From our Rector: After all, what does EPISCOPAL mean?



Episcopal is an adjective derived from the ancient Greek word *episkopos* which can be translated as overseer, watcher, guardian, protector or guide. Over time this word came to refer to bishops who are called to serve in this capacity within a local church. In the early days of our American republic, this term was chosen to replace *Anglican* as the best descriptive term for our particular branch of Christ's Church. Anglican refers to our origins in the English church, whereas Episcopal explains that we are organized in the same way as the early church. We are gathered in unity around our Bishop. This is what it means to be Episcopal.

Therefore, it stands to reason that the process of choosing our Bishop is very important! All of you get to participate in this process at a specially called Parish Meeting on **Sunday, October 14, at 9:30 AM**. In place of our adult Formation groups, we will have this meeting with only one goal: to elect delegates who will attend our diocesan Electing Convention in Bangor on February 9 (with a snow date of February 23). We will elect 4 delegates and 4 alternates for this Convention. Meeting together with delegates from every other parish in Maine and with all of our clergy, this Convention in February will also have only one goal: to prayerfully select our next Bishop from a slate of candidates presented by the Discernment Committee.

So mark **October 14** on your calendar and ask God whether or not YOU are being called to represent Saint Mary's at this Electing Convention. Bring your name or the names of others you wish to nominate. All nominations will come from the floor on

Dear Friends,

As I write this, I am listening to the sounds of children, including my grandchildren, playing outside on a gorgeous early fall day. My daughter, Laura, had hip replacement surgery five days ago and is already able to move carefully around her house with her walker, which is decorated with bright pink unicorn tape! Anyone who knows me knows that I am immensely proud of my daughter who is a major in the Army Nurse Corps, currently stationed at the West Point Military Academy. She is a wife, a wonderful mom, a consummate professional, and fiercely independent. Fiercely!! It is one of the many qualities I admire about her. I came to stay with her during the early stages of her recovery to help in whatever way I can.

It is difficult to be in a position of needing help especially for someone who is used to taking care of themself and everyone else both at work and at home. We think we should do for ourselves. We think if we receive help it means we are weak

or inadequate. It makes us feel vulnerable. When we want to help, it is frustrating to have our offers refused or brushed aside. We all need to be needed sometimes.

We were created by God to live together in community. We are not meant to live alone without the companionship and care of others. We need each other. Relationships are complex and take time and love to develop and deepen. Those relationships make life fuller and more meaningful. It is not an easy thing to ask for help, to admit we can't always do everything ourselves, to be humble enough to be vulnerable. In doing so, we have the opportunity to give the helper the gift of helping by making a meal or offering a ride or just being present. It feels so good to be able to help and to know that our efforts are important to someone else. It is a gift to be able to be" Grammy" and to support my daughter and her family. I will admit, however, that I am not as young as I used to be!

We met on Wednesday, September 19th. Treasurer Bill Gowen reported that the Budget and Finance Committee had its first meeting to start the 2019 budget process. At the end of summer, we continue to be able to meet our obligations. Thank you to all who support our mission and ministries so strongly. Our 2019 Stewardship effort will kick off in October.

The Bishop Electing Convention will be held on Saturday February 9, 2019 (Snow day: February 23, 2019) in Bangor. The Outreach Committee expresses its thanks to all those who participated either online or on paper in the survey regarding St. Mary's Mission Mornings. Ten percent of active parishioners responded and while at first blush this does not seem like many, we are told by those who do such surveys that this is an average result

The statistical findings of the survey follow below. The respondents were very largely satisfied with the program as it exists, held on three Sunday mornings directly following the 8am Eucharist as the alternative form of worship to the 10am (now 10:15am) service. We were delighted that several respondents who had not yet participated in Mission Morning are interested in doing so. While we heard from only a few families with children, those who responded were positive about their experiences.

Mission Morning Survey Details

Of the 40 people who responded to the Mission Morning Survey, 80 percent have participated in the special outreach program. Their primary reasons: it enabled them to fulfill Christ's calling to help others and to join others to do good works.

The activities that interested responders ranged from "parishioners in need" and "people who are hungry" (24 for both) to "youth at detention centers" (15) with the rest somewhere in between. Only 4 said none of the activities interested them.

One person commented: "I wish I could still physically go out to take part in those activities but am glad to join in gentler activities in the auditorium. Have met and gotten to know other parishioners this way. An added bonus."

Of the 8 people who have never participated, 6 said they would participate in the future. Two of those who had participated in the past were not interested in any of the proposed activities.

Few parents of children at Saint Mary's responded to the survey. The vast majority of respondents do not have children under 18. There were no responses to the question about why "my children don't participate." However, one parent responded to that question: "N/A. We love to participate." Those parents who said their children *did* participate cited the importance of helping others (6) and instilling Christian values (4).

Nearly all respondents who had attended Mission Mornings were satisfied with the brief worship service. The response was mixed about the regathering time after the mission.

Asked whether they would participate in a longer, single activity, 42.5 percent said they were unsure, 37.5 percent said yes, 20 percent said no.

