

The Value of Stability



A brother visited Abba Moses at Skete asking him for a saying. The elder said to him, "Go and stay in your cell; your cell will teach you everything" (APAlph Moses 6). Do you know that God is never in a rush? Everyone says that we need to get there soon; we need to see results quickly. But where do we need to go? And what is it that we must do with such haste? God is never in a hurry, and neither are the trees. Over a lifespan of a few hundred years, a tree is successful if it gives birth to just one seedling that survives.

Do you know that the lilacs in these parts are in bloom for only a brief time each spring? Usually over a few days in May. And the most important thing you can do when this time comes around again is to make sure that you smell a lot of lilacs.

"The grass is always greener on the other side." This is an old proverb learned through careful observation. Most humans appear to be consumed by a craving madness to get somewhere else, to be someone else, to get something else, to go somewhere else – anywhere else! This is not what we learn from God nor from the wisdom of the earth. Wherever we happen to wake up in the world, the truth is that we have everything we need in that place, because we have God with us. And God is always enough.

Abba Moses instructed a young spiritual seeker to find a place and to stay put. This is deep wisdom. There is no point in endlessly seeking the newest information, the trending topic, the popular hashtag, the latest polls, the hip new teacher. Find your place and stay there, because "your cell will teach you everything." Watch how the trees grow, how the wind pushes the falling leaves, how your body digests and distributes energy. Consider how God sustains the life of this remarkable planet. And then make a decision to turn away from the compulsive madness of human society. You don't need any of that, because you have God. And God is always more than enough.

From the Deacon's Corner:

During the recent nor'easter, a large tree which had been leaning precariously toward my house, came down with a crash in the wee hours of the morning. The power was out, and it was very dark inside the house and even darker outside with the wind and rain obscuring everything. Armed with a ridiculously small flashlight, I felt my way to the back door hoping to see what had caused the crash. The realization came slowly as I scanned the backyard with the flashlight. A huge tree had fallen down across my yard onto my roof and deck. Immediately I was afraid that the tree had made a hole in the roof. I felt absolutely helpless as I waited in the dark for the next few hours until I could call my son. David lives in Portland and was able to come right away. His first words when he saw the situation were colorful!!! He has cleared the tree and hauled it away, and I am so grateful for him and for my grandson Gavin who was a tremendous help. The roof needs a few new shingles but otherwise is fine.



The tree that succumbed to the storm had been around for a while, years probably. It was covered by a vine that bloomed in the spring. In its highest branches, we found a bird's nest. I wish I could call this tree by its proper name, but I do not know it. I feel so blessed by the trees around my house. White pine, red maple, oak, sugar maple and others I can't name. Because of them I have a variety of birds coming to my feeders and other creatures like red and gray squirrels, chipmunks, and a very fat woodchuck. A flock of turkeys drop in once in a while. This fall the trees around my house have been brilliant with color as their life cycle comes to an end and winter approaches. What a blessing it is to live in this vibrant natural oasis as I am bounded on two sides by heavily traveled roads and constant traffic.

We and all life around us is created, grows, flourishes for a time and dies. Along the way, storms, disease, accidents, things done and left undone affect us and all life around us. I am grateful for the tree that came down in my backyard, for its life and work in my little corner of the world, and I feel sad that it is gone and glad its demise didn't make a hole in my roof! Thanks be to God!

Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The Vestry met on October 16. Deacon Christine Bennett attended to explain the role of a deacon and to share her thoughts on her own ministry as well as an update on her Living with Grief Group. Saint Mary's leadership is extremely grateful for Deacon Christine's ministry and all of the ways she supports us.

Treasurer Ben Parks-Stamm presented the financial update. We continue to be very close to budget on revenue and expenses. However we do see a shift, which is hopefully an anomaly. Many people are giving regularly but did not complete a pledge form for 2019 so our non-pledge offering is higher than expected but when added to the pledge totals is close to our budget. Our pledging households have historically been at around 145, but we are at less than 120. Our parishioners are generous but the lack of a pledge commitment makes budgeting difficult. Despite reminders, many regular parishioners forgot to send in a formal commitment.

The 2020 stewardship campaign will be structured to be more visible and focused on pledge goals. The stewardship campaign will kick off in November. The Make a Joyful Noise campaign will be noticeably different that previous years. We have financial goals we'd like to meet both aspirational and tangible. So this year, we will have a campaign that first meets our annual budget needs. We will have a stretch goal that will allow us to get back to 7% for outreach needs and a capital goal to fund projects that need to be done allowing us to be faithful stewards of the buildings that house our programs. See page 4 for the complete details on the 2020 pledge campaign.

The Nominating Committee has received nominations for Senior Warden (Jim Kane is stepping down one year early), Junior Warden (Janet Bowne is nominated to fill out his term) and 3 vestry positions. We are looking for three vestry members instead of four. We learned recently that we've been out of compliance with the state law governing the size of vestries which should be 9 instead of our 12. By cutting down the number this year, we will meet the size requirement in 3 years which is more prudent than making a drastic cut in one year.

