

The Picnic Eucharist



No one knows exactly how our current public health crisis will be resolved – or when. The primary risk appears to come from gatherings of people, particularly in poorly ventilated indoor spaces. This aptly describes worship as we have become accustomed to offer it, and the CDC has now documented a number of cases where church gatherings have been a major source of transmission in a community. Therefore, out of love and care for one another, we do not anticipate meeting in person for worship in our beloved Church building until the danger is lessened. We will, however, begin a few tentative experiments at gathering together outdoors, where the risk of spreading the virus appears to be significantly lower. We at Saint Mary's are blessed with a fantastic campus. This seems like the ideal time to make more use of it, while continuing to follow responsible health guidelines. Bishop Thomas Brown has given his blessing to my idea of gathering for a Picnic Eucharist. This is how I think it will work.

Groups of less than fifty people will gather outside on our lawns or in the garden area for a simple celebration of the Holy Eucharist. Each household group will bring their own chairs or blanket and sit at least eight feet

away from other groups (we will have lines or markers on the ground to assist in maintaining safe distance). In addition, each household group needs to bring their own bread and wine (or juice, if you prefer). The liturgy will take place orally and from memory; there will be no books or papers handed out. We will pass the peace from a distance by waving to each other! When it is time in the Great Thanksgiving to consecrate the Body and Blood of Christ, each household group will join me in holding up their own bread and wine. We will all make the same gestures of blessing to signify that these simple elements are now becoming something more – visible signs of invisible grace. Each group will then receive their own elements, serving the members of their household group as appropriate. If there is extra, these can be returned to the earth by pouring the wine into the ground and by tossing the bread into the woods for the squirrels to enjoy!

An outdoor "Coffee Hour" can follow the Dismissal as each household group enjoys whatever other goodies they brought along with them. As time goes by, we may add some simple and quiet Taize chants that do not require any more exertion that normal speaking. Obviously, the weather is a major factor here, and we will all need to be flexible.

Our goal is to begin these experiments in June with four gatherings as follows:

Sunday 21 June at 10:15 AM and 5:30 PM

Sunday 28 June at 10:15 AM and 5:30 PM

Of course, no one is obligated to come (except for me!), and the morning Eucharists will continue to be available on Facebook Live as usual. We hope to give most people who feel comfortable doing so one opportunity to gather in this way during June. So please note that you will most likely not be able to attend each Eucharist or even each week. You will have to choose the best option for your household and register in advance, so that we can ensure the correct number of participants. Look for registration details on our website, on our Facebook page, and in the weekly eNews as we get closer to June 21.

God willing, together we will slowly figure out how to gather for the Holy Eucharist as the Body of Christ has always done while also protecting one another and keeping everyone safe. Thank you for your patience, compassion and understanding as we find our way forward.

Communion Bread Recipe from the Cowley Fathers

When you have the opportunity to come for a Picnic Eucharist and would like to make Communion Bread to bring with you, here is a simple recipe to follow from our Episcopal monks in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

In a medium bowl, mix together the wet ingredients:

1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup oil (vegetable, canola, or other light oil)

1/2 cup water

8 oz. honey (or an alternative sweetener)

Then slowly mix in the dry ingredients:

4 cups whole wheat flour

4 teaspoons baking powder

2 teaspoons salt

The resulting dough should be stiff and moist, but not sticky. Adjust ingredients as needed.


Turn out onto lightly floured board and knead briefly, using additional flour as necessary. Then roll out to about 3/8" thick.

Cut into round shapes of your desired size. Use a knife to mark each loaf with a cross (into quarters).

Place on an oiled cookie sheet and bake at 400° F for 12 to 14 minutes (depending on your oven) or until lightly brown. Cool loaves on wire rack.

You can wrap them and refrigerate or freeze for future use. Or keep one for Communion and have the rest with dinner!

Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The Vestry met on May 20, 2020 6 pm via Zoom

Ben Parks-Stamm, Treasurer, gave an update on our financial picture which continues to be steady, Loose offering is down but other sources of revenue like increased gifts and advanced pledge payments have been strong. Expenses are down slightly through April. We are very blessed to have such a positive financial situation at this point. We have received the money allocated to us from the SBA Paycheck Protection Program, which will be reflected on the May statements.

We discussed the potential work on the bell tower. We have two proposals, one from a company in Ohio and the other from a company in Freeport. We discussed if it was possible to divide the work between the two as it seems that the bell housing work is distinct from the bell timing system. We also discussed how quarantining and related Covid 19 implications might affect this project. We will review this again next month to determine the best path for this project.

Nathan asked the Vestry to share their thoughts about online worship. The consensus seemed to be that it's working well. Some among us have had some small technical issues but reported they usually end up seeing the service. The service offered by the Diocese is a nice way to mix up the options. Online streaming allows people to try a variety of services. But one thing is clear: online does not replace the inperson community that Saint Mary's offers.

Reopening Discussion:

Decisions around reopening continue to be challenging because the Covid landscape changes constantly. Will Salomon offered several detailed graphs on the rate of infection by county in Maine and the virus' trend by county over the last few months. His analysis and the discussion led us to the consensus that we can begin to try opening but need to do so with caution and connection to the daily situation and guidelines from the Diocese and the state of Maine. Whatever plan we decide to follow, it is clear we also have to be willing to change our plans if the relative risk seems too great.

