Advent: The Struggle Is Real



Who celebrates the birth of a child weeks before the child is actually delivered? It's preposterous, isn't it? Advent is a gift from the Church given to us that we might be spiritually formed in a particular way. Make no mistake about it: every single person is daily undergoing a process of spiritual formation. If you are alive, then your character is being shaped by forces around you each day. For the average person, December is a time to be shaped by forces of materialism and superficial concerns. If we allow ourselves and our children to be carried along by this flood of marketing, then we will certainly end up as unhappy and unaware as the average person.

Advent creates a different awareness and a different spiritual formation if we enter the season with intention. In Advent, we are invited to carefully remember all of the hopes and promises that pointed to the birth of Jesus. And we remember all of the pain and suffering that signifies our need for a Savior. This is why Advent is semi-penitential. Alleluias go away. Our music becomes more plaintive and somber. We make a full confession of our sins against God and our neighbor. We use the same purple color as in Lent. Everything is carefully designed to create in us the sense that - yes, indeed - we ourselves need God to send a Savior to redeem us and this world. This awareness of need within us and around us makes us more receptive to the immense joy of the festival that begins when the sun sets on December 24.

You can see why the month of December is so challenging for those of us who desire to be spiritually formed toward Jesus rather than toward the hottest deals on Amazon. Advent is in direct conflict with the dominant narrative of American society. Buying and receiving gifts will not make us happy; God is the source of true joy. Every kiss does not begin with Kay; God is Love and those who live in love, live in God. Santa is not making a list of good and bad deeds; Christ will come as judge of the living and the dead. It is impossible for us to resist entirely the false claims of "the holidays." But we can - and we must - make an effort each day to re-

Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The Vestry met on November 20. Father Nathan led off the meeting with a teaching moment about C.S. Lewis who died on November 22, 1963 just before the assassination of President Kennedy. He shared some of C.S. Lewis' writings and themes.

The treasurer, Ben Parks-Stamm, reported on our current financial position. We are tracking on budget, but we are lagging in paid pledges. Ben presented the proposed budget for 2020. We discussed the ambitious pledge goal of \$290,000. We clearly have the potential to reach the goal as many of our regular donors don't pledge, preferring to give as the spirit moves them. We hope they will make a commitment to pledge. We will be calling all of our parishioners to remind them of the pledge campaign and the goal.

The Nominating Committee reported that they have a slate of nominees for Vestry. They are still working on a Junior Warden candidate and will fill the convention delegate nominees now that the Vestry candidates are final. Look for information on the new class of Vestry in this AVE.

We will be voting on by-law changes at our Annual Meeting. The first change will be to allow termed Vestry members to serve two consecutive terms if they wish to do so. The second by-law vote will be to reduce the size of the Vestry from 12 to 9 members. We are (and have been) out of compliance with Maine law governing the size of Episcopal church vestries.

We discussed the need for volunteers to help with Sparkles.



It's a big effort, but it's important to both our *friend-raising* efforts and our fundraising efforts. It's fun and is truly an example of many hands making light work!

We also discussed the success of our Guiding RAY program and how it also needs volunteers to assist. Vestry members Darren Clark and Len Taylor have been lesson leaders in the program and shared their thoughts emphasizing that it's important for us all to help out.



Advent and After

Here's an Advent spiritual exercise for you. Why not assume the identity of one of the biblical characters who is waiting for Jesus? Pick one and walk in his/her shoes for a while.

Advent is full of their stories. Mary comes to mind immediately, of course. But there's also Joseph. What is he thinking and feeling? And then there's Elizabeth, suddenly pregnant after long years of waiting. We don't often hear the story of her husband Zechariah, but he has an especially interesting story. What about Gabriel? What's his reaction to Mary, and how does he think things will turn out? I think of the magi as Advent characters too. They're waiting and watching the skies for something new.

Their stories are full of potential for spiritual insight. After all, they *all* go through enormous transformations. (Well, okay, I don't really know about Gabriel.)

Here's the idea. Once you've assumed your new biblical identity, ask some of these questions:

-How did I get here?

-What's my "back story"? -What am I hoping for?

-Who is God for me? -What am I thinking as I wait?

-What am I feeling as I wait?

-What is my prayer?

Now move the story forward. Advent has come and gone. Christmas has come and gone. Now is the time to

ask some of these questions:

-Where am I now?

-What was important in that story? -Who is God for me now? -How have I been changed?

-What are my thoughts now?

-What are my feelings now?

-What is my prayer now?

It might be interesting to stay in character for a while. What will it be like next Pentecost (May 31, 2020) to be Mary? Joseph? Gabriel? Zechariah? Stick with this exercise and see.

For the Christmas Pageant on December 22, we will join the children in singing the familiar Christmas carols as well as enjoying the touching anthem based on the German carol, 'Still, Still' sung for us by the Guiding SAY Youth Choir and accompanied by handbells.


