anglican approach of the Via Media – the Middle Way. We are free to elect whomever we want to be our Bishop. However, there is a system of accountability in place to guard against possible extremes and to confirm the suitability of our choice. There are 109 dioceses within The Episcopal Church scattered across 17 nations. Before the one we elect can begin to function as our Bishop, a majority of the

elected Standing Committees of these 109 dioceses must send a written notice of consent within 120 days of the election. If a majority withholds consent, then another election must take place. This is freedom with accountability.

Another example of this Via Media approach is evident in how The Episcopal Church is organized. We have adhered to the ancient structure of the early Church that quickly became organized around the ministry of bishops (episkopos), priests (presbyteros), and deacons (diakonos) serving within a region known as a diocese. However, we have imbued this ancient structure with a representative process of election that includes all the members of the Church. Here is accountability with freedom.

Each congregation in our diocese has elected delegates to gather for an Electing Convention in Bangor on February 9. After much prayer and a thoroughly deliberative process, those delegates and our clergy will elect a new Bishop to serve as our chief pastor and spiritual leader. As Ignatius of Antioch wrote circa 100 AD in his Letter to the Smyrnaeans, "See that you all follow the Bishop, as Jesus Christ follows the Father...It is good to know God and the Bishop. The one who honors the Bishop is honored by God." We trust that the Holy Spirit is guiding us in this process to identify the Bishop who is called to lead us at this point in time. Please pray for this process and for the election on February 9. Nathar W. Ferell +

#### E piscopal Visitation: February 17

"Each Diocesan Bishop shall visit the Congregations within the Diocese at least once in three years." Canon III.18.4(a).

Bishop Stephen Lane is scheduled to visit Saint Mary's on Sunday, February 17. In accordance with the Canon cited above, this is a regular visit to worship God with us, to listen to our hopes and concerns, and to meet with parish leaders. Please make every effort to be present and to participate in this special time with our Chief Pastor. The schedule for the day will be as follows:

8:30 AM Breakfast with Vestry and Staff

9.30 AM The Holy Eucharist (all-ages, no Guiding RAY classes)

Coffee Hour and discussion for all with the Bishop 10:30 AM

Remember that the newly elected Bishop who will replace Bishop Steve is scheduled to begin her or his term on June 22 when that person is ordained and consecrated by the Presiding Bishop Michael Curry.

#### From the Deacon's Corner

Dear Ones,

It occurs to me that some of you may not have known a deacon before coming to Saint Mary's or you may have known deacons in the past but not known much about the order of deacons or their place in the Church. The term "deacon" comes from the Greek word " diakonia," which means servant or servanthood. The ministry of the deacon is to represent the servanthood of Jesus Christ.

The development of the order of deacons has its roots in the early Church. Jesus did not intend to start a church but as the apostles spread the Good News, more and more people were attracted to the early communities by the message of love, hope and inclusion they heard. It also became clear that the early Christians had a



commitment to the care of widows, orphans and the sick, no matter who they were. The apostles and the leaders who followed them and developed new communities could not attend to their duties of preaching, teaching and providing the sacraments without help from others who would see to the needs of the larger community by distributing alms. From these roots come the order of deacons.

The structure of the early Church included Bishops and Deacons. As the Church grew the order of presbyters or



priests came to be. Today Deacons continue to be closely associated with their Bishop who deploys them and oversees their formation and ongoing ministry and is their "pastor." Deacons are assigned to a particular parish with the consent of the rector and vestry. A Letter of Agreement outlines the deacon's duties which will be supervised by the rector and the Letter is signed by the Bishop, Rector, Warden and Deacon. The deacon's ministry in the parish is not paid which comes as a surprise to many! Our culture often measures our value by how much we are paid for our work and thinks of volunteers as nice people doing good deeds for free. Deacons, however, are most often educated professionals with real careers and professional skills they use in their work in the world who are called by God to use those skills and talents for the benefit of God's people in the Church and in the world without the expectation of compensation.