Souper Supper Curbside is starting on 5/22/2020 with many layers of protection.

The Book Sale (proceeds to benefit a nonprofit like the Falmouth Food Pantry) is tentatively scheduled for June 20 and will follow all CDC recommendations. It will be held outside, and the rain date is June 21. The team is planning to offer books by the bag w/one price. The nature of the Book Sale also allows us to cancel it should the landscape change.

Church Services—Nathan is tentatively planning to start Sunday services outside on June 21st and 28th. Parishioners will be asked to bring their own lawn chairs, and he is working on a meaningful Eucharist with the Bishop that will include bringing our own bread. We'll manage to CDC guidelines and social distancing. He recognizes that this may not be for everyone and streaming will still happen for those who want to remain at home.

Thanks to the Building and Grounds, The Last Supper wood sculpture was installed near the church by the B & G Committee.





Music Ministry

Due to the fact that we can not presently meet in Saint Mary's sanctuary, I think a lot of us miss absorbing the beautiful Norman chapel, with its splendid stained-glass windows, and of course, hearing our wonderful organ. With this in mind, I thought it would be nice to present an organ recital in June that will be available on our web site. With the aid of Kue John Lor, the video will highlight the organ as well as the chapel. I have chosen music that is particularly suitable for our noble instrument and will include some comments about the organ, its builder, and the musical compositions.

The program will consist of a chorale phantasy by Dietrich Buxtehude, 'Nun lob, mein Seel, den Her-

ren,' (Now praise the Lord, my soul). The first part of this chorale will be very familiar to all, as it is the opening melody of our doxology 'praise God, from whom all blessings flow.'

A meditative chorale prelude by Bach will feature another chorale melody based on the Lord's prayer.

Then, to show that our organ is suitable for later music, I will play a very expressive work by the contemporary British composer, Andrew Fletcher.

I have had lots of time to practice at home on my Johannes organ, so it will be a special treat for me to share with you an enchanting work by Bach that I have wanted to learn for a long time: 'Herr Jesu Christ, dich zu uns wend' (Lord Jesus Christ, to thee we turn.'

And the recital will conclude with 'Pageant,' a brilliant work by another contemporary British composer, Philip Moore, who was Organist and Master of Music at the great York Minster from 1983 to 2008.

A Prayer from Dietrich Bonhoeffer

You probably know something of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's story. He came from a very well-to-do German family and became a minister in the German Reformed Church. Because Hitler required an oath of allegiance from the clergy, Bonhoeffer broke away and became a pastor in the Confessing Church, a group of ministers who opposed Nazi interference in church matters. He was known internationally as a theologian, a teacher and preacher. In 1943, he was accused of participating in an organization that plotted to assassinate Hitler. He was arrested, imprisoned and then hanged in 1945. This 20th century Christian martyr wrote prolifically and one of his most famous works is *Letters and Papers from Prison*. Here is a portion of a prayer he wrote while he was in Tegel Prison in Berlin.

O God, early in the morning I cry to you.
Help me to pray and gather my thoughts to you,
I cannot do it alone.
In me it is dark, but with you there is light;
I am lonely, but you do not desert me;
My courage fails me, but with you there is help;
I am restless, but with you there is peace;
In me there is bitterness, but with you there is patience;
I do not understand your ways, but you know the way for me.
God in Heaven,
whatever this day may bring,
your name be praised.



Since we know how Bonhoeffer's life ended, the prayer is especially poignant. But I offer it to you as a prayer any of us could pray in difficult times, whenever we feel alone, timid, restless, bitter or confused. I love the way the prayer lays it all out before God. There's no holding back. There's no false piety. Bonhoeffer simply puts himself before God with complete honesty. He gives us permission to do the same thing in our challenging time.



A Saint Mary's Symbol

"Emanating." Here, we live a community life of intertwined shapes and distinctions, all crowded together, bursting outward in song and light! Some of us have opposing views, and yet, we are bound together as one church body.

This shape is taken from the light fixtures in the sanctuary. Look up during a service, and you will see this shape staring right back at you, right there! Mentions of the similar floral pattern are scattered around the millwork and even on our stone Altar. It is formation and expression. Many parts are working in a beautiful order, yet one of them is darkened, it's directional, pointing the way. We don't just sit here; we move and lead. The primary font selected is orderly, strong and yet sensitive, with thin lines and thick lines mixed among the letters. It welcomes all



shapes and sizes. It is subtly familiar. Indicative of the architecture of the place. It's not a rock 'n' roll church: it's stately, and old and beautiful, but alive and emanating. Museums use a similar, updated and yet old-world style.

"Enwrapped" is another main concept. Generations of people are caring for one another here. It's not an old or a young church; there is diversity of shape, direction and "ideas": something we recognize in the community here. There is an inherent physical action to this imagery. Shouldn't we all be looking around and looking up? Notice how many times during the service we raise our eyes to heaven, wouldn't we notice these shapes? SHOULDN'T we? Where is our focus? While we are currently meeting to explore how to Sparkle safely this year, there are things we could all do now to help make her a success.


