RENEWING OUR MINDS: Formation Groups



It is time for us to kickoff a new program year that is carefully designed and intended to assist all Saint Marians to "take hold of the life that really is life" (1 Timothy 6.19). Much prayer and thought has gone into planning regular gatherings and special events for all groups within our parish family that will inspire our love for God and for our neighbors. Are any of you frustrated or worried or perplexed when you hear the news headlines of the day? Without a doubt most of us find ourselves feeling this way. But what does our faith say about these issues and questions?

One of these regular gatherings will be a Sunday Formation time called "Current Events and the Mind

of Christ" (see Romans 12.2). Beginning promptly at 9:30 AM every regular Sunday in the Auditorium (starting Sept. 15), we will discuss one or two of the big headlines from the previous week. I will serve as the facilitator, but the topics will come from you, as well as the insights. Our goal will be to move beyond talking points of the right and left and to consider what the Scriptures and the Traditions of the Church tell us about these things. This will be crowdsourcing at its best! All opinions will be respected and heard (except for bigoted ones), but the goal will be to grow together beyond our own opinions and to make strides toward discerning the Mind of Christ. This is an experiment in Christian community. Let's see how it works! Be on the lookout soon for ways that you can submit news stories for consideration.

Another Formation group will meet at the same time in the Father James Chapel. Led by the team of Becky Pride, Merle Marie Troeger and Jennifer Gregg, this group is called "Be Still" and is designed more for practice in meditation and prayer rather than discussion (although it is not a silent group!). Each week there is a carefully chosen theme to guide the group in spiritual practice.

From the Deacon's Corner: Living with Grief

We all have one inescapable reality in common, and that is that we will all die. We all also undoubtedly will experience the deaths of the people close to us. Experiencing the death of a loved one causes a seismic shift in our world both externally and internally in our hearts, minds and spirits. Everyone experiences grief, but we don't all experience grief in exactly the same way or on the same timetable. Grieving is painful, confusing, and can make us wonder if there will ever be fullness of life again.

Many of you know that a focus of my ministry for many years has been to offer the opportunity for healing grief in small groups that have met both in the parish setting as well as in the context of the Maine Correctional Center in Windham. The process has been one in which grieving persons share their experiences in a confidential, non-

judgmental way. There is also the opportunity to learn about the dynamics of grief

and the effects of grief on every day living. Our spirituality has a tremendous role to play in our healing and we will explore that. We will also learn to move forward in hope and to find acceptance and even joy in the midst of loss.

Beginning on Tuesday, October 8, a new "Living with Grief" group will begin. We will meet at Saint Mary's from 4 to 5:30 once a week for 8 weeks. Anyone who has experienced the death of a loved one whether that death occurred 6 months ago or many years ago is welcome to be part of the group. Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

We gathered on August 15th for the August Vestry meeting. Father Nathan led us in a teaching moment about the status of global Christianity with a report from the Center for the Study of Global Christianity. In short, the CSGC reports that 2.5 billion or 33% of the global population identifies as Christian. 49% identify as Catholic. In 2018, Africa crossed the threshold as the continent having the most Christians.

Jennifer Gregg joined us as a guest to report on the final recap of the Legacy Capital Campaign. We all thanked her for chairing the Legacy Campaign. Without the funds raised during that time, we would not be the parish we are today. The new and renovated spaces allow us to be welcoming and host the types of programs central to our mission. The endowments were established and, as they grow, will allow us to better steward our campus. The Legacy Campaign was truly transformative for Saint Mary's.

Ben Parks-Stamm reported on our current financial picture. We are running close to the budget, and we have made it through the summer months able to cover our expenses. Typically, because of vacations, giving - whether in loose offerings or through pledging - drops off but rebounds in September.

We discussed the successful Farm-to-Table Dinner. All of the numbers aren't in, but it looks like we'll net about \$8,000. Emily Rodgers and Barbara Bell along with the numerous volunteers delivered on a wonderful evening. We cannot thank them enough! The dinner was incredible; the auction had a lot of interesting items, and the contra dance was lots of fun and a great way to close out the night. Fortunately, the weather was perfect. We talked about the idea of returning to lobster. A boiled lobster dinner is a terrific and iconic Maine experience but the quality of the menu from the F2T is in line with the foodie reputation of our area. In addition to raising significant money, it is also a wonderful friendraiser.

Father Nathan shared the details of the Kickoff weekend as well as the importance of having Vestry greeters to help those who are checking us out to get acquainted with our buildings but also to make a connection with our parish.



The program for Common Ground, our Thursday evening community event, is shaping up. We'll kick off the fall season on Thursday, September 12th *Batimbo United* – a group of drummers and dancers from Burundi.

Megan Akers, our Guiding RAY Director, needs volunteers to work with the children. Maria Belva is leading our children's choir.

We are in the early stages of discussions about participating in a community solar project. We would benefit from green power as well as supporting a solar array located on a property somewhere in southern Maine. We don't have the details but will proceed with caution ensuring that the program offers us significant benefits.

Darren Clark, Matt Fulton, and Jan Mordarski are working on volunteer recruitment. They are planning to be present for the Kickoff Sunday event and are thinking about a volunteer fair during an upcoming Sunday coffee hour.

Beginning September 12, 3PM, Father James' Chapel


The "Merton Group" is a small, spiritually diverse, inquisitive, tolerant, open-minded, and supportive group of seekers.

RESPONDING TO THE OPIOID CRISIS IN MAINE

Building on the initiative begun last year, the kick-off event will be a free Chili Supper, devoted to "Celebrating Partners in Recovery" on October 18 from 5-7pm, to which parishioners are invited to join members of the recovery and at-large communities to dine and learn about and from each other. Please consider bringing your favorite chili and corn bread to share! The sign-up sheet is in the Guild Room foyer!

Save the dates for three Sunday afternoon presentations from **4-6pm on November 3, January 12, and April 26** on the subject of substance-use disorder, so that we all might better respond to this crisis through education, compassion and community. The November topic: "Recovery Houses-The Needs and The Hurdles" featuring Ron Springle, who works on this very subject in the Office of the Director of Opioid Response in Augusta.

As you consider which ministries you wish to pursue this program year, you are warmly invited to consider participating in the" Souper Supper" Ministry that offers, free to the community, hot home-made soups, salads, rolls, desserts and beverages, served at table at Saint Mary's on the second and fourth Fridays of each month. The event currently attracts anywhere from 25-50 people from the community seeking both nutritional

and social sustenance.

Some 30 parishioners participate in this ministry, and, of course, every few years there is some turnover. 

With All Your Strength

When Jesus answered the question, "What is the greatest commandment?" he quoted his Bible. He went straight to Deuteronomy 6:5 where Moses tells the people to love the Lord with all their heart, with all their soul and with all their strength.

Yes, love the Lord with all your strength. Not with all your dogmas, or all your doctrines, or all your tenets, or all your arguments, or all your debates. Jesus is talking about muscles and sinews here. He's reminding us that we have bodies with which to love the Lord.

I think that's why Christians of all stripes can get together to build a house for Habitat for Humanity, or join forces to help rebuild following a natural disaster, or help tutor new refugee men and women. There's no theological eligibility test. We use our strength to minister without asking if our co-workers believe the same way we do. We help because our strength is needed.

When Jesus tries to tell us what loving God with all your strength looks like, he talks about those who feed the hungry, give the thirsty something to drink, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, take care of the sick and visit the prisoners. "Huh?" say

the righteous. "When did we love God that way?" They are puzzled because the answer doesn't depend on right ideas about God. It depends only on their actions. "Just as you did it to the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Loving God with all our strength looks most like loving the least among us.
