I asked our beloved Tom Troeger who died recently why he and Merle Marie settled at Saint Mary's when they moved to Maine. As a professor at Yale Divinity School, he had seen many churches and had a discerning eye. He said that they came one Sunday to Saint Mary's as they were church shopping and heard God spoken in the worship service as well as over coffee afterwards. The Troegers stayed and have contributed so wonderfully to the conversation of God.

Saint Mary's does speak of God in all that we do. God is our anchor in these turbulent times. When many of us were bereft at what was happening in Ukraine, we turned to the comforting words in scripture, prayer, and poetry. The *Compass of Compassion*, sent daily by email, contain a daily reminder that God does care and weeps with us. Since its inception, over 80 people have subscribed to this wonderful gift that arrives in our inbox Monday through Friday.

In my work as a traveling church consultant, I have learned to judge the health of a church by how the parishioners are anchored in God. Saint Mary's welcomes doubters, seekers, and believers to 'talk God.' This conversation is evident in our *Be Still* programs as well as the beautiful worship services. We offer the prayer of silence and inquiry as well as in the liturgy and music. Our robust outreach programs care for the hungry and homeless with soup and smiles and sustenance, and we serve in gratitude for God's abundant love.

Our doors are open; come talk about God.


Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

Bruce and Kue walking the Camino

Bruce and Kue John Lor begin their walk on the Camino de Compostela April 29, and if all goes well, 33 days and 483 miles later, they will reach the Cathedral of Santiago (pictured to the right.) This pilgrimage route has been used since the medieval ages, and it will be thrilling to walk the paths of folks from centuries ago and visit the many churches, chapels, monasteries, convents and huge cathedrals along the way. Santiago is Spanish for James, one of the twelve apostles and first to be martyred in AD 44. According to tradition that can be traced back to the 12th century in the Codex Calixtinus (housed in the Santiago archives/library), Saint James decided to return to the Holy Land after preaching in Galicia. There he was beheaded, but his disciples transported his body back to Galicia. The site then became a revered pilgrimage destination, and today over 200,000 people travel to Santiago each year. We are hoping that May will be a less hectic time of year, but in any case, part of the charm of walking the camino is meeting people from all over the world. Our route is known as 'el camino francés', and begins in France in the southeastern town of Saint-Jean-Pied-de-Port. The first day's walk is pretty strenuous over the Pyrenees into Spain. Then the route continues through the provinces of Navarre (Pamplona), La Rioja (excellent wine), Castile y León (huge cathedrals in Burgos and León), and finally Galicia (where some days we will climb to 4,260 feet).

My plan is that during the lenten season of 2023, the St Mary Schola will present a concert 'A Pilgrim's Progress' based on the music from this manuscript and other repertoire associated with Santiago. *Para todos, nos deseamos un buen camino!* (For all, we wish each other a good camino!)

The Vembas are currently parishioners of a South Portland church but were anxious to see Saint Mary's and were delighted to meet Rev. Jane, Janet Bowne and several parishioners. Their comment after their visit: "Lovely service, lovely people." It was a very special, meaningful day for the family and for Saint Mary's! Since November, parishioners have opened their hearts and pocketbooks to the Vembas, making their first winter in Maine so much easier.

Hopefully, their time at the Quality Inn in South Portland will end in May. They should be moving to a permanent home (apartment) in Westbrook. Family Promise is working with Furniture Friends to outfit the home with furniture and arrange delivery. Saint Mary's has a room full of collected household essentials and, once they move, I'm sure more items will appear on the "needs list."

Joao is working with an attorney on the asylum process, which will be an expensive, lengthy, and difficult road. He's had the intake meeting and received very encouraging feedback regarding his case. Thanks to two very generous donations from parishioners to help with legal fees, Joao will soon be able to start this arduous process.

In his words, "Saint Mary's has done so much for us, and we are highly grateful for everything. We still can't believe how blessed we are to be adopted by Saint Mary's. Not many families get such an opportunity. My wife and I are truly grateful. There aren't words that can ever explain how lucky we are to have you supporting us."

We pray the Vembas will soon leave the Quality Inn in South Portland and start building their lives in Westbrook!

We have all been in those uncomfortable...sometimes threatening...situations when we witness incidents that demand our intervention. How to do that safely and effectively? You will gain awareness and tools to safely and effectively intervene when you witness incidents from microaggressions to threats of harm based on race, gender, sexual orientation, immigration or housing status, and other factors. Learn methods

for managing adrenalin, assessing situations, and engaging other bystanders all with the goal of increasing the safety of the person or group targeted. Explore the concepts of calling in vs. calling out and ways to assist that respect the autonomy and choices of the person(s) targeted.

With the evolving virus, curbside delivery will continue through May. We will review any in-person possibilities on a month-by-month basis. Stay tuned!







Annual Journey to Baxter State Park—August 18-20, 2022

Since Father Nathan will not be here in August to lead the charge up Katahdin, we've decided to go to South Branch Campground (lakeside camp) in the northern part of the Park for a change. It has a stunning view of Katahdin across the lake, there are many hiking trails, a rigorous climb up the Travelers for those seeking a Katahdin-like adventure, and canoe and kayak rentals (\$1/hr) for those who'd like to paddle or fish. This is primitive camping—no electricity, no cell service, no running water or showers (the pit toilets are very clean) and any trash brought in must be taken out. We reserve both lean-tos and a tent site (we share the cost among participants). Meals (with the exception of lunch) are catered at cost by the Hirschmans.
