From our Rector:

The Divine Calling to Hospitality



"When I receive Christ in you, I am obliged to care for Christ with full attention." Abba Cassian

Summer on the coast of Maine is absolutely glorious. THIS is why we persevere through the painfully slow months of March and April. I have learned that summer here has its own rhythms and patterns. Many of us will welcome guests who are coming here to experience a taste of this summertime beauty and delight with which we are blessed.

No matter where we are, or what our situation, the task of hospitality is a commandment of God that we

are pledged to keep. We first learn of this from the stories of Abraham and Sarah who exemplify the divine calling to practice hospitality. Since the very beginning of the church, the saints of God have understood that each guest who comes to us is a sign of the presence of Christ. It may be difficult to view each guest in this way, but this manner of seeing others is a vital aspect of the transformation that God is working within each of our hearts. And it does not even matter whether the guest is someone we like or someone we try to avoid, whether the person is "one of our kind" or quite different from us. Our subjective feelings only get in the way of keeping this commandment. The objective reality that our faith teaches us is the presence of Christ in each guest, regardless of who he or she appears to be on the outside.

As Abba Cassian said at the beginning of the fifth century, to receive Christ in a guest is to put aside our self-interests and to care for this person with full attention.

Holy Ground



One of the most common metaphors for our spiritual lives is the notion of the "spiritual journey". When we draw on this image, we imagine the place we have left behind and a destination up ahead. It captures the idea that our relationship with God is not static.

Yet, at the Diocesan Adult Retreat at Bishopswood in June, I had the opportunity to revisit the story of Moses at the burning bush. So right now, I want to remind ourselves to honor the places where we stand right now – not in our past or up ahead.

I'm sure you remember most of the story. Like the rest of us, Moses was just doing his job. He was simply tending his flock. He had no particular spiritual pathway in mind. Then, what a shock! An angel appeared to him as a flame of fire leaping from ordinary shrubbery. Yet the bush wasn't consumed by the fire. The sight intrigued Moses and he stepped closer.

The word Moses heard from the burning bush is the word I need to remember every day of my life:



"The place where you are standing is holy ground."

The place where I am standing – right now - is holy ground.

The place where you are reading this is holy ground.

The work you are doing this very minute (your equivalent of herding sheep) is holy ground.

The people you meet today are citizens of holy ground.

Moses was a nervous wreck when he faced God in the burning bush (you can read about it in Exodus 3), but he rallied to bring his people out of Egypt.

Standing on holy ground was just the beginning for him. So, you might want to keep an eye out for the burning bush in your life today. When you see it, step closer. You stand on holy ground.

Thank you for keeping your pledges current!

Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

The Vestry met on June 27th. Father Nathan began the meeting with a teaching moment outlining the purpose and process of the General Convention, which will convene in Austin, Texas on 7/5. We welcomed Merle Marie Troeger, a parishioner and a member of the Discernment Committee for the Bishop selection process. She shared that there's been a lot of interest in the position of Bishop of Maine. The committee will spend the summer reviewing the applications and interviewing applicants with the goal of electing a new bishop in February 2019.

Treasurer Bill Gowen couldn't be in attendance, so Jim Kane reported on the current financial position. We are in good shape for this point of the year. We benefited from a larger than normal amount of prepaid pledges for 2018. In addition, good budget and financial management has helped us tremendously. However, we are heading into a time when weekly giving drops off due to summer vacations. Parishioners catch up in the late summer. Our Farm-to-Table Dinner and Auction in August is important to our revenue side. Our pledge total for 2018 is \$283,287. We have received new pledges from new parishioners recently. We are grateful for all of the support we receive from our parishioners!

The Budget and Finance Committee is proposing that going forward all unrestricted bequests be divided in thirds with 1/3 going into the JM Brown Fund, 1/3 going into the Building and Grounds endowment fund, and 1/3 going into the Program endowment. This policy helps ensure that we are good stewards of what's been given to us. We reviewed the proposal and will vote on the proposal at our August meeting. Anyone interested in reading the details of the proposal can contact Bill Gowen or Senior Warden Jim Kane for a copy. We welcome comments from all.

Father Nathan reviewed the new schedule for the fall. Sunday services will be at 8 and 10:15 beginning on 9/9. This allows for greater formation for all ages on Sunday morning between services. We will be offering an Episcopal 101 class, possible centering prayer or meditation,



and other specialty programs. Thursday nights, beginning on 9/20 will be Faith Family Suppers from 5-7. We'll offer a casual supper from 5-6 and from 6-7 we will host topical programs that will include mission-related topics, issues facing our communities and special study periods during Advent and Lent. Anyone interested in being part of a planning committee should contact Jim Kane or Janet Bowne.

Father Nathan is leaving for the final segment of his sabbatical on 7/9. He and his family will travel to Quito, Ecuador for 5 weeks.

We discussed that we need a new head for our Hospitality Committee. After 10 years, Anne LaFond is stepping down to focus on her New Mainer Committee work. We appreciate Anne's long tenure of running hospitality. Anyone interested in serving in this role should contact Jim Kane. We also discussed the need to have a Middlers program this fall. We need 2 leaders to work with Megan Akers, Director of Christian Formation, to design a program that will likely pair with a Falmouth ecumenical effort to offer service-related activities for middle school children.

As Wardens, we thank the members of the Vestry for their service, guidance and vision.



Although summer is here and that means longer days, doing things more slowly and simply and taking time to reflect on our bestowed blessings. Guiding RAY is busy planning for the fall. 

As I enjoy Your creation, create in me a pure heart and a hunger and a thirst for You. Amen.


Saint Mary's Garden Redesign

We are fortunate to have the Saint Mary's Garden Club (SMGC) affiliated with our church. The SMGC was organized in June 1930 and was originally composed of only Saint Mary's members. In recent years, the SMGC broadened to include garden enthusiasts from the broader community. Among many projects it undertakes annually, the SMGC maintains the perennial garden between the chapel and the rectory. Recently, the garden club's membership realized that the garden's design has not been refreshed in many years. Plantings have aged, and light conditions have changed as trees matured or were removed. The large pine in the middle of the garden has taken a toll on the grassy area. Ants have taken up residence, and the soil is severely depleted. The SMGC decided a complete redesign is needed. Working with its talented membership, the SMGC has voted to support a redesign which will be a three-year project and a \$15,000 investment by the garden club for installation of the entrance path, grading, dropping loam and seeding.

The SMGC approached the Vestry to discuss and gain support for this wonderful project. It is clear that this redesign will enhance our outdoor space significantly for individual prayer and reflection as well as events and

garden tours. There are elements of the project that will need to be managed by the church including removal of trees that are affecting light and ground quality. The SMGC also strongly urged us to remove the burning bush hedge at the Rectory as burning bush is invasive and will take over the new garden space rendering the redesign ineffective. We will need to replace the hedge with plants and/ or hardscapes that are sustainable. Over three years, we anticipate the church's commitment to be approximately \$4,000. The Vestry approved the project with the provision that we will raise money separately for the expenses incurred in 2018. We prefer to fund all of our needs on a priority basis through the budget with income from pledges, fundraisers and investments. The opportunity to receive such generous funding from the SMGC and realizing how the redesign will allow for greater use of our outdoor space is something we cannot overlook. We have received some early designated donations for this project from parishioners supplementing what SMGC have already pledged.


