From our Sabbatical Pastor



Set me as a seal upon your heart, as a seal upon your arm; for love is strong as death, passion fierce as the grave. Its flashes are flashes of fire, a raging flame. Many waters cannot quench love, neither can floods drown it.

(Song of Songs 8:6-7)

If these words sound familiar, it may be that you tuned in recently to the royal wedding between Prince Harry and Meghan Markle, now the Duke and Duchess of Sussex. And even if you weren't watching the royal wedding, you've probably heard these words pronounced at other weddings, as they are part of the classic nuptial canon.

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry gave the sermon at the royal wedding, and in doing so our Presiding Bishop, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, quickly became a much more visible public figure. He earned coveted spots on *Good Morning America* and the *Today Show*, and was even spoofed on *Saturday Night Live*. He is already a rock star among Episcopalians, but there are less than 2 million of us. Now many millions more have heard from arguably our most dynamic preacher. But more important than his personal dynamism is the fact that people the world over heard a reminder of the powerful force that is love. "Many waters cannot quench love, neither can floods drown it."

This message of love was not a romantic one. Instead, it was a reminder that true love takes on a power that can move mountains. Bishop Curry did not shy away from the realities of the world – he did not present love as a fairy tale that takes place in a fantasy world of sunbeams and cloud castles. Instead, he located the power of love in some of the most painful moments of US history. Love is the power that slaves tapped into as they struggled to make it through each day, the "balm of Gilead." Love is the power that Dr. Martin Luther King tapped into in order to change hearts and minds and lives.

AUTUMNAL ADJUSTMENTS

When September comes, there will be a few minor adjustments and new offerings here at Saint Mary's. This is a wonderful and active Christian community. I and my family are privileged to be part of it along with all of you. At the same time, there are ways in which we need to grow – particularly in the areas of intentional spiritual formation and discipleship. In my opinion, we offer worship to God with excellence and care and beauty. This is where we shine. But there are few other regular times when our parish family gathers together to study, to learn, to pray, and to discuss things of real importance. Times like this are vital for us to grow in our understanding of God's claim on our lives, and to grow deeper in our connections with one another.



Therefore, beginning September 9, we will implement a slight shift in our Sunday morning schedule in order to accomplish these goals. The overall Sunday schedule for the school year will look like this:

8:00 am: Contemplative Eucharist (Rite 1 or Rite 2)

9:15 am: Choir practices (adults and youth)
9:30 am: Christian Formation for all ages

10:15 am: Choral Eucharist

As always, coffee and snacks will be offered after each Eucharist and throughout the morning. This schedule shift will give the adults in our community a solid 30 minutes between 9:30 to 10 am for small groups to gather for Bible study, book study, storytelling, centering prayer, outreach conversations, Episcopal Church 101 and seasonal events. I am really excited about the possibilities that this will enable for Saint Mary's. If you have a group that you would like to facilitate or to see offered, please send me an email or reach out to your wardens.

We are going to add one other regular gathering as well. There is nothing like sharing a meal together to build community. On Thursday evenings at 5 pm, we will gather for potluck-style Faith Family Suppers. Food will be available anytime until 6 pm, when folks will be invited to special groups for study and practice. Our Royal School of Church Music choir will study and rehearse at 6 pm. Advent and Lenten study groups will meet at that time, and other book study groups and committee meetings will also meet at 6 pm. By coordinating these rehearsals and meetings around a common meal that is open to all, we will create a regular critical mass of our community when ministry will take place.

These adjustments are intended to help us accomplish our mission of "building authentic, vibrant, Christ-centered community" where we celebrate, honor and serve together. With your support, I am confident that these adjustments will bear good and sustainable fruit that will result in the growth of our parish family. Thank you in advance for being open to trying new things together!

Vestry Highlights from your Wardens

We met on May 16th. Father Nathan led us in a meditation about being busy. He's on the second phase of his sabbatical and will be back in the office at the end of June

Jim Stoddard was our guest for the meeting representing the Building and Grounds Committee. He shared some updates on projects for the spring. The roof and porch of the Rectory were repaired. The main church doors have been removed and taken to be refinished. Temporary doors have been installed until the doors are returned. Jim shared a general project list that includes items that we need to do but do not have the funds for at this time. They have spoken to a contractor about a sound system for the church. The cost is quite high although we might be able to apply for a grant as long as we can demonstrate the need is not primarily for religious purposes. We host many recitals and concerts open to the general public. It's a long shot but worth pursuing.

