

It is customary in an Islamic society for Muslims to greet one another with the Arabic greeting "As salamu alaykum," which in English means "peace be with you." Non-Muslims like you and me are greeted with an ordinary "Hello" or "Good morning/afternoon." But the Islamic greeting is more than a simple hello. As Salam is one of the 99 Names of God within the Qur'an, so the greeting has a deeper meaning, which is "God, who is the source of all peace, be with you." It is a beautiful, simple and holy way to share a blessing with those around you in the course of an ordinary day.

Do you know who spoke in this way 600 years before the first Muslim communities formed in Arabia? Hopefully you do! The Risen Christ greeted the disciples in exactly the same words (Luke 24.36; John 20.19,21,26). They spoke to one another in Aramaic, which is as similar to the Arabic language as Spanish is to Italian. If you have read through the New Testament Epistles, you will likely recall that Saint Paul regularly began his letters with a similar greeting. While it is likely that the Church continued this practice in our first few centuries, this way of greeting one another with intentionality and mindfulness has been sadly lost in our Western societies, even while being picked up and carried forward by Muslim communities of faith.

But what if we could bring it back? What if we made an attempt to recover this forgotten part of our own heritage, as one small step toward reinvigorating our daily lives with a sense of holy purpose? Of course, we are all quite used to the liturgical greeting and response: "The Lord be with you, and also with you." And we know that what we do in the liturgy is intended to be practice that shapes and informs our everyday lives. Furthermore, we know that the Qur'an is indeed correct in acknowledging God as the source of all peace. So what about a mindful practice of greeting one another in the same way? "Peace be with you, and also with you." The goal of such a practice (like any spiritual practice) is not to fulfill some external requirement, but rather to infuse everyday tasks with an intentional love and blessing that reflect the nature of God. This is how we participate in turning our daily prayer of "your kingdom come, your will be done" into practical reality. For without any doubt, we know that God's will is peace.

God willing, when I return to Maine in mid-September, I look forward to greeting each one of you, and all of you together, with the peace and blessing of Christ. Thank you for all that you have done over the last 10 months to keep our parish community together, to grow closer to God, and to support Erin and my household during a challenging season of life. Now, I can't wait to join you and get back to work! Peace be with you!

# Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The Vestry met on August 17, 2022.

Financial Review: We continue to keep an eye on our revenue sources. Pledges are down a bit, but other revenue like parish hall rental is strong. We, like everyone, continue to deal with inflation hitting our bottom line. Hopefully things will level out in the near future.

Marian McCue and Nadine Timberlake were elected to serve on the nominating committee with Darren Clark, Tommy Pettingill and Rick Hirschman. They will work to slate 3 vestry members and one two-year term replacing Steve Conley as Steve is now the Junior Warden. They will also slate our convention delegates for 2023.

The Vestry also expressed its support for Janet Bowne's continued role as Senior Warden. Her term is up in January of 2023.

On Sunday, September 18, Deacon Christine along with Mary Lee Wile will lead a discussion regarding the work of a deacon. This will be a helpful discussion as Deacon Christine will be retiring in October, and we will need to work with the Diocese on finding another deacon.

Father Nathan will soon be back in Norfolk, VA following his deployment to Bahrain. The plan is for him to be back in the office on Monday, September 19 and back in the pulpit on September 25. Steve Reeves, Vestry member and Naval reservist is working on a plan for welcoming Father Nathan back. We will prepare a briefing book for him that will include updates from all aspects of our parish life.

Reverend Jane shared some final thoughts about her time at Saint Mary's.

Saint Mary's has been a good experience, and she has found the parish to be friendly and healthy and with a good sense of working together.

Reverend Jane is especially pleased with the lay leadership within the parish. She hopes that the Vestry will keep that spirit going and to always be welcoming to new faces and friends.

She also shared that Beth Shaw is the heart and soul of the parish and keeps it all together. Saint Mary's needs to appreciate her value. She also recommended that the parish needs to be sure it knows what it wants the rector to do. The Vestry/lay leadership should always be able to let the priest-in-charge know what is needed and expected.

Robin Webber is coordinating Coffee Hours and need hosts. She has simplified the needs and work involved. Aaron Splint's family would like to plant a tree in Aaron's honor on the grounds. Lucy Ellis put together a proposal having consulted the garden club experts. The vestry approved this request.