On Christmas Eve, December 24 for the 4:00 Christmas Eve service, under the direction of Maria Belva, members of the



We will begin our eleventh season with medieval processionals and a beautiful work by the early baroque composer, Hermann Schein, *Verbum caro factum est*. This sixvoice motet is based on the famous text for the Christmas season, *and the word was made flesh*, and features the vocal splendors for which our ensemble is noted.

We are proud to present music that you would have to travel to Boston or New York to hear, including the mysterious and uplifting motet *Responsum acceperat Simeon* by

the great Renaissance master, Josquin Des Prés.

We like to offer contrasts in our programs, so the first half concludes with some effervescent arias, duets and choruses from J. S. Bach's cantatas. The second half begins with the serene *Pastorale* from Arcangelo Corelli's Concerto Grosso *Natale*, and continues with another realization of the text, *and the word was made flesh*, this time by Heinrich Schütz.

We will then feature the higher voices of the Schola members in the motet *O magnum Mysterium*, by the Renaissance master, Cristobal de Morales. And our concert will end with a joyous 'Gloria' by Claudio Monteverdi.

We are delighted to add to our men's ensemble two new singers: bass, Ross Crolius,

who sang for 25 years with the Metropolitan Opera Chorus, and tenor, David Myers, who recently earned his Masters Degree in Vocal Pedagogy from USM. It will be a treat to hear this splendid male sound in Victoria's *Duo Seraphim* and the lovely French carol, *Entre le boeuf et l'âne gris*. Outreach Ministry - All Ages Serving Near and Far

Responding to Maine's Opioid Crisis November 3rd Presentation Offers Clarity Regarding Recovery Houses



It is well established and understood that group recovery houses are a dire need to those in recovery as they begin to rebuild their lives in society. The oversight process is more opaque and, thus, both controversial and worrisome to both those in recovery and their neighbors. We were , therefore, so fortunate to welcome Ron Springel, a former emergency room physician and Project Manager for the Maine Association of Recovery Residences and part-time volunteer with the Governor's Director of Opioid Response to speak on November 3rd at our fourth educational program in Saint Mary's "Responding to Maine's Opioid Crisis."

Dr. Springel has devoted much of his life to the subject of Recovery Houses and offered frank and elucidating comments on both the needs and difficulties in establishing and running recovery houses that are safe both for the residents and the neighborhood. For the former, recovery houses are a crucial, often first, step in reintegrating to society in a safe and supportive, albeit personally demanding, atmosphere. For the neighbors, fear of the unknown, often exacerbated by lack of

factual knowledge hampers understanding and fans opposition. For both residents and the community, the lack of formal regulation of these houses is both frightening and worrisome. To fill that regulation gap is the Maine Association of Recovery Residences, (MARR: mainerecoveryresidences.com) which provides levels of certifications to those recovery houses who choose to seek it. The certifications are based on national standards and the list of those houses who have these certifications (a small but growing percentage in Maine) are available through MARR.

Enriching the discussion about the need, efficacy and safety concerns of all were the testimonials from two MaineWorks alums, Steve Lawrence and Joey Robichaud, who generously spoke of their own recovery house experiences, painting a vivid picture of the needs and obstacles. There followed an energetic and fruitful exchange among the members of the audience as they exchanged ideas about how to respond to these critical needs positively.



After living for 40 years in Falmouth (with a stint on Sebago Lake), I found myself drawn to S Mary's, first by their Souper Suppers, then by our beloved Father James, and the glorious choral music I heard on Sunday mornings. I joined the choir

shortly thereafter and have been a chorister here ever since. I formerly sang with Portland Community Chorus

and the PSO Magic of Christmas productions. I have also served as a Eucharistic Minister at S Mary's.

Will Salomon is a 4th generation Californian who grew up in the San Francisco Bay Area. He was raised in the parish of St. John's Episcopal Church in Ross, CA where he was confirmed by Bishop James Pike and served as an acolyte.

His secondary education was at the Cate School in Carpinteria, CA where he was fortunate to take organ lessons on the school's Casavant instrument (Op. 2631 1961). He studied Physics at Occidental College (A.B.) and University of Chicago (M.S.). After several transitional years, he received his M.D. from the University of South Alabama (1971), was a Resident in Pediatrics at the University

of So. Alabama and a Fellow in Neonatology at Stanford University.

In 2008 after being long "lapsed," Will returned to the Episcopal flock at Church of Our Saviour, Brookline, MA and three years later discovered Saint Mary's as he was spending more time in Maine where he has become a full-time parishioner. Four years ago, due to a need in the choir to perform Fauré's Requiem, he began singing (for the first time ever!). Since then he has continued to sing with the choir and, upon the urging and mentoring of Priscilla Rigg, attended the Royal School of Church Music's annual Newport, RI workshops in 2017-19.

Will's other interests include hiking (particularly the Sierras), kayaking, choral singing with Oratorio Chorale, concert attendance (particularly Handel & Haydn in Boston) and Medical Ethics.