Of the respondents, 60 percent attend the 10:15 AM service, 40 percent attend the 8 AM service.

Committee Seeks Ideas for Annual Grants

The Outreach Committee is charged with distributing the funds allocated from the Saint Mary's budget to be spent on community service programs and non-profit organizations, as well as our mission programs. This year the sum we have remaining to spend is about \$9000.

In the past, we have given to national and international organizations as well as local. We hope to increasingly focus this year on financial support for the mission activities that our parishioners work on together. These include Souper Supper, Saint Elizabeth's Essentials pantry, and visits at the Long Creek youth prison facility in South Portland, among others.

Last year, we gave to these organizations, as well as sending funds to international hurricane relief efforts, and support for the ethnic Rohingya Muslim minority facing genocide in Myanmar.

We welcome suggestions from parishioners on projects they would like the committee to consider, particularly those on which they work on in the community.

Centering Prayer

Jesus' disciples asked him, "Teach us to pray." My experience of centering prayer began years ago when I attended six classes in which I was "taught" centering prayer. It may seem odd to think that we must "learn" to pray, but it was true, at least for me. Over the weeks, we "practiced" centering prayer. I was so easily distracted. My "sacred word" didn't seem to settle me for long. I was very conscious of the other people around me trying to "center." I was working hard, but I felt I was "failing" the class in centering prayer. Only later did I realize that there was my ego trying and trying to "succeed" in this practice. I was putting all my effort into getting an "A" in prayer! I wish, at the very beginning of this process, someone had told what a wise spiritual director told me later: "There is never a time when nothing is happening."

I continued to practice centering prayer after the classes ended. Gradually, I let my ego take a break from trying to succeed. I began to appreciate in my heart a Bible verse I had read or heard hundreds of times. God is the "one in whom we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28). This prayer is not about achieving; it's about being with God.

Centering prayer is a way of opening up our awareness of God. We open our heart and mind – our whole being- to God, the ultimate mystery, who is beyond thoughts and words. And if we need an incentive, there are at least two assumptions at the heart of centering prayer:

God is always present and willing to be accessible to us.

There is never a time when nothing is happening (whether we consciously know it or not).

What is Evensong and Compline?

We are excited about some upcoming services at Saint Mary's that we hope will be of interest to all and that folks will attend. Beginning Thursday, September 20, at 6:45 PM, and each Thursday thereafter, in the Father James Chapel there will be a service of Compline. And on Sunday, October 21 at 4 pm in the sanctuary, we will celebrate a great Anglican tradition: Choral Evensong.

These two services date from the early church, when groups of Christians (usually brothers and nuns in monasteries) would gather together to worship during the day, starting early in the morning and ending at night time before bed. These short services became known as the divine office hours and were known as: Matins, Lauds, Terce, Sext, None, Vespers, and Compline. The services included chanting psalms as well as specific prayers for each time of the day.



The Church of England adapted this tradition, and these services are in our Book of Common Prayer: Morning Prayer, Noonday Prayer (celebrated at Saint Mary's in the Father James Chapel each week Monday through Thursday), Evening Prayer, and Compline.

The Compline service is particularly beautiful, which is one reason why we are introducing the music for this service to Saint Mary's Royal School of Church Music choirs during their rehearsals on Thursdays during Common Ground. It is a perfect way to unwind and enter into a spirit of quiet prayer and meditation. There are gentle hymns of thanksgiving that we seldom sing on Sunday mornings because they are meant for the end of the day. There is also the wonderful song of Simeon: 'Lord, you have now set your servant free to go in peace as you have promised; for these eyes of mine have seen the Savior.'

The choral Evensong is unique to our Episcopal tradition. It has been adapted from the early church's vespers service, and we are excited that this marvelous service will be offered at Saint Mary's on Oct. 21. The Cathedral Church of Saint Luke celebrates choral evensong on the first Sunday of every month at 4 p.m., and we



will be hosting a field trip for the RSCM choirs to attend their choral evensong service on October 7.

Our evensong will begin with the service of light (Book of Common Prayer, p. 109-112) in which the choir and clergy will process into the dimly lit church for the lighting of candles as we all sing: 'Jesus Christ is the light of the world, the light no darkness can overcome,' accompanied by the Saint Mary Hand Bell Choir. Then there is the ancient song 'O Gracious Light' (Phos hilaron) sung by the RSCM choir and hand bells on the beautiful text: 'O gracious Light, pure brightness of the ever-living Father in heaven, now as we come to the setting of the sun, and our eyes behold the vesper light, we sing your praises. O God.'

There is always the singing of psalms at Evensong, and the choirs at Saint Mary's will sing the appointed psalm on Oct. 21 using another great tradition: Anglican chant, in which the lines of the psalm are chanted with full

chords (four different voices). Every Evensong includes the great Song of Mary - the Magnificat (My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior) and the Song of Simeon, and the choir will sing a setting by the great English master, Herbert Howells.