Deacons serve as a bridge between the Church and the world, bringing the needs of the world to the Church and helping the people of God develop their skills and talents to use in the service of God's people. Deacons bring the love of Jesus Christ into the world serving the sick and the poor wherever God calls them to serve.

The Deacon's role in the liturgy represents their role in the life of the Church. The stole over the left shoulder represents the towel used to set and clean up the communion table and the towel for washing feet and wiping tears. The Deacon does not just read the Gospel but proclaims the Gospel, carrying the Gospel book into the midst of the gathered community highlighting the centrality of the Gospel to our worship and our life together. The Deacon prepares the table for the Eucharist and participates in feeding the people with the Body and Blood of Christ. The Deacon participates in the Prayers of the People so that as we pray together, we may be made aware of the needs of the world. The Deacon again stands in the midst of the people to dismiss the congregation sending them out to serve Christ in the world.

Each Deacon is unique in their gifts, leadership style, and ministry focus. I am blessed to have served as a deacon for twenty years and equally blessed to have served in two distinctly different parishes. The focus of my ministry in the world, as many of you know, has been to inmates at the Maine Correctional Center, leading grief support groups. If you would like to know more, I would love to talk about the diaconate! Perhaps God is tapping you on the shoulder, leading you to consider this ministry.

### Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The Vestry met on January 17, 2019. Father Nathan led us in a teaching moment about wisdom and work done by researchers at UC San Diego on the components of wisdom.

Financial Update: We ended 2019 with a small surplus thanks to everyone who helped advance our mission and ministries. Several factors contributed to the surplus: savings on employee benefits, Sparkles' huge success, expense management and increased pledges and overall giving. While one year is not a trend, 2018 was a great year!

The Nominating Committee announced the following delegates for the Diocesan Convention:

Jim Stoddard, Betsy Stoddard, Nadine Timberlake, Stan Eaton have been nominated for the state convention and Bonny Rodden is named as the alternate.

Proposed By-Law change: We submitted our by-law change to the Chancellor of the Diocese for approval. Generally speaking he agrees with our request to allow vestry members to serve two terms consecutively but we do not have the final approval. We agreed to bring the by law change to the annual meeting for provisional approval.



We discussed the need to get input from the parish on the future of Saint Mary's. Working with Father Nathan, the Wardens developed questions for an online survey and printed survey to solicit input. We reviewed the draft of question; some changes were made in the meeting.

Bishop Stephen Lane will visit with us on February 17. The Vestry will meet with the Bishop at 8:30am, and we will hold one service at 9:30am followed by a sumptuous coffee hour for all.

Thank you to our outgoing Vestry members for their three years of service: Julie Otte, Rick Hirschman, Tim Record and John Fallon, and to Bill Gowen for performing the job of Treasurer for four years.

- **5:45PM** Group presentations and discussion. Topics will vary or be seasonal.





It is also an epidemic that affects each and every one of us directly or indirectly, regardless of age, socio-economic status, sex, race, ethnicity, or geographic location. As such, it requires a full-throated community response—involving each and every one of us at some level. And that response must be based on and steeped in compassion.

# February 24 E vensong: Time of Devotion and Contemplation

On Sunday, February 24 at 4:00 PM, The Saint Mary Choir, Saint Cecilia and Hand Bell Choirs will offer their loving gifts in a greatly treasured Anglican tradition: the choral evensong service. While in Washington DC recently, we were fortunate to attend the daily (!) evensong service at the Washington National Cathedral. At first, I was looking forward to observing this wonderful rite in the huge Gothic nave of the Cathedral. But since there were not that many people in attendance during week days, the service was held in the beautifully intimate lower chapel of Bethlehem. The splendid men's chorus of the cathedral, and one contralto, led the musical portions of that particular day and the experience made me realize why the evensong service is so unique and greatly needed in our times. The nature of the early evening prayers, texts and musical settings all encourage one to quietly take a deep breath, be still, contemplate without even thinking about it, and meditate on the ancient messages and songs of tranquility and giving thanks.

