



The Art of The Compromise



Life is all about relationships, and compromise is how relationships remain balanced and healthy. Have you ever heard someone pontificate about the need to never compromise? I can guarantee you that one of two things is true of that person's personal life: either the ordinary compromises of their personal life do not match the heat of their public rhetoric, or else they are consistent about being rigid and consequently their personal lives are a mess! Learning how - and when - to compromise is a vital life skill for all who want to follow Christ.

Did you know that the early church grew and expanded so rapidly because of a compromise? Well, the power of the Holy Spirit is the true primary cause, but the compromise described in the fifteen chapter of Acts is the earthly element that kept the early Church leaders united in their efforts. This was the first major dispute that threatened to tear apart the fabric of this nascent Jesus movement. It pitted those who taught the continued importance of observing the Torah against those who understood faith in Christ as fulfilling the requirements of Torah.

Please read this chapter and notice how the compromise - the via media – was developed through the wise leadership of James the Just, the first Bishop of Jerusalem.

Is it possible to understand the sacrifice of our Lord's Passion and Cross as the ultimate compromise? I think it is. The Incarnation is the divine act that restored the broken link between creation and God. By assuming a created body and all of our human experience, Christ redeemed our bodies and all of creation by infusing them with the light of divinity. So why then did Christ have to die on the Cross? Because of sin. Because of the anger, jealousy, fear and violence of humans. It is WE, not God, who demanded blood sacrifice to appease our anger. To this basic human demand, God capitulated, while knowing beyond a shadow of a doubt that the divine power of Christ could not be held down by any tomb! In my mind, the Cross is the ultimate Sign of Compromise.

Why is compromise a Christ-honoring way to interact with others? Because compromise grows out of humility. Only a humble person can compromise in order to stay in relationship. Only a Humble God can submit to the Cross in order to stay in relationship with a world in need of healing and hope. May all of us have the courage to follow in this way of the Cross and find it to be "none other than the way of life and peace" (Collect for the Palm Sunday Procession, BCP p.272).

From Deacon Christine:

Dear Ones,

A long time ago I had a friend who had an irrational fear of being on bridges. One weekend she and I traveled to Massachusetts together to attend a retreat. On the trip back to Maine, our route took us over a bridge in the Boston area. She was driving, and as we ascended the bridge, her face drained of color, and she was gripping the steering wheel until her knuckles were white. I asked if she was okay, and she shakily responded that she was afraid of bridges! Not a great time to tell me! With a little quiet encouragement, we made it to the other side and the color returned to her face. The benefit of taking that route was a little reduction in our travel time, but it did increase the stress a bit!



Bridges can be amazing feats of engineering genius like the San Francisco bridge or the Brooklyn Bridge. Several times my husband and I traveled the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel, which is utterly amazing. Bridges are all about connection, usually over water, but most importantly how two places and the people in those places can be closer together and able to interact more easily with each other.

For deacons the bridge is a powerful symbol of our ministry in the Church and in the world and the ways in which we make that connection between the parish family and the needs of the larger community family around us. Deacons move freely between Church and world communicating the needs of the world to the Church and the Good News of God in Christ to the world. For those of us who work in secular jobs, the challenge is to represent that love of God without wearing a collar or passing out the newsletter! It can be more about developing mutual relationships between colleagues or employees, listening, guiding, and living in ways that reflect God's message of love and redemption. Deacons are therapists, teachers, doctors, firefighters, business owners, speech therapists, accountants, and writers. Whatever their job maybe they have access to people and their hopes, needs and struggles and have the unique responsibility to bring those needs to the Church to create awareness and encourage engagement by the Church in a variety of ways.

The Church everywhere needs deacons and especially in Maine. In some areas of our beautiful diocese, deacons are fulfilling needs hand in hand with the Church and other agencies that might not be filled otherwise. A call to ordination as a deacon is a call to the Church and a call to serve in the community where you are. Occasionally, I feel the urge to offer this opportunity. If you are feeling a nudge in this direction or are curious to learn more, or know someone who is already doing diaconal work, I would love to hear from you. Lent is the perfect time to wonder and to listen to what your heart may be calling you to do or to be as you grow in your faith.



The first event was a 90-minute session with Bishop Brown that was part of his "visitation" that began with his joining us for the Annual Meeting.


Our time with the Bishop was spent sharing our hopes/ concerns for Saint Mary's. Collectively, we are unclear on how to emerge from COVID-19, whenever that may be, and how we can support our young families as they are managing a lot of stressful challenges.

The second part of the Vestry Retreat was a Vestry meeting on February 10th. The agenda included some business but was mostly composed of education and training around the way the vestry functions, understanding our budget, etc.

The business portion of the meeting included electing Jan Mordarski as the non-voting clerk. Thank you to Jan for offering her time and talent to support the vestry.