The 9:30 - 10:00 formation time perfectly complemented our lessons as we were able to enact parts of the Creation story by harvesting some of God's vegetable crea-


tions from our garden and learning more about the history of the stitching of our Creation Kneelers.

If you've seen our Subaru Forester around town or in the church parking lot, you may have noticed my one and only bumper sticker. It says GIPGIL. In small print underneath is the explanation.

GO IN PEACE, GO IN LOVE

The acronym comes from a sweet song my composer friend Sally Ann Morris set to a rousing tune. The words are simple:

Go in peace, Go in love, Go to seek, Go to serve. Go in hope

To work and pray, And God goes with you all the way!

I know it's not theologically very complicated and yet have you ever found a more profound ethical statement? For me it's a blueprint for how to try to live each day after the pattern of Christ. Every time I get in my car it's a reminder that there are some basics I need to remember.

Peace – Peace is not just the absence of conflict. It's also the conviction that all people are entitled to physical and emotional safety.

Love – Sometimes that means tough love. And sometimes that means speaking truth to power.

Seek – We are as often seekers as we are finders. Our questions are often the pathway to a fuller knowledge of God and God's kingdom.

Serve – It's an everyday thing.

Hope - God has hope in us just as we have hope in God.

Work – Work is necessary to keep food on the table, and it's also part of participating in and even bringing about God's kingdom.

Pray – Praying turns out to be an attitude as much as anything else.

(*Play* – When I first heard the song, I heard "play" instead of "pray.") Our play may take us to unexpected places to be with unexpected people.

And God goes with you all the way! – "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Garden Redesign

Our first year's work on redesign is complete! The St. Mary's Garden Club work is being done in partnership with Saint Mary's Church and is the first major redesign of the garden in over 85 years. The Garden Club appreciates the many benefits of our long-standing relationship with the church and readily endorsed this major three-year project. Redesign was initiated for a number of reasons - the Garden Club is required in club Bylaws to maintain the garden, the parish house addition blocked the main approach to the garden, the garden wasn't handicapped accessible, the predominately perennial design re-



quired high maintenance and the prospect of a redesign project and associated educational opportunities are enticing!

This year, the church removed evergreen trees in the area, and the Garden Club hired Gnome to prepare the main beds and install a walkway into the garden. Note that the garden's entrance is visible as one enters or exits the church. The gravel path is ADA compliant so accessible to all. The lawn was graded and sections were seeded. Trees and shrubs were installed, and six Montmorency cherry trees serve as a backdrop for the garden.

In 2019, the church will remove the invasive burning bush hedge bordering the rectory. The Garden Club will plant arborvitae as a privacy screen in front of the rectory porch along with additional adjacent plantings. Over the winter the church will design replacement plantings or fencing for the section near the rectory's entrance.

In our final year, 2020, the Garden Club will pull up the attractive carpeting along the far stonewall – carpeting that is hopefully exterminating a large patch of bishop's weed. The area will be seeded for grass and finally, a sitting area and rededicated small garden will be installed along the walkway. It will provide a quiet area for reflection or conversation, entice members into the garden, and complete the redesign.

Kneeler Guild Coffee Hour a Success!

The Kneeler Guild, under the direction of Jan Mordarski, gave the parish family a rare and wonderful gift after both services on September 16th when members displayed a number of kneelers and honored Hannah Russell and all stitchers for their gifts of time, talent, and treasure to our beloved Saint Mary's.

A fascinating and rich history provided in a beautifully designed [by Jan] trifold brochure was available to teach us of our heritage.

Hannah arrived with her son and daughter-in-law, Ben and Nancy Russell, and the three were present after both services to meet and greet parishioners and for all of us to honor Hannah, Helga Ryder, Grace and David Robinson, and so many others ~ nearly 100 stitchers ~ who,

over the years, have given so much to beautify and sanctify our house of worship. It was Hannah, the historian, however, who researched every flower, animal, border on each kneeler to be sure it was biblically based. It was Hannah who designed and painted each canvas in preparation for the stitchers to begin her/his work.

Be sure to visit the sacristy and see the framed piece of needlepoint that honors Hannah and all who have stitched kneelers.

A craft that goes back to the 1800s at Saint Mary's, Hannah's mother, Dorothy Talbot, and other church women were avid stitchers. Hannah would have been taught the art from the time she was a young girl. In fact,



the wedding stained glass window in the narthex [when you enter the church to your immediate right] depicts Hannah and John Russell at their wedding!!

Amazingly, each of the 150 kneelers requires 75,068 stitches and represents over 200 hours of work.

We are all deeply indebted to the work of Debby Hammond, who not only led the guild prior to Jan's becoming chair, but who has documented the history of the kneelers and the stitchers. Debby has created a record of the ages for the ages that only one with Debby's skill set and devotion could accomplish.

Also, many thanks to George Barrett who made the wooden frames within our kneelers. George has laid the groundwork and foundation for much at Saint Mary's.

The Kneeler Guild offered us a precious glimpse into Saint Mary's past... and our present. It was a wonderful experience to step back in time to learn of our rich heritage and all that the stitchers have given us.