The Nominating Committee is seeking nominations of parishioners to serve in the following positions:

- · Delegates to the 2023 Diocesan Convention



It's time to kick off a new year with the Guiding RAY children's ministry at Saint Mary's! Come anytime after 9:30


We are excited to welcome your children back for a time of friendship, fellow-

ship, and activities after our summer break.

What is Guiding RAY? Guiding RAY is what we call the children's education program at Saint Mary's. It's a time for children from birth to sixth grade to make friends, learn about Jesus, and grow in their faith. It takes place from 9:30am-11am each Sunday morning and then children (except those in

the nursery) join their parent(s) for communion in the sanctuary.

What should my child expect on Sunday mornings? Every Sunday, we hope to be able to share a little bit with your child about Jesus and how a relationship with him is an integral part of their life! From 9:30-10am, we will have formation time for all ages. This will be an informal time where the kids can do crafts, play, have a snack, and perhaps play outside if the weather is nice! At 10 am, children can expect a short gathering time with all the school-aged kids where we sing and learn about the church calendar. After that based on the number of ch



we sing and learn about the church calendar. After that, based on the number of children we have, Pre-K - Grade 3 will be together and Grades 4 - 6 will be together for an age-appropriate Bible lesson.

How else can my child participate in the life of the church? During our Guiding RAY time, we will incorporate learning and opportunities to serve others - whether it's making cards for the home-bound or writing an uplifting note to veterans. Additionally, for the older children, acolyting is an opportunity where they can plug in on Sunday mornings. The children will also do a Christmas pageant in December.

# Souper Supper - 13 Years And Still A "Community Must!"

Saint Mary's "Souper Supper" has become such a Saint Mary's "staple" that it can be overlooked by many a parishioner. But to those who participate in this ministry and most certainly for those in the community who

depend on it, it is anything but commonplace.

Souper Supper began in June of 2009 in response to the 2008 recession. The Parish opened its doors and heart to the community, offering home-made soup, salads, breads, beverages and desserts at no charge (and no donation). With the exception of the first 18 months of the pandemic, all guests ever since have enjoyed being served at table in a relatively elegant setting that includes tablecloths, "real" dishes, glassware and cutlery. (During the pandemic we offered Drive-Thru Take Out) At its inception, we welcomed an average 20 guests. This grew to 80 during the recession and then moderated to 40-50 peopleboth parishioners and members of the greater community. At its inception, our guests came, ate quick-



ly and left. Soon they came to dine, chat and table-hop. There is no question but that our guests, who include both parishioners and greater community, seek both nutritional and social sustenance. It is community at its best.

Souper Supper is also one the most popular Outreach projects among its volunteers:

"Being part of the Souper Supper experience is fun, fulfilling, heartwarming and delicious! We laugh and chat and engage with fellow parishioners and new friends. It is a timeless few hours with real joy to be shared. Giving and receiving takes place spontaneously and constantly," wrote Becky and Doug Pride in 2009. (The Prides, are among several parishioners who continue to volunteer regularly today.)

As we build our "in person" ministry back to pre-pandemic levels, we would love to have you join our team! We ask our team members to provide their time once every 6-8 weeks on average; if you cannot serve on any given week, we find a replacement for you; some of our volunteers take summers off; a few love to serve every month, sometimes twice a month! Setting tables, serving at table or helping dish-up in the kitchen is a wonderful opportunity for the whole family—children love it! Just ask the Rana family!

Check out the sign-up sheet in the Guild Room foyer. The various opportunities follow:

Shopping for ingredients: (1 hour, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday of the month)

Make or purchase desserts (30 pieces): 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday of the month)

Soup Prep: (Morning, 2 hours; 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Friday of the month)

Set-up—set tables, plate desserts, make coffee 3-4pm, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Friday of the month)

Dish-up soups/salads/rolls from the kitchen: 4:45-7pm, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Friday of the month

Serve at Table: 4:45-7pm, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Friday of the month.

Clean-up—wash and put away dishes: 5-7:30, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> Friday of the month Laundry – wash (no iron) tablecloths and dishtowels, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> weekend of the month

Souper Supper is funded both through the Outreach Committee AND through sales to parishioners of Coffee by Design coffee (see separate ad).

Joao Vemba, Belinda Ndelela Kande and children, Erica and Nicholas, are seeking asylum. After receiving his college degree, Joao became an electrical engineer for Samsung. He and his wife speak fluent English.

