From the Rector: The Ordination and Consecration of Bishop Thomas Brown



OMG! We have a very special weekend coming up soon. At 10:30 AM on Friday, June 21, Saint Mary's is hosting a special Clergy Day with our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. At 11 AM in The Cathedral Church of Saint Luke on Saturday, June 22, Thomas Brown is to be ordained and consecrated as the tenth Bishop of the Episcopal Church in Maine. Our Presiding Bishop and a number of other bishops will be present to lay hands on Thomas and to welcome him into the House of Bishops. At 10:30 AM on Sunday, June 23, the Presiding Bishop is the guest preacher at The Temple at Ocean Park. This will be a special time of celebration, but there are limited opportunities for everyone to participate. Here are some details on how you can be part of this weekend.

Friday, June 21, Clergy Day: Sorry, but this will be for diocesan clergy only.

Saturday, June 22, Episcopal Consecration: Only 8 tickets are available for Saint Marians! If you want a ticket, you must call Beth Shaw in our office before the end of day on June 5. Names will be drawn lottery-style on June 6. You will also be able to watch this entire event at home by visiting the website: http://www.episcopalmaine.org/. Here you will also be able to download the liturgy program so that you can participate, read and sing along.

Sunday, June 23, Second Sunday after Pentecost: There are a number of celebrations to consider.

Saint Mary's: We will gather for our usual summer Eucharists at 8 and 9:30 AM. At 10:30, we will begin a LiveStream in the Auditorium of the Presiding Bishop's event at Ocean Park. During Coffee Hour, we can watch and listen together.

The Temple at Ocean Park: You can register in advance to attend in person with the Presiding Bishop. But given the limited seating and parking available there, Saint Mary's will LiveStream that worship experience in our Auditorium, as explained above.

Responding to Maine's Opioid Crisis

Education, Compassion and Community

The Maine addiction crisis affects us all, directly or indirectly. To respond effectively, we are all called upon, in community, to become well-educated about this subject and approach the challenge from a place of compassion.

Those of you who have been attending Saint Mary's series, "Responding to Maine's Opioid Crisis," know that the format includes a presentation by one or two local guest speakers with expertise to share, followed by testimonials from those offering accounts of their own addiction and recovery as well as secondary accounts from family members. Finally, there is ample time for Q and A.

Such was the case at the most recent presentation on April 28: "The Hijacked Brain: The Biology of Addiction." Our guest speaker, Dr Mark Publicker, MD, Pa., provided a vivid presentation on the quick, profound and enduring changes to the brain that come with alcohol and drug misuse. He described how, as the disease very quickly takes hold, the frontal cortex of the brain which controls judgement function is bypassed, and with it, "choice" is completely erased. He made it clear that use disorder disease is a chronic condition—as is the case with many cancers and other chronic diseases, it is subject to remissions—often many—not cure.

These facts and their consequences were arrestingly described by the three individuals providing testimonials, two of whom provided first person accounts and a third, a St. Marian, who spoke from the perspective of a parent. The courage of these speakers, all of whom had been to hell and back, was breathtaking. They spoke with such articulate simplicity, sharing not just facts but deep truths about themselves: their experiences, their pain, relationships lost or destroyed, the long road to recovery and redemptive life. Their struggles were, in each case, palpable. Yet equally compelling were their hope and desires and thankfulness as well as their clear understanding that in no way could they have traveled their road alone.

What a gift to all attending. The afternoon offered each of us an opportunity to learn, to begin to understand and perhaps take a first step towards our own personal transformation. As for this writer, God was most definitely in that room, visible to all in the eyes and the words of these incredibly brave and powerful speakers.



fee from Rwanda. There were delicious desserts, pastas, and pastries from Italy and cookies from the Root Cellar Immigrant project. Not only could everyone enjoy snacking on foods, but many bought a Middle Eastern or Ethiopian dinner to take home. The festive arts and crafts, all handmade by amazing artists from Colombia to Congo, were colorful, beautiful and represented an amazing array of talented artists. Praying with the Beatles

I had been sitting in the beautiful old church for just a few minutes - just settling in to spend some time in the beauty of holiness. Aaaaahhh. . . . I could feel my pulse dropping and my respirations slowing.

Then I heard someone whistling. The tune sounded familiar and as the person came closer I recognized it - the Beatles' "When I'm Sixty Four." It was obvious the whistler couldn't get the tune out of his head. He whistled it over and over again as he did his cleaning chores nearby. The only words I could remember at the time were "Will you still need me, will you still feed me, when I'm sixty four?"

You can You Tube or Google it yourself sometime, but you may remember it is a number sung by a young person (rumor has it that Paul McCartney wrote it when he was sixteen in honor of his father) yearning for the kind of love that will continue into old age. He imagines the commonest things: valentine, bottle of wine, sitting by the fireside, going for a Sunday ride.

That yearning and need for reassurance of love reminds me so much of our spiritual longing. How will I know God loves me? Can I depend on God - now and when I'm sixty-four? We look for a solid answer, a note stating precisely what to expect. That's certainly part of why I was sitting in that ancient church. I wanted to feel a connection to the love of the divine.

I think Paul McCartney has a theological, musical and even mystical insight. The lyrics ask "Will you still love me?" but the jolly tune provides a clear answer. Listen to the tune that may be running in your head as you read this. There is a confidence and outright joy that responds to the question with an emphatic "Yes!" Will you still love me when I lose my hair or when I stay out too late? The tuneful answer is "Yes!" And "Yes!" is the answer to the questions, Will you still love me, now that I've fallen short, screwed up, gotten old, lost faith, forgotten to pray, stopped praying, made a mess, tried to get it together, done my best? "Yes!" is always God's answer to "Will you still love me?"