Financial update

We are at \$280,000+ toward our pledge goal of \$285,000. We have added several new members since the first of the year so we are close to the goal. Giving has been strong, and we are very appreciative of our generous parishioners. During the summer months, giving drops off a bit since people are away. They catch up in September, but it can mean the summer months are lean. We will be reminding folks to stay on top of their giving while they enjoy the summer. Many people do automatic bank transfers so their pledges keep coming.

Farm-to-Table Dinner and Auction

Saturday, August 18th is the date. The dinner is shaping up to feature the best of Maine's bounty. We are collecting auction items. Please consider an item or experience to donate. We'll have auction forms available in the June AVE and around the Parish Hall.

Fall Schedule

We are making some changes to the Fall Schedule. Beginning on Sunday, September 9th with Kick Off Sunday, the 10 a.m. service will move to 10:15. This will allow us to offer regular formation classes for all ages between the two Sunday services. We are also offering a Faith Family Fellowship Thursday experience, which will encourage committee and guilds to meet in the late afternoon. The RSCM choirs will rehearse on Thursdays as well. We will host a casual potluck from 5-6 with a program following from 6-7. Adult Choir Rehearsal will start as usual at 7. Anyone with thoughts on programming from 6-7 should speak with Jim Kane or Janet Bowne.



Garden Redesign (see page 12-13 for more details) The Garden redesign project is being well received. It's a partnership with the Saint Mary's Garden Club and will take three years to complete. The Garden Club is funding roughly \$15,000 of the renovation. The church will fund removal of trees and invasive species such as burning bush. We have received some dedicated gifts to support our efforts.

Nominating

The graduating class of Vestry members form the Nominating Committee for 2018. They will begin work on slating new members over the summer with the nomination season happening in the early fall.

Outreach Committee

The Outreach Committee is having a committeelevel discussion on their structure and operation. They wrote a letter with the hopes of encouraging committees and guilds to be more Christ-centered with suggestions to the Parish Leadership to consider:

- They would like help from the Rector to encourage and make space for grappling/reflection and weaving this into sermons, writing about them in the AVE and social media.
- They would like a clearer voice in how we can respond to current events.
- Outreach may consider selecting one or more issues to highlight each year, bringing experts to speak to an issue. They cite the New Mainers program as an example.

They would like to see guilds and committees to encourage prayer and reflection to ensure we are all remaining Christ-centered.

Praying the Questions



l attended a baptism not long ago. We were away from home, attending another church, so we didn't know the family or the child. Little Ethan was adorable and slept through most of the service, waking only briefly when the water fell on his face.

For some reason I was paying more attention than usual to the prayer immediately after the baptism: *Give him an inquiring and discerning heart*. Strange, I first thought, that the heart would be the seat of inquiry. But no, I looked at the prayer book again just now to be sure. It definitely says *heart*. We usually think of the mind as the place where we wrestle with the big issues. Yet this prayer insists that the heart asks the questions.

I like a religion that prays for questions. Sticking with the same pat answers gets boring. I'd go further. Sticking with the same pat answers isn't faithful to a God who is always unfolding new wonders and revealing new worlds to us. So I say hurrah for the questions, the doubt that prompts the questions, the changing life circumstances that make the old answers unsatisfactory after awhile.

Living with unanswered questions about God can be unsettling, though, I realize. So here's a thought that's not original with me. What if it is God who has given you the questions? (Thank you, Brother Curtis Almquist.) If living with the questions is uneasy, think of them as originating in the One in whom all unanswered questions are laid to rest.



How will your heart discern the possible responses to the questions your heart asks? You may need some help. You don't have to work it all out on your own. Speak to a friend. Make an appointment with a clergy person. Join a Bible study or a prayer group. Try spiritual direction. You might even be moved to sign up for Education for Ministry. Whatever you do, make sure you say a prayer of thanks for your inquiring heart.

Outreach Ministry - All Ages Serving Near and Far

In Her Presence by Becky Pride

A good number of Saint Mary's women and friends have been teaching female immigrants in Portland Public Library every Saturday morning this school year.