#### **Update on the Vemba family**

The Vemba family is looking forward to the upcoming school year. Erica will be in the first grade, and Nicholas will be in preschool, both attending Saccarappa Elementary in Wesbrook. Nicholas has qualified for a special educational program to help with his speech, learning and socialization. The issue they are dealing with now is transportation to and from school for Nicholas, as the school/town does not provide transportation for preschoolers. He goes every day from 9-12noon, and school istwo miles from their apartment. Joao is hoping once school starts that opportunities will become available. In the meantime, he has a friend who has offered to help.

Belinda and Joao continue to take courses at Portland Adult Ed, and their plan is to start in January at SMCC with classes working towards degrees in electrical engineering and healthcare.

Joao still has not heard from Boston regarding receipt of his asylum-seeking application. It was submitted 45 days ago, but according to his attorney there is a back log. All he needs is the confirmation that Boston received it, which allows him to begin the 6-month waiting process needed in order to start working.

There are some among us in the Saint Mary's community who consistently stand out as leaders in the parish, who take the initiative to offer new opportunities for us to learn and grow, and who work tirelessly to have us move closer to God's vision of what we might do to further God's kingdom here on Earth.

Jennifer Gregg comes to mind when we think of these people, and we as a committee and a parish want to pay tribute to her as she steps down after years as chair and member of the Outreach Committee. Her energy and leadership have been inspiring in this role, as it is in so many roles she has taken on for the church. She has been the creator of and driving force behind so many Outreach programs that it is difficult to mention them all here.


Souper Supper, one of the church's most significant programs in which parishioners feed those who are hungry, is Jennifer's brainchild and passion. Her enthusiasm, devotion and desire to serve others has provided a foundation on which many people rely for physical, emotional, and spiritual sustenance. The friendships formed and the bonds made through Souper Supper have benefited not only those who come to be fed but also those of us who serve.

As Bonny Rodden described her leadership, "Jennifer is efficient and organized, but her true calling is believing that the essence of Outreach is connecting with individuals, one-on-one, treating everyone from a lonely person at Souper Supper to a person in recovery with compassion and respect."

Jennifer has also shepherded a series of programs for the parish on the Opioid Crisis and another program on Stigma. These programs brought panelists into the church to talk about their struggles with addiction and mental health issues, and they won accolades from the Falmouth police and the state director of opioid response.

And Jennifer was always striving, in her own words, "to draw parish and community wide-attention to social issues and promote involvement and participation by parishioners." She found many ways to do that, and her unwavering and enthusiastic leadership resulted in many programs coming to fruition.

Jennifer led the call for Saint Mary's to embrace and transform the pain of racism by suggesting and implementing several offerings, including "Becoming an Anti-Racist Parish" and the "Sacred Ground" series of discussion groups that fifteen parishioners are actively engaged in presently.



Other specific projects shepherded by Jennifer include our participation in Casco Bay Can table talks and



Habitat for Humanity, one of her passions. She was the chair and cochair for years, organizing the Annual Habitat for Humanity pancake breakfast and rallying Falmouth churches and families to participate. When it transitioned to a walk/run, Jennifer offered St. Mary's as the home base for the fundraiser. With waning attendance in Falmouth, she led the effort to join the Good Friday walk in Cumberland/ Yarmouth as Saint Mary's and Falmouth's representative!

She created our "Helping Hands at Home" program that provides parishioners the opportunity to help those who need a helping hand with yard work, housework, or any needs that arise.

She also created our Mission Morning program to give parishioners the chance to do God's work at Milestone, at local nursing homes, on-road clean-up and other sites.

Other examples of what she has done are seemingly endless, but you get the idea.

There is a consistent quality of Jennifer's leadership and her desire to offer us parishioners multiple chances for spiritual fulfillment, for forwarding God's work in the world. She has a deep faith and an infinite willingness to serve others and to provide opportunities for us

to serve and find meaning in our lives. As she puts it, "Our Outreach activity is a source, an extension, and a product of our developing relationship with God. The activity, though good in and of itself, is a means to the end of developing relationships: a pathway, a hallway leading to the dance floor."

# **Of Bosons and Prayer**

I don't know why the Higgs boson intrigues me. I understand hardly anything about it. I'm reliably informed that it's a subatomic, nuclear particle that was predicted by Scottish physicist Peter Higgs back in 1964. He posited that this particle could lend mass to other particles, suggesting that it had a role in the invisible web that holds our universe together. But it wasn't until the Cern Large Hadron Collider came along that the existence of the boson could be inferred. In 2012, forty-eight years after it was theorized, particle physicists confirmed the existence of the Higgs boson and with it our own understanding of the universe as orderly, elegant, and predictable.