We will be voting on the following bylaw change at the 2020 Annual Meeting. This was passed by the vestry in 2018 but was tabled until it was approved by the Diocesan Standing Committee in March 2019. The proposed by law change is: "No vestry member shall serve more than one two three year terms unless that vestry member has taken at least one year off."

On Sunday, November 3 we will host a ministry fair to help







guilds and committees share their ministries and recruit volunteers. We also have the important position of Hospitality Chairperson that is still open.

We are thrilled to have filled the spot of nursery coordinator. Samiyah Alshimali has been serving in that capacity for a few weeks. We continue to need volunteers to serve with her in the nursery and as leaders in the robust Guiding RAY program.

Father Nathan will be away from 11/25-12/6 to make a long delayed trip to see Angus in Hawaii. Pastor Sara D'Angio White will serve at the Thanksgiving Eve service. Deacon Christine will lead the 12/1 service of Lessons and Carols. Rev. Portia Hirschman will lead the 12/5 noon Eucharist. Joyce Verey and volunteers will manage the blood drive on 11/30.

Thank you to the Vestry for your guidance and service to Saint Mary's.

What can we do?

- Listen for how God is directing you toward opportunities for mission and ministry within our parish and make a commitment to volunteer to help.
- Let your voice be heard—engage in conversations with our leadership about the things you feel are important. Consider volunteering to be part of our leadership, which is shared among all of our members.
- Make a choice to support Saint Mary's financially. Pledging to make a gift to Saint Mary's—whether it's a one-time gift or given over the course of a year is critical to our ability to meet our obligations supporting our staff, fixed expenses like heat and lights, maintenance expenses, outreach, program, and worship costs.

2020 Goals!

Our goal for 2020 is ambitious - and we're trying something new!

Our first goal is the amount we need to raise to meet our annual budget needs: \$285,000

- Once we reach our annual amount, we hope to raise an additional \$15,000 to get us to \$310,000. Doing this will allow us to increase our support for our Outreach Programs. Several years ago, we decreased the percentage we offer for outreach to 5%. In 2020, we will increase to 7% if we reach \$310,000.
- Our last threshold goal is \$341,000. This will enable us to do two important major projects. The ringing mechanism of the Church Bell malfunctions often, so we need to do some work to ensure it rings for many years. We also need to replace our sound systems so that all who enter our Sanctuary and Auditorium can hear as well as possible. These projects are very important and are beyond the scope of our annual major projects budget.

Things to know:

- Pledge revenue is our primary source of revenue. Our fundraisers contribute significantly, but pledge support is critical to ensuring we can meet our financial obligations.
- Our plan, over the next few years, is to increase our Outreach support to the Biblical tithe of 10%. By adding a small increase each year, with your support, we will reach that goal!
- Taking on a major project or two each year is a measured approach to stewarding our buildings and grounds ensuring that Saint Mary's is sustained for future generations.
- If we don't raise all \$341,000, the Vestry will consult with the Buildings and Grounds team to determine how best to allocate the project money.
- We recognize that some parishioners may want to support the projects. The best way to do that is to increase pledging. If those of us who can increase our pledge do so, we'll be successful. But our priority is to ensure that we meet our annual obligation to our staff and programs.

We will begin our eleventh season with medieval processionals and a beautiful work by the early baroque composer, Hermann Schein, *Verbum caro factum est*. This six-voice motet is based on the famous text for the Christmas season, *and the word was made flesh*, and features the vocal splendors that our ensemble is noted for.

We are proud to present music that you would have to travel to Boston or New York to hear, including the mysterious and uplifting motet *Responsum acceperat Simeon* by the great Renaissance master, Josquin Des Prés.

We like to offer contrasts in our programs, so the first half concludes with some effervescent arias, duets and choruses from J. S. Bach's cantatas. The second half begins with the serene *Pastorale* from Arcangelo Corelli's Concerto Grosso *Natale*, and continues with another realization of the text, *and the word was made flesh*, this time by Heinrich Schütz.

We will then feature the higher voices of the Schola members in the motet *O magnum Mysterium*, by the Renaissance master, Cristobal de Morales. And our concert will end with a joyous 'Gloria' by Claudio Monteverdi.

We are delighted to add to our men's ensemble two new singers: bass, Ross Crolius, who sang for 25 years with the Metropolitan Opera Chorus, and tenor, David Myers, who recently earned his Masters Degree in Vocal Pedagogy from USM. It will be a treat to hear this splendid male sound in Victoria's *Duo Seraphim* and the lovely French carol, 'Entre le boeuf et l'âne gris. For tickets: stmaryschola.org


Food Pantry, sent us a thank you card in appreciation for all of the kids good work!