We started teaching English to young immigrant mothers enrolled in the "In Her Presence" initiative in October, and we just held our final class on May 19th. Our last class was a final conversational assessment of each woman. Four lead teachers in pairs, Susan Schraft and Merle Marie Troeger, and Anne LaFond and Becky Pride, listened to each woman talk about country or family, while Judith Brooks, Molly Felton, Mandy Garmey, Caroline Knott, and Ginny Stelk helped the other students in the class with their writing and conversa-

tional skills. After our assessments, we had cake and ice cream and then passed out personalized Certificates of Achievement. The women were so excited to be recognized and celebrated!

We teachers couldn't be prouder of our 16 new Mainers who worked so hard during the course and improved dramatically in their understanding and usage of the English language. It feels true for all of us teachers that we learned and received far more than



we gave. The sense of accomplishment, encouragement, and friendship that has grown out of our experience together with these remarkable immigrant women has been priceless.

WELCOME, NEW MAINERS EVENT

What an interesting, informative, and moving event we had on Sunday, May 20! Our *Welcome, New Mainers* fourth event of the year focused on mentoring asylum seekers. Asylum seekers are fleeing war, political turmoil and personal danger in their native countries, so they arrive in Maine often alone, with nothing but the clothes they are wearing. Nancy Markowitz spoke about *Welcoming the Stranger*, an organization created to respond to the rising number of immigrant families seeking political asylum in Greater Portland. Welcoming the Stranger finds volunteer families or individuals willing to enter into a mentoring "friendship." Helping someone learn English, write a resume, use the bus system, navigate the schools, or just taking a family for ice cream...mentoring can be many different things. Nancy emphasized how hugely rewarding and beneficial this experience is for both the mentor and the mentee.



Lucky Hollander of *Hopeful Links* works with local organizations to identify young people from war-torn countries arriving in Maine unaccompanied by parents or loved ones. Lucky introduced us to a young man from Burundi and his mentor "mom" Blanche Belliveau. Blanche spoke about how this young man has enriched the lives of her whole family since he came to live with them. He speaks 7 languages, including English, is an ex-

cellent student at Deering High School, and like many mentees that Lucky has placed, he is motivated to excel and find a good career.

The evening ended with a powerful and moving recitation of poems by Allan Monga, Maine's "Poetry Out Loud" champion. Allan is 18 and arrived in Maine last July from Zambia. Alone and speaking little English, he enrolled in Deering High School and with the help of dedicated teachers, found a passion for reciting poetry. Allan recited two poems, "America" by Claude McKay and "She Walks in Beauty" by Lord Byron, George Gordon. Allan filled the room with his powerful presence and voice.


Garden Redesign

We are fortunate to have the Saint Mary's Garden Club (SMGC) affiliated with our church. The SMGC was organized in June 1930 and was originally composed of only Saint Mary's members. In recent years, the SMGC broadened to include garden enthusiasts from the broader community. Among many projects it undertakes annually, the SMGC maintains the perennial garden between the chapel and the rectory. Recently, the garden club's membership realized that the garden's design has not been refreshed in many years. Plantings have aged, and light conditions have changed as trees matured or were removed. The large pine in the middle of the garden has taken a toll on the grassy area. Ants have taken up residence, and the soil is severely depleted. The SMGC decided a complete redesign is needed. Working with its talented membership, the SMGC has voted to support a redesign which will be a three-year project and a \$15,000 investment by the garden club for installation of the entrance path, grading, dropping loam and seeding.

The SMGC approached the Vestry to discuss and gain support for this wonderful project. It is clear that this redesign will enhance our outdoor space significantly for individual prayer and reflection as well as events and

garden tours. There are elements of the project that will need to be managed by the church including removal of trees that are affecting light and ground quality. The SMGC also strongly urged us to remove the burning bush hedge at the Rectory as burning bush is invasive and will take over the new garden space rendering the redesign ineffective. We will need to replace the hedge with plants and/ or hardscapes that are sustainable. Over three years, we anticipate the church's commitment to be approximately \$4,000. The Vestry approved the project with the provision that we will raise money separately for the expenses incurred in 2018. We prefer to fund all of our needs on a priority basis through the budget with income from pledges, fundraisers and investments. The opportunity to receive such generous funding from the SMGC and realizing how the redesign will allow for greater use of our outdoor space is something we cannot overlook. We have received some early designated donations for this project from parishioners supplementing what SMGC have already pledged.




