



### Whose Lives Matter?



As I write this, today (May 25) is the one-year anniversary of the death of George Floyd. Much has transpired in our nation since that tragic event on the streets of Minneapolis, and many of us have been asking difficult questions about the legacy and the future of our nation. Let me tell you about one way these things have impacted me.

Since the death of George Floyd, it has become a personal goal of mine to become less white: to not listen to music by white artists, to not read books by white authors, to not listen to news from white media personalities, to not speak with only white people, to not eat food that white people typically eat. This has become a new spiritual discipline for me, but not because I am ashamed of who God has made me to be, and not because I want to become something different than what I am. As the divine apostle said so well, "By the grace of God, I am what I am, and God's grace toward me has not been in vain" (1 Corinthians 15.10). I know who I am and am comfortable in my own skin. Therefore, I undertake this discipline with intention,

because God's grace has called me to step outside of my comfort zone and to learn about life from the perspective of others.

I will not suggest that any of you need to join me in this spiritual discipline of becoming less white, but I will suggest that all of you – regardless of who you are – need to intentionally find ways to step out of your own comfort zone and to learn about life from the vantage point of those different than you. If you only listen to those who think and speak and look like you, then you are on a certain path to spiritual stagnation and decay. That is the broad and easy way that leads to death and destruction, while Jesus calls us to take the narrow and difficult path which leads to life (Matthew 7.13-14).

Every life matters. That is an article of faith for us as Christians. No human is expendable or without value. As disciples of Jesus, we have also agreed to take up the Lord's burden of demonstrating God's love and compassion for those on the margins of society, for those ignored and brushed aside, for those without power and influence, for those whose voices are silenced by the majority. To do that, we must listen to these neighbors of ours and get to know them. Even if this means falling out of step with the majority opinion around you, or subjecting yourself to ridicule by interrupting racist jokes by members of your family, choose the narrow path that leads to abundant life. Push yourself to grow and to become more, by the grace of God. I promise you that you will not regret it.

November 14 will be my last Sunday at Saint Mary's before beginning this mobilization. By God's grace, I intend to be back to celebrate the Holy Eucharist with you on Kickoff Sunday 11 September 2022. The Vestry has begun planning for temporary clergy leadership by appointing a Hiring Committee who will locate candidates and define the Letter of Agreement to be used with my temporary replacement

Thank you again for your support of me as your parish priest and also as a Navy Chaplain, and for your ongoing support of my family.




Father Nathan opened with a teaching moment about feast days.

Jana Burke, chair of Sparkles, joined us to share an update on Sparkles. 2020 presented many challenges but the volunteers rallied with enthusiasm and creativity. She thanked the staff and vestry for allowing the flexibility. Sparkles is a different type of ministry as it brings together people from the community and our church with strong connections. The money it raises is definitely important, but it's fun, and during COVID, gave volunteers a focus and connection. Since the beginning of this year, Sparkles has raised over \$9,000. Jana also shared that she is stepping down after 2021. The vestry shared its thanks to Jana and all the volunteers for all their hard work.

Treasurer Ben Parks-Stamm shared the financial reports. We are grateful for the financial support. Giving is steady, expenses are increasing, which is expected as we reopen.

We discussed the Bishop's request to support the Lebanon to Lincoln (Academy) initiative. Each Parish is being asked to contribute \$3000 over the next three years.

We discussed Father Nathan's mobilization to Bahrain. The vestry voted to form a hiring committee to find coverage for his time away. This committee will be composed of vestry and parishioners. Father Nathan and Beth Shaw will serve as ex officio members. The committee will be formed quickly, and the Vestry will meet again on 5/26/2021 via zoom to approve the membership.

# Hope Gardens – Overcoming the Stigma Associated with Mental Health Challenges

Last fall, the Saint Mary's Outreach Committee and parishioners planted 500 tulip bulbs in support of "Smashing Stigma around Mental illness" in partnership with "The Yellow Tulip Project." Over the winter, that partnership served to remind us all that "in dark times, it is important to reach out and get the help you need and to never forget how loved you are loved"—and that we need to talk about mental health, not be silenced by shame.





The Yellow Tulip Project was founded by Falmouth resident Julia Hansen to create a space for determined youth to "eradicate stigma, build community and inspire productive conversation about how to combat the rising rates of suicide. "Julia struggled with depression in middle school and high school: "The deafening silence and stigma that surrounds this topic kept her from reaching out for help." We thank the many parishioners who planted these bulbs and hope that all who have visited St. Mary's campus this spring were lifted up by the beauty of these tulips. Let us not forget their message: "To help others realize that even in the darkest places, hope is always there and suicide should never be an option." Saint Mary's is honored to join The Yellow Tulip Project in seeking to help people know that there are ways to get help, people there for them and that circumstances can and will change."

#### Caring for God's Creation - Insight from the Outreach Committee

Spring Eco-Tip!

Healthy soil is the key to having a lush, green lawn. A soil test should be done at least every three years and before you decide to add any fertilizer or lime. You can get a free soil test kit from the UMaine Extension Office in Falmouth, or through the Cumberland County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Start the mowing season strong with a great cut from the start. Mow grass at 2" to start and increase to 3" for the rest of the season. Always leave grass clippings on the lawn for free, natural fertilizer!

#### In the Garden

Here in Maine, it's the time of year when many of us are spending more time in the garden. Perhaps we're growing vegetables or flowers, or perhaps we're just enjoying the friendly sights in a neighbor's garden. It brings to mind a gardening book my mother used to have called *How to Have a Green Thumb without an Aching Back*. It featured organic gardening tips and this thoughtful point of view:

Working in the garden . . . gives me a profound feeling of inner peace. Nothing here is in a hurry. There is no rush toward accomplishment, no blowing of trumpets. Here is the great mystery of life and growth. Everything is changing, growing, aiming at something, but silently, unboastfully, taking its time.

It strikes me that this is also a great description of the spiritual life. My outer life goes on with all its business and expectation. I go from one thing to the next. Some things get accomplished. Others don't. I attach great



importance to some of those things. Meanwhile, within, something occasionally stirs. A new insight arrives. A new hope is born. A new struggle emerges.

Most days I go outside to look at the garden, whether I'm going to work in it that day or not. I go to see what's come up, what needs trimming, pruning, fertilizing, deadheading. I plan what I'll do the next time I work outside. I imagine what I will plant next, what I'll transplant, what I'll leave alone. Sometimes I just look with pleasure at what is. The parallels with prayer are inescapable to me.

Paul Tillich used an expression for God that didn't mean much to me until I began a garden. He referred to the Divine as "Ground of Be-

ing." If you've ever turned over soil, dug in it, planted a seed and watched it grow and bloom, produce fruit or flower, it makes sense. Everything the plant needs is there in the soil. Add sun and rain, also gifts of the Divine. Yet it helps to cultivate, pick the right plant for the right place, add compost, cultivate and fertilize, maybe mulch to keep down the weeds.

At this time of year I'm thinking of my spiritual life as tending a garden and watching what happens. The quiet, steady, slow mystery unfolds – and I have a part in it.




#### **Eunice Hunton Carter, prosecutor, 1899-1970**

Carter was the first African American woman in New York state to serve as assistant district attorney. She was part of the legal team that brought down notorious mob boss Charles "Lucky" Luciano, and her painstaking investigative skills led to his conviction. Later in her life, Carter chaired a committee at the United Nations.
