The Psalms: the Heart of our Prayer Book



What is the central core of the Book of Common Prayer around which everything else revolves? It is not the Eucharist, as crucial as that is to our common worship on the Lord's Day. It is the Psalter, or the book of the Psalms. These 150 Psalms from the Hebrew Bible take up nearly one-quarter of the entire Prayer Book. Perhaps even more noteworthy is the fact that there is not a single liturgy in the Prayer Book (or in any supplemental liturgies authorized by General Convention) that does not include praying one or more Psalms as an integral aspect of that gathering.

In keeping with the ancient Christian tradition, and building on the tradition of our Hebrew spiritual ancestors, we understand that the Church never gathers to worship God without the communal praying of the Psalms. In addition to the Lord's Prayer, the Psalms are the indispensable core of all Christian worship.

It is said that, in the early Church, a person would not be considered for ordination unless they could demonstrate that they had memorized all 150 Psalms. I'm not sure how that is even possible, and perhaps it is hyperbole, but it does illustrate how central the

Psalms have always been to the life of the Church.

But have you ever taken the time to pray through all of the Psalms? If you do, you will quickly notice how every human emotion is expressed within them. This means that some of them are quite difficult to pray, and the words of the Psalm rarely match up perfectly with our own emotions as we pray them. But that is okay. After all, the Psalms are the Prayer Book of the whole Church, and the Church prays these Psalms. For some part of the Body of Christ, those words you are praying are providing life and hope, even if you yourself do not connect with them.

You see, what praying the Psalms reminds us is that it is not about you. And it has never been about you! Yes, we bring the concerns of our hearts to God in prayer, but when we pray the Psalms, we are joining the Church in prayer, the worldwide Body of Christ who is collectively experiencing every human emotion at each moment. And we are representing our collective humanity before the throne of God, interceding on behalf of all people.

The most difficult parts of the Psalter are called the imprecatory Psalms. These are the verses when judgment and calamity are called down on the enemies of the people. From our position of privilege, these words can seem out of character, as if the call to love our neighbors as ourselves has been forgotten. However, these Psalms were composed among people who did not have power and privilege, people who most often were oppressed and downtrodden. Their perspective is from the bottom side of the social hierarchy. They recognize that the use of power against others is contrary to God's will for humanity and that those who walk "in the counsel of the wicked" (Psalm 1.1) will reap the suffering that they themselves have

Nothing has changed among humanity on this front. Most of the Church today is found on the bottom side of the social hierarchy. Most Christians today are poor and without power. Bringing our grief and sorrow to God in prayer is cathartic, and it allows us to let go of the need for revenge. After all, God is in charge.

My friends, if you want to learn how to pray, immerse yourself in the Psalms, as if you are immersing yourself in the waters of a mighty river that has flowed vigorously through the land of humanity for thousands of years. Throw yourself in and allow yourself to be carried along in its current. At times it will feel strange and uncomfortable. That is good. It means you are moving outside of yourself and into the larger realm of God's dwelling among humanity.

The Vestry met on June 16 in person! We reviewed our financials, and we continue to fare well. However, summer is a time when many are away and pledge payments lag. The audit is underway.



Outreach Ministry - All Ages Serving Near and Far

Long Creek Youth Center and Friends of Long Creek Evolve

The pandemic halted all volunteering at Long Creek, so the small but faithful Saint Mary's group who served one of the units has not been there for over a year—just as the number of youth in the facility shrunk from 100 eight years ago to about 25 today.

The future of the Long Creek facility itself is still being considered, as two separate bills that mandate closure are under consideration by the Governor. One mandates a closure without any detailed plan for building alternative treatment facilities. A second bill also mandates closure in 2023, but requires spending money on alternative treatment facilities.

The risk of both these bills is that the facility will close without any strong treatment alternatives put in place for the youth.

For all of the public concerns and critical debates about the facility, Long Creek has been a place where Saint Marians could interact with, learn from and help young people, and the staff has long provided much to youth in need, including mentoring, college classes and job training. It is hoped that those programs will not be lost if it is decided that youth who need treatment or incarceration are placed in disparate, separated settings.


The Friends of Long Creek, which has received significant and much appreciated support from Saint Mary's, is also going through a process of assessment and evaluation to adjust its work to the potential changes in corrections. The Friends have been building alliances and gathering information from other groups working in youth services, to see if they can work together and find new ways to support kids in the criminal justice system, both inside and out of Long Creek.

Welcome from St. Elizabeth's Jubilee Center!!



"What We Talk About When We Talk About Love" shared by Merle Marie Troeger

That's the title of a short story by Raymond Carver. Two couples are sitting around a kitchen table and the subject turns to love. What draws me to the story is the character Theresa, Terri for short. She had lived with Ed, an abusive man who, as Terri's new husband Mel describes him, "loved her so much he tried to kill her."

Terri refused to submit to Ed's abuse and appropriately left him and married Mel, yet she insists on describing her relationship with Ed as "love." "There was love there," she says. After Terri left, Ed tried to kill himself twice. Over Mel's vehement objection, Terri was at Ed's bedside when he died.



Am I making too much of this? Is it going too far to suggest that Terri is pointing to the thing that is Christ-like about love? Is this why we are asked to pray for enemies as well as friends and family? Is this why Jesus could pray from the cross, "Father, forgive them"? I don't have any idea if Raymond Carver thought about it this way, but he's made me think about the power of God's love.

With Terri's very human example, I believe that love is there when we intentionally step into the potent stream of God's love that is flowing all the time. We make a decision to insert ourselves directly into that river of love, perhaps holding another person's hand in healing prayer. We consent to let the tide of love flow over us. Now we are not afraid to ask for the heal-

ing we really desire. We cross the boundary of our understanding into the country of healing streams.

There's more. When we pray for others, we add our love to the flood of love that is already sweeping over us. Intercession means we express our love and our willingness to join God in the healing of persons, situations, and the world. Terri gives me a glimpse of the love that surpasses human understanding. No one else at that kitchen table could get it, but I'll bet you've known someone who has loved beyond all expectation. There is so much healing in that. I'd love to hear your stories. 

Tip of the Month



Properly dispose your unwanted or expired prescriptions/pet medications in a Drug Disposal Box at your local law enforcement agency

Track and lock up prescriptions and pet medications to prevent accidental poisonings or theft