So I invite you to savor a special time when you can let the trials and tribulations of this world melt away, as we gather together singing hymns and songs about the close of the day: hymn 25 based on the wonderful melody of Thomas Tallis, (O gracious Light, Lord Jesus Christ, in you the Father's glory shone; now sunset comes, but light shines forth, the lamps are lit to pierce the night); the ancient Phos Hilaron, sung by the Saint Cecilia and Hand Bell Choirs under the direction of Priscilla Rigg (O gracious Light, pure brightness of the everlasting Father, now as we come to the setting of the sun, and our eyes behold the vesper light, we sing your praises, O God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit); and the closing hymn 662 Abide with me: fast falls the eventide. #### 2019 Class for Confirmation, Reaffirmation and Reception

<u>Concerning the Service of Confirmation</u> (from the BCP, p. 412): In the course of their Christian development, those baptized at an early age are expected, when they are ready and have been duly prepared, to make a mature public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptism and to receive the laying on of hands by the bishop. Those baptized as adults, unless baptized with laying on of hands by a bishop, are also expected to make a public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptism in the presence of a bishop and to receive the laying on of hands.

#### **Who are candidates for Confirmation?**

- 1. Those who have been baptized.
- 2. Those who are ready to make a public statement of their identity as a follower of Jesus.
- 3. Those who are between 14 and 100 years of age. Each young person must at least currently be in high school.

#### Who are candidates for Reception?

- 1. Those who have been baptized and confirmed in another tradition that also has bishops in apostolic succession.
- 2. Those who wish to make a public statement of their identity as a member of The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion.



#### Who are candidates for Reaffirmation?

- 1. Those who have already been confirmed by an Episcopal or Anglican bishop.
- 2. Those who feel called, after time away from the church or after an important life transition, to make a public statement about their renewed commitment to Christ.
- 3. Those who desire our Bishop to lay hands upon them and to pray for the Holy Spirit to strengthen and uphold them.

If you are one who fits any of these three categories, and if you feel led to pursue Confirmation, Reception or Reaffirmation, please contact Fr. Nathan soon as a new class begins to form. Details of this class will depend on the make-up of the group.

#### The Gospel of the Amaryllis

by Merle Marie Troeger

I bought myself a perfect Christmas gift this year. It consisted of a flower pot, some potting soil and a dry, rather unattractive bulb with scraggly, crooked roots. The whole thing came with instructions: put two inches of potting soil in the pot and place the bulb inside, pack more soil around the roots and add water.

"You will soon be rewarded with spectacular blooms" the instructions continued. We didn't have to wait long. If you've ever grown an amaryllis yourself, you know how quickly the bulb produces green

shoots, a long stalk and then glorious huge blossoms. It's almost three feet high and I've had to prop up the whole thing with a garden stake. It looks as though there will be at least four blooms and more after that.

As hardy as the amaryllis is, it needs proper growing conditions. It needs to be kept in a relatively warm place but not in direct sunlight. It needs to be fertilized every month. It **shouldn't be over**-watered and it should be protected from drafts. The plants grow toward the light so it helps to turn the plant regularly so the stem remains straight.

When the blooms have finally faded, that's not the end. The instructions tell me to continue fertilizing every month. When Spring comes, I am to put the pot outside. Then, in early Fall, I will remove the bulb from the pot and let it completely dry out in a cool, dry place. In early December, I'll start over again. I'll put two inches of potting soil in a pot and place the bulb in the pot, spreading out its roots, packing more soil around the roots and watering.



Why do I call this whole process a "Gospel?" Well, it seems like good news to me when, in the dead of winter, a huge bloom appears to let me know the abundant, glorious life is waiting there in that homely bulb. You can make up your own interpretation of this Gospel. What might the bare bulb mean for you? How does that transformation into glamorous flower seem like a new life to you? Where is the next stalk coming from? Who and what fertilizes your religious imagination? How will you protect and care for your faith? What does it mean for you that the flowers fade? What does it mean that, with careful tending, the whole cycle of beauty will be repeated? What prayer arises in your heart? What commitments do you want to make? Whom do you want to thank?