Celebrating the 40th Anniversary of the Saint Mary Organ In 1979, The Church of Saint Mary commissioned the eminent organ builder Gerhard Brunzema to construct the magnificent instrument that graces our sanctuary. At the time, Robert Renwick was the choirmaster/organist, when previously, the organ was located in the chancel (with pipes even in the ceiling of the tower!). Under Robert's leadership, the beautiful Casavant Opus 3384, was installed in the gallery. Brunzema grew up in northern Germany and fashioned his masterworks after the magnificent baroque organs of his youth. Indeed, the Saint Mary's organ was one of his favorites, and he advised any future clients to visit the church to see his best work. The organ is very versatile, but it particularly sounds wonderful in works from the German baroque era. It is always a joy for me to play Bach on this instrument. To me it is like participating in a musical prayer. We are so fortunate that Charles Shipman Payson, a relative of Saint Mary's founding member General John Marshall Brown, helped generate funds for the organ. It was dedicated in 1979 with a plaque reading: *Te Deum Laudamus*, Anno Domini 1979, Given in memory of Herbert Payson, Sally Carroll Payson, and Joan Whitney Payson by Charles Shipman Payson. Praise Him upon the strings and pipes.



Garden Redesign - Year Two

The second stage of garden redesign took place in mid August. The garden's redesign is a gift from St. Mary's Garden Club to the church. The garden is maintained by the garden club per club Bylaws. This second of three stages included the following:

- removal of <u>many</u> rug sections that graced our lawn, adjacent to the rock wall, for over two years in an effort to kill entrenched Bishop's Weed! The area was graded, tamped and seeded by Gnome and the grass is coming in astonishingly fast.
- preparation of the bed directly in front of the rectory deck it was cleared, delineated and Saint Mary's Garden Club members who came out in force that day. Items include Emerald Green Arborvitae, a Sherwood Flame Japanese Maple, Red Twig Dogwoods and more.

planting of three River Birch trees in the Parish House alcove next to the chapel. The trees were anonymously donated by a garden club member.

Next summer the third and final stage of the garden's redesign will take place. It will transform the area next to the walkway and feature a sitting area. The new garden will be rededicated in the fall of 2020.

In 2018, at the request of garden club, the church removed two large evergreen trees and is gradually removing all the Burning Bush in the rectory area. Members of both the church and the garden club have contributed for the purchase of trees and shrubs.

And Your Neighbor As Yourself

When Jesus was asked what the *greatest* commandment is, he quoted from Deuteronomy: "love the Lord with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your strength."

But there is more to the correct answer. There is another commandment: he says, that is "like it" (Matthew), and "as great" (Mark) or simply the rest of the sentence (Luke): "Love your neighbor as your-

self." In the ancient rabbinic mind, these injunctions were part and parcel of the same law (Leviticus 19:18). Loving God and loving neighbor were inextricably intertwined.

This part of the law sounds simple until I think about how hard it is to love myself. Somewhere along the line we learn that we are not lovable. I don't really know how this happens. Why do we forget that we are each God's beloved? When did I first think that I had to *earn* God's love? How did I misplace a theology of grace – the one I took seriously when I was innocent enough to sing "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so."

So before I can keep the second commandment – to love my neighbor as myself- I need to reconnect with the confidence that I am truly lovable in God's eyes, without ego, without pride, without self-consciousness. Where do I go for lessons in this kind of love? Perhaps I go to the same place we went as children – to

the Bible. After all, that's where Jesus goes for his understanding of the commandments of love. I am loved because the Bible tells me so. Here's a sampling:

Psalm 136 – "For his steadfast love endures forever," repeated 26 times

Exodus 19:4 – "You yourselves have seen what I did in Egypt and how I carried you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself."

Isaiah 46:4 – "Even to your old age I am he, even when you turn gray I will carry you. I have made, and I will bear; I will carry and will save."

Loving neighbor as myself will be easier when I realize the truth of God's love for me. (If you have a reaction or would like to comment, please contact me at merelemanietroeger@gmail.com.

At the Maine Press Association 2019 Fall Conference at the Doubletree Hotel on Sat. October 19, Marian McCue was one of three distinguished inductees into this year's Hall of Fame for contributions to the publishing industry of

Maine. "Marian McCue purchased a small fortnightly local town tabloid mailed directly to residents in 1990 and eventually turned it--with great foresight and a singular journalistic duty-- into what would become arguably "the" community newspaper of record for the greater Portland area. In 2003, knowing she was only a steward of the paper. McCue sold it to the Costello family agreeing to stay on as editor to launch the Portland edition the same year and the Mid-Coast edition two years later.

In 2006, she handed over the reins of the newspaper to her trusted and capable editor, Mo Mehlsak, but never really left journalism. Instead, McCue lent her reporting talents to many Maine newspapers on a freelance basis and for the last four and a half years has been writing a monthly column for The Forecaster focusing on issues at the Statehouse "

Caring for God's Creation - A Tip for Saving Energy and Cash from the Outreach Committee

Phantom Power and Ghost Load: Items plugged into an outlet and not being used. An average home can rack up roughly a whole month's worth of phantom power annually.

The Natural Resources Defense Council puts the cost at about \$165 per United States household, or \$19 billion nationally. That translates to around 44 million tons of carbon dioxide, or 4.6 percent of the country's total residential electricity generation. In an office, things like printers, computers and phone chargers can consume a quarter of a building's energy.

To see which household items are frequent phantoms, check out a <u>free smartphone app called Dr. Power</u>. It has a library of more than 100,000 appliances and devices. Shutting down a computer, for example, can cut energy use by 65 percent compared with leaving the device in idle mode.