It's been ten years since the Higgs boson was identified, and a biography of ninety-three-year-old Peter Higgs has just been published. He is a self-effacing, quiet physicist who avoided reporters on the day his Nobel Prize was announced by taking a bus to a nearby town and hunkering down in a pub for a pint of ale.

Perhaps Peter Higgs knew that discovering his boson wasn't the end of our questions about the universe. There are so many additional mysteries and tantalizing queries that still beckon us, whether we are particle physicists or not. Sometimes we need proof of God. Is creation good? Is there beauty after all in the world? Who's in charge? Why is there suffering? Does prayer "work"? Is God reliable?

The answers to the questions need more than a Cern LHC. I think we need a faith community, a commitment to loving in the hardest times, an attitude that risks the questions and is willing to live without finite answers. We



actually need another way of "knowing." The deep wisdom of the heart and the tears that come with trouble are the teachers we can use. We probably need to cultivate a taste for mystery, not-knowing, even trust.

# **Choral Evensong October 2, 3:00 pm**

Due to the Maine Marathon, there will be no morning services on Sunday, Oct. 2, but we invite you to participate in a beautiful choral evensong service that afternoon at 3:00 pm. Sunday morning services are filled with the energy of the waking day. The evensong service is more about the coming evening and favors a reflective, meditative frame of mind. The tradition started with the early church as dusk fell and everyone gave thanks for the day just past and made an evening sacrifice of praise to God. A set order of psalms was chanted, and there were always two special hymns: the *Magnificat* (Mary's



song), and the *Nunc Dimittis* (Simeon's song). After the Reformation, the English church adapted this service into a choral evensong, keeping the same liturgy, but in English.

The service begins with the lighting of candles and the singing of the marvelous *Phos hilaron* (Greek for 'O gladdening light), which dates from the 3rd or 4th century. On Oct. 2 we will all sing the *Phos Hilaron* hymn #25 by Thomas Tallis, one of the greatest Renaissance composers from England:

- 1. O gracious Light, Lord Jesus Christ, in you the Father's glory shone. Immortal, holy, blest is he, and blest are you, his holy Son.
- 2. Now sunset comes, but light shines forth, the lamps are lit to pierce the night. Praise Father, Son, and Spirit: God who dwells in the eternal light.
- 3. Worthy are you of endless praise, O Son of God, Life-giving Lord; wherefore you are through all the earth and in the highest heaven adored.

The appointed psalm follows, and for this service the choir will sing psalm 137:1-10 using a unique tradition that dates from the early English church: Anglican chant. Whereas the Latin church chanted the psalms in unison (as we do during Lent), the Anglican chant is sung in four parts, and the beauty of this tradition is truly

mesmerizing.



Two lessons follow, and these readings are framed by the same ancient songs, the *Magnificat* and the *Nunc Dimittis*, but now sung with the Shakespearean cadence of the King James Bible translation:

My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour. (Mary's song, Luke 1:46-55)

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace: according to thy word. For mine eyes have seen thy salvation. (Simeon's song, Luke 2:29-32) These powerful texts have inspired hundreds and hundreds of composers over the last 600 years to write inspiring choral settings. It is hard to choose which one to sing, as there are so many glorious versions! We have chosen a masterpiece: the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in C, Op. 115 by Sir Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924), who composed a substantial number of concert works, including seven symphonies, but his best-remembered pieces are his choral works for church performance, chiefly composed in the Anglican tradition. Among his pupils were rising composers whose fame went on to surpass his own, such as Gustav Holst and Ralph Vaughan Williams. The edition we are using is edited by Jeremy Dibble, whose lectures on Stanford we were fortunate to attend during the RSCM workshop at Newport, Rhode Island in 2019.

The other unique parts of the choral evensong are prayers and suffrages, which support the mood of contemplation and reflection. The Apostle's Creed and the Lord's Prayer are sung by all on one tone, and the choir will sing the other prayers set by the eminent American composer, Dan Locklair, Composer-in-Residence and Professor of Music at Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Locklair's music is very haunting and draws you into a quiet space. We have chosen his setting of the wonderful poem, *The Lone, Wild Bird*, as the evensong anthem.

Finally the service concludes with celebrating the ending day by singing hymn 662, Abide with me: fast falls the eventide.

As a musician friend of mine has said, "The evensong service is like having your heart massaged." Come and warm your hearts on October 2!