We reviewed the Parochial Report, which is a summary of our membership, financials and programs. This report is sent to the Diocese and the national church and used nationally to understand the overall state of the Episcopal church in the United States. It's also a useful teaching tool for the vestry as it's an annual review of where we stand. This year the Parochial Report was adjusted to reflect COVID-19's effect on the parish.

Father Nathan reviewed a draft plan for Holy Week. It's clear that the virus in Maine is declining. It may be temporary but as more people are vaccinated, we need to talk about how we will reopen. We will do so very cautiously and will follow CDC guidelines.

Bishop Brown has encouraged us to consider how and when we will begin to open to the public. You can help us determine this in two ways:

The Rite of Reconciliation

Q. What is Reconciliation of a Penitent?

A. Reconciliation of a Penitent, or Penance, is the rite in which those who repent of their sins may confess them to God in the presence of a priest, and receive the assurance of pardon and the grace of absolution. (The Catechism of the Prayer Book, p.861)



The Rite of Reconciliation is a wonderful gift to the members of the Church. Unlike the Vatican, it is never required for us Anglicans. Instead, it is offered as a beautiful opportunity for one to clear one's conscience and to receive a personal and direct word of absolution. The memorable Anglican guideline for Reconciliation is this: **ALL MAY, NONE MUST, SOME SHOULD**. All may utilize this rite as a way to connect with the forgiveness of God in a personal way. No one is required to do this, but there are some who should in order to experience relief from the heavy burdens that they have carried for too long.

There are two forms in the Prayer Book (p.447-452). The first is a shorter form that is similar to the traditional Roman confession, while the second is longer and drawn from the Eastern Orthodox tradition. Either one can be used at any time and in any place. Many Christians throughout the world include this as part of their Lenten discipline, as an annual way to "clear the air" with God before the Paschal celebration arrives.

If you are interested in scheduling time for this with Fr Nathan, please contact the Parish Office and we will be glad to make this happen. Remember, of course, that everything spoken in this setting is held in absolute confidentiality.

Music During Lent 2021

Bruce Fithian will post an organ recital for Lent, playing our beautiful Casavant instrument. The program will begin with the first movement of a Double Violin Concerto arranged by J.S. Bach. Then, there will be pieces particularly suited for this time of year: June Nixon's 'Chaconne for Good Friday,' a very beautiful and haunting 'Prelude on a Solemn Theme by Thomas Tallis'. The theme is the melody by Tallis from our hymn book, hymn # 692 'I heard the voice of Jesus, say' which was also made famous by Ralph Vaughan Williams in his 'Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis'. There will also be a sublime work by Dietrich Buxtehude, the Passcaglia in d minor.

The Saint Mary Schola will be offering a Lenten video as well. This program will include a beautiful trio sonata for two violins, cello and organ by Arcangelo Corelli (Michael Albert, Lauren Hasting Genova and Philip Carlsen), a setting of 'Salve Regina' (One of the famous Marian anti-



phons: Hail, Holy Queen) by Marc Antoine Charpentier for two sopranos and alto (Christine Letcher, Erin Chenard, and Abra Mueller), and the 'Third Lesson of Tenebrae' for Maundy Thursday by François Couperin for two sopranos and organ (Jennifer Bates and Molly Harmon). Although we will not be able to meet together, we can enjoy the blessings of comforting music, thanks to technology and the very much appreciated assistance of Kue John Lor for filming, recording and editing.



What is Lent for?

Here's a detail from a scene on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. You can probably picture the whole scene in your mind's eye. There's Adam with his arm languidly outstretched as if he's just woken up from a nap. The beefy Creator leans in, almost touching Adam's index finger, but not quite.

Years ago I saw a reproduction of the entire painting – with a twist. A cartoon speech bubble rises above God who says, "KEEP IN TOUCH."

I think that may be what Lent is about. We were created to stay in touch with the God who energizes each atom, made us

out of the dust of stars and is as close as our own hemoglobin. We are so likely to forget that. St. Augustine (354-430) writes about his conversion in *The Confessions*. He speaks about the moment he began to realize that God was always inviting him into relationship. He prays,

Late have I loved you, O Beauty, so ancient and so new, late have I loved you.
For behold, you were within me and I was outside.
You were with me and I was not with you.

St. Paul is getting at the same idea when he quotes a Greek poet to the Athenians in Acts 17. He says that God gave breath to all things

so they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him – though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For in him we live and move and have our being.

So let's not make Lent too complicated. It's simply a time to try a variation on Augustine's prayer:


You **are** with me and I **am** with you.



You are invited to join The Wisdom Seekers






Did You Know?

Major Taylor, cyclist, 1878-1932

Marshall Walter "Major" Taylor dominated sprint cycling, and became the second Black athlete to win a world championship in any sport. He did so despite prejudice from fellow riders, who would sometimes refuse to compete against him or try to harm him. One rival even attacked Taylor and choked him unconscious after losing to him. Many consider Taylor to be the first Black American celebrity athlete.


