# For the Common Good



"That it may please thee to inspire us, in our several callings, to do the work which thou givest us to do with singleness of heart as thy servants, and for the common good" (from The Great Litany, BCP p.151).

Debates are raging across this nation about the best way to start a school year while the coronavirus pandemic continues to infect and kill thousands of Americans each week. Now that a vaccine has been approved by the FDA for regular use, conflicts over vaccine mandates by private and public employers have become a regular occurrence. All of this is perhaps inevitable in a culture that prizes individual expression and personal freedom above all else. But those of us who have promised to follow and obey Jesus Christ as our Lord see this scenario in a very different light. We never treasure our personal freedoms above the needs of others. We see everything we do in society as an opportunity to serve God and the common good. Our freedoms are vitally important, of course. But they are important, not so that we can protect our fearful selves and indulge our selfish instincts,

but so that we can freely choose to serve the good of all as the Holy Spirit leads us.

Whatever you do when you leave your home on a regular weekday, that is your God-given ministry. You are an ambassador of Christ, whether you are in a school or in a garden or in an office or in a supermarket. But how do you go about representing Christ well in those situations? First of all, with prayer. Pray and ask God to guide you and inspire you before each class or each meeting. Then reflect and consider which course of action will result in the most benefit for the most number of people. Does this decision benefit primarily me and my family, or is it intended to benefit others?

The great privilege we have of being the Body of Christ in society is that everything we do is imbued with meaning and purpose. Nothing is unimportant because each action is an opportunity to demonstrate love for God and our neighbors. This requires awareness, of course. So wherever your ministry takes you this autumn, and whatever debates you find yourself embroiled in, may the Holy Spirit inspire you and give you the grace needed to maintain this awareness and to serve the common good in all things.


## WITH GLADNESS: Answering God's Call in Our Everyday Lives

Sparkles continues to bring in revenue due to sales from Facebook marketplace. Our Buildings and Grounds expenses are higher than expected but we need to maintain the property.


The Audit Committee has completed their work and are working on their report.




## Fritz Pollard, NFL player and coach, 1894-1986

Did You Know? At 5 feet, 9 inches and 165 pounds, Pollard was small for football. Still, he bulldozed barriers on and off the field. He joined the Akron Pros of the American Professional Football Association, which later became the NFL. In 1921, while still a player, the team also named him its coach – the first African American head coach in league history. He would go on to coach four different teams and launch a Chicago football team of all-African American players. Pollard was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005.

# From Jeff Morgan, our GR Coordinator

It's time to kick off a new year with the Guiding RAY children's ministry at Saint Mary's! We are excited to welcome your children back for a time of friendship, fellowship, and activities after a long break because of COVID.

What is Guiding RAY? Guiding RAY is what we call the children's education program at Saint Mary's. It's a time for children from birth to 6th grade to make friends, learn about Jesus, and grow in their faith. It takes place from 9:30am-11am each Sunday morning and then children (except those in the nursery) join their parent(s) for communion in the sanctuary.

What should my child expect on Sunday mornings? Every Sunday, we hope to be able to share a little bit with your child about Jesus and how a relationship with him is an integral part of their life! From 9:30-10am, we will have Formation time for all ages. This will be an informal time where the kids can do crafts, play, have a snack, and perhaps play outside if the weather is nice! At 10 am, children can expect a short gathering time with all the school-aged kids where we sing and learn about the church calendar. After that, based on the number of children we have, Pre-K - Grade 3 will be together and Grades 4 - 6 will be together for an age-appropriate Bible lesson.

**Are masks required?** Yes! As we begin this new school year, masks will be required to be worn by all those not in the Nursery. We will monitor the practices of local school districts and adjust as the year progresses.

How else can my child participate in the life of the church? During our Guiding RAY time, we will incorporate learning and opportunities to serve others - whether it's making cards for the home-bound or writing an uplifting note to veterans. Additionally, for the older children, acolyting is an opportunity where they can plug in on Sunday mornings. The children will also do a Christmas pageant in December.

How can I help? Can anyone volunteer? YES! We need volunteers every Sunday to help Guiding RAY run smoothly! The commitment is low, and the reward is high. 
