All my banking is done electronically, and I have no need for a bricks-and-mortar location. Our family used to go to the public library to borrow many books and DVDs and books on CD, but not anymore. Now we can access all these things through the internet, and we have little need for an actual library. Membership in fraternal organizations

continues to plummet, and I am one who feels no compelling need to join the Masons or the Moose Lodge or the Rotary Club. My life is already filled with other obligations. And so, I unwittingly contribute to the crumbling of community in our land.

Change is inevitable. We can never stop it. Every single thing in the universe is in constant motion. Everything! We cannot stop change, but we can observe it and learn from it. We can adapt and be better prepared for the future. Nearly all the ways in which local people have interacted with each other are becoming obsolete. This is sad for many reasons, but it is also an opportunity for the local church. You see, what we do cannot be outsourced to the internet. You cannot receive holy baptism remotely. You cannot livestream the sharing of holy communion. You cannot receive the laying on of hands for healing over the internet. You cannot feel the power of singing together in harmony while sitting alone in your living room and staring at a screen.

As our society continues to change, what we do - and who we are - as Saint Mary's will only grow in importance. I truly believe this. We are a womb of community – of authentic, vibrant, Christ-centered community. The kind of commu-


From the Deacon's Corner

only our faith in Jesus Christ can give. The diocese of Maine was represented by our Archdeacon, five deacons and three deacons in formation.



We welcomed two visiting presenters. Emily Rodgers is chairing the Farm-to-Table Dinner, Auction and Contra dance on August 10th at 5 p.m. She shared with us the structure of the event, which will include a delicious dinner, silent auction and contra dance. 

Responding to Maine's Opioid Crisis

Education, Compassion and Community

The Maine addiction crisis affects us all, directly or indirectly. To respond effectively, we are all called upon, in community, to become well-educated about this subject and approach the challenge from a place of compassion.

On Sunday, June 9th, Saint Mary's held the third and final presentation of our spring Opioid Crisis series, "Overcoming Obstacles in Recovery: Jobs, Housing and More". Margo Walsh, Founder and CEO of MaineWorks, was our keynote speaker. MaineWorks is an innovative employment company with a social mission: to dignify the experience for people who face real barriers to workforce reentry, including people recovering from substance use disorder and people with felony convictions.

Margo began her presentation by showing a trailer from a beautifully produced VIA agency documentary, Now What?, which describes the journey of 5 men through their recovery and how MaineWorks was pivotal in helping them rebuild their lives.

After Margo spoke, we heard from three MaineWorks employees, each of them in recovery. They shared their stories and spoke about the difference MaineWorks has made in their lives, their successes, and their difficult journeys. MaineWorks employees Casey Tucker, Brett Longo and Steve Lawrence rocked the house with their clarity, insight and wisdom.

Jeff Buckwalter, CEO of Holy Donuts, and Charlie Bickford, President of Maine Paint, shared their experiences in hiring people in recovery and how it has helped not only those in recovery, but their companies and fellow employees. As Jeff Buckwalter said, "It has helped the individuals, and it has helped shape the culture of Holy Donuts for the better. It's my hope that more businesses are constructed in such a way that would allow for them to both bring on people in recovery to enrich their culture and help some very deserving people find their way again."

A moving testimonial from The Reverend Carie Johnson ended the evening. Carie has a son who has been struggling with recovery and she described the highs, the lows and the impact it has had on Carie and their family.

Portraits of MaineWorks employees by photographer Joanne Arnold lined the Saint Mary's auditorium. Joanne also spoke about the dedication of MaineWorks employees and the amazing impact Margo and MaineWorks has had on so many people.

The afternoon was an incredibly informative, and at times heartbreaking, view into the challenges and obstacles of recovery and the workforce. A most significant message throughout was how important it is for businesses to recognize the value of an employee in recovery as they most often have the a deep strength, determination, and will to rebuild their lives.

We look forward to continuing our series on "Responding to Maine's Opioid Crisis: Education, Compassion and Community" in the fall.

Casco Bay CAN "Table Talks" Elicit a Great Response

As an integral part of Saint Mary's efforts to address the addiction crisis in Maine, we welcomed Casco Bay CAN (www.cascobayCAN.org) representatives to Saint Mary's Common Ground to conduct "Table Talks"--small group discussions to guide adults



with relationships of influence with children about how we can talk to our children about substance use. Some 20 parents and grandparents participated on May 30th as part of the scheduled "Common Ground" evening. The group was divided into adults with children in elementary school and adults with children in middle/high school and beyond.

A parent of elementary school age children shared that, "the Round Table discussion was very informative. The facilitator gave us important insights on how parents' daily behavior, specifically in regard to alcohol, can influence kid at this age."

A parent of elementary and middle school children shared: "Thursday night was incredible!! It was such an informative evening! I walked away feeling happy with what we have already preached to our children, but also aware of so much more. Really, really a good night and the leaders were great! I look forward to more next year! I loved how they said that so much is social these days and the stress that is put on kids....if we can help them navigate failure, they will be less stressed and less likely to turn to drugs and/or alcohol- that was the biggest message I got and have passed along to people. And I have already spoken a lot to friends who couldn't be there. Thank you for helping to make those happen!! Please keep them coming!"

The grandparents in the group felt strongly about their role in talking to their grandchildren and found the Table Talks to be an excellent help in learning how to talk openly and learn to speak with young people about underage drinking and illegal substance use. "We found it particularly informative as grandparents and look forward to more such sessions."

With this very positive feedback, we will be inviting Casco Bay CAN back next year! Many thanks to Outreach Committee members Anne LaFond and Diane Fletcher for organizing this wonderful and informative event, as well as to Julia Splint and Fiona Ferrell for providing childcare and to all the attendees who participated in the Common Ground Potluck supper!
