



The Misuse of Creation



"All of creation God gives to humankind to use. If this privilege is misused, God's justice permits creation to punish humanity."

St. Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1197 AD)

Humanity is playing a very dangerous game. We have misused the privileges and powers at our disposal by wantonly killing and taking from creation. So far the pains of "punishment" for these crimes have been mostly tolerable, but that is beginning to change and to pick up momentum. In addition to changing the climate in ways we cannot control, we have been driving a wave of mass species extinctions. More than 1 million species now face the real threat of extinction, to be lost from the earth forever. In September, the UN released a report on the conclusion of "The Decade on Biodiversity" from 2011-2020. The somber facts are that humanity has failed to achieve every single one of the goals set out by the UN Convention on Biological Diversity in 2011. Without question, the loss of these species will lead to

increased pain, suffering and death in human communities in every part of the earth. I'm sorry to say this, but if you think that 2020 has been a difficult year, it is time we prepare ourselves for much worse ones that are certain to come.

We must change. We must learn to want less. We must teach one another to want fewer things – or, to put a positive spin on this, to want a life of simplicity and beauty. Greed is the primary force that drives us to misuse our power over creation. Just because we can do something, doesn't mean that we should. Power must always be used in service of truth and justice. More money does not lead to happiness. Everyone who has ever lived close to God knows the obvious truth of this, and the news headlines regularly demonstrate this fact from the sad lives of the rich and famous. Speaking about the pursuit of money and the polluting effect this has on humans, our Lord Jesus offered a radical re-faming that has been mostly ignored or explained away over the ages: "What is prized by humans is an abomination in the sight of God." (Luke 16.15).

No one likes the idea of punishment as taught by that great mystic Hildegard. At this point, much of this divine retribution from the earth is surely inevitable but never should we give up hope. We must change, we can change, and we can begin today. Examine your lives to discover where you have prioritized wealth over earth, consumerism over spirituality, the short-term over the long-term, entertainment over wisdom. What is within our sphere of control? Let us begin there to create a way of life that truly honors God and God's creation, including every form of biological life with whom we share this beautiful and unique planet.

Vestry Highlights from the Wardens



Stewardship 2021: Words We Live By

In a recent interview, Presiding Bishop Michael Curry spoke, as he often does, about love. The interviewer asked for a clarification, and he said simply, "Love isn't me. Love is we." With those six simple words, Bishop Curry communicated so much. In those two sentences, he described our parish which is full of people who support each other and the community. Never has that been more evident that during this challenging year. 2020 has been like no other. The pandemic challenged everyone in so many ways. It's also affected institutions like churches, including Saint Mary's. Our parishioners rallied to take care of each other. The Care Partners continued to support those who needed prayers and outreach. Father Nathan, Deacon Christine, Beth, Megan and Bruce quickly moved to online streaming to offer regular services as well as special programs for our families. A group of parishioners quickly organized to call everyone in the directory to check in and continued to do so over the worst part of the stay-at-home order. Zoom meetings became a channel for spiritual formation and committee business. So many parishioners offered to help in whatever way possible. Souper Supper pivoted to



curbside for much of the quarantine period. We opened our doors to the Red Cross to hold blood drives. What happened here was the embodiment of what Bishop Curry meant when he said so succinctly that "Love is we."

Thank you to everyone for walking the way of love while working to be safe!

Soon, we will kick off our stewardship campaign for 2021. Because of your generosity, we have been able to get through 2020 in a strong position financially. But we understand that the future is still uncertain. Together we are moving forward, in love and in community, even though there is still a great deal of uncertainty. Because we know "love is we," we will emerge stronger.

Saint Mary's Plan for *Indoor Worship*: September - October 2020

In conjunction with Bishop Brown and the Diocesan staff, our Staff, Vestry and using numerous community resources like the Maine CDC and US CDC, we have developed a plan using all the best information on safe gathering during the time of COVID-19. For three successful Sunday in September we have gather for 3 indoor services: at 8, 9:30 and 10:30AM (NOTE CHANGE IN TIME BEGINNING IN OCTOBER). Each liturgy will last about 45 minutes.

In October for both the 8 and 10:30AM, we will gather in our Sanctuary. At 9:30 AM, we will gather for a Guiding RAY family-focused liturgy in the Parish House Auditorium. Each gathering will be limited to 35 people based on the square footage of our spaces. Adult Formation groups will begin at 9:15 AM, and our popular **Be Still** group will meet on *ZOOM* at 9:30. The 10:30 AM Eucharist will be live-streamed on Facebook, and our weekday Noonday Prayers will continue as well. We anticipate offering this structure throughout September and October, but will make adjustments quickly as needed.

What to expect:

- ♦ COVID-19 is a dangerous virus and should be taken seriously by all of us. Attending in-person church services, even with abundant cautions, can be risky for those with compromised immune systems or chronic conditions. Everyone needs to make their own risk assessment and to act accordingly. Continued online streaming and *ZOOM* gatherings will allow us all to be connected safely. No one should feel pressure to attend in-person worship.
- ◆ We will require each attendee to wear a face covering that covers both nose and mouth throughout the liturgy. We will also make liberal use of hand sanitizer before the service.
- Our staff and volunteers will lead these liturgies. Everyone serving will have their temperature checked upon arrival. If their temperature is above 100.4 degrees, that person will be asked to head home immediately. The presiders will be masked except when speaking to the congregation. Only the lectern will be used for the Liturgy of the Word, and seating will begin 16 feet away from the lectern, as recommended by our sources.
- Individuals or household groups will sit at least 6 feet apart from each other. We will have simple measuring rods available for help in determining distance.
- Music will be only instrumental or accompanied by a soloist in the loft (safely distanced from Bruce and the railing). Neither the Choir nor the congregation will sing at this time.
- ♦ We will limit contact extensively by not passing out bulletins, not passing an offering plate, and not making contact to share the passing of Peace. Father Nathan and Deacon Christine will not greet people at the door after the Dismissal.
- ♦ Although COVID-19 is spread primarily by respiratory droplets and not through surface contact, we will give each parishioner a disposable wipe to clean the area around his or her seat as an extra measure of precaution.
- ♦ Communion will be administered in the Bread only. All the bread will be kept covered until it is administered by the clergy. The clergy will wear face coverings and will disinfect their hands before, during and after administration, and will take extra precaution to avoid hand contact with those receiving. Individuals or household groups will receive Communion one at a time, maintaining 6 feet of physical distance. Of course, receiving Communion is optional, as it always is.
- We will provide coffee, tea, water and juice in the Auditorium (or outside as weather permits) throughout the morning, served in compostable cups. There will not be any food provided.
- Nursery care and our Guiding RAY program will be suspended throughout September and October. All families are invited to gather at 9:30 AM on Sundays in the Auditorium with Fr Nathan for a safe family worship time. Also, online programming resources will continue to be offered by Megan Akers, our Guiding RAY Director.

Thank you to all who joined us for the outdoor services and to all who contributed to this plan. Please contact Father Nathan; Deacon Christine; Janet Bowne, Senior Warden; Aaron Splint, Junior Warden, or any other member of the Vestry with questions or comments.


Wear clothes, shoes and gloves for working. All are welcome, and everyone can stay safely in their own household groups.

We come together in Prayer

What Love Builds Will Endure

shared by Merle Marie Troeger

We are living in precarious times – precarious for our health and the health of our democracy. We have a COVID-19 pandemic on our hands with no end in sight. Racial justice issues have come to the fore like never before – even compared to the 1960s. We face an election that is fraught with disinformation, ballot insecurity, a president who says he may not leave office even if he is not re-elected, and a Supreme Court seat that will be filled only after terrible acrimony. It is fair to ask whether our democracy will survive.

And yet, our gospel has a word for us. "What love builds will endure." I can't tell you the book of the Bible that's in, chapter or verse. Yet I can tell you that it is the heart of the Christian gospel. Here's one way I know that.

Some years ago, we visited a friend, a pastor and preacher, who serves a small town in Holland, population maybe 1800 souls. We enjoyed several relaxing (and rainy) days with Jan and his wife Thea. On the morning we left, over our last cup of coffee together, Jan came out with this:

"WHAT LOVE BUILDS WILL ENDURE"

Jan's church has been in that small town since the 1300s. Now that is an old church! It has been through some upheavals, but it has endured. Just think about the Reformation. When the church was built it was a Roman Catholic Church of course—there wasn't any other kind. With the Reformation, it became Protestant. Can you imagine the controversies of those days? There were lengthy and ruinous wars over this very issue. Yet, in that small town, any visitor can see that the list of pastors printed on the wall plaques continues without a break.

During World War II, the church was a prison for all the men and boys in the town. No worship services could be held. The Nazis threatened to burn down the church with all the men and boys in it. They were saved only because the war ended. The parsonage is still covered with signs of the bullets that flew as the war came to a close. But then, services resumed and continue to this very day.

"WHAT LOVE BUILDS WILL ENDURE"

There is no secret that I send this musing in the hope that Jan and the Protestant Church in Gasselte have a powerful word for us at the Church of Saint Mary in Falmouth. What endures is love. What builds us up is love. What keeps us going is love. I mean the kind of nitty-gritty day-to-day respect, affection, and deep commitment to the way of Jesus. Nothing sappy or superficial, just the work of everyday respect for each other's and all others' flourishing and the commitment to loving deeply and honestly. There is no other way.

Organ Concert at Saint Mary's Sunday, October 11, 3 PM

The wonderful concert will feature our own Bruce Fithian and Joel Pierce, Choirmaster and Organist at Saint Alban's Episcopal Church, Cape Elizabeth. Lifeline Screening: October Recognizes Bone and Joint Awareness

A woman's risk of breaking a hip is equal to her risk of developing breast cancer, uterine and ovarian cancer *combined*, according to the National Osteoporosis Foundation website.

The Episcopal Church of Saint Mary is hosting Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings on Monday, October 19, 2020. The screenings provided include an ultrasound of the heel, which is a first-rung osteoporosis risk test. This is an important test to take during October, a month dedicated to recognizing bone and joint disorders such as osteoporosis.

Other screenings include tests to check for blocked carotid arteries, atrial fibrillation, and high blood pressure, which are the three leading risk factors for stroke. Nearly 800,000 strokes will occur this year.

Other tests check for abdominal aortic aneurysms and PAD, also called "hardening of the arteries" in the legs. Many events also offer blood tests, including cholesterol, glucose and c-reactive protein screenings, as well as take-home colon cancer early detection tests.

Screening packages start at \$139. Single tests cost around \$70.

The smoke of the west coast fires that is reaching Maine can be problematic for those with underlying respiratory conditions. Per the USCDC, consider installing a filter (MERV rating 13 or higher) if your home is heated with forced air; stay inside during smoky periods; for face covering, only N95 respirators filter out dangerous smoke-related particles.


