"From our fears and sins release us. Let us find our rest in Thee."

This line was written by the great Charles Wesley (1707-1788), priest in the Church of England and prolific hymnwriter. It comes from our Advent hymn 66, commonly known as "Come, thou long expected Jesus." December is a good month to put some extra effort into finding your rest in God. One way to do this is to practice mindfulness, since it provides a quick way to bring calmness into any hectic or stressful situation. A lot of attention has been given to this subject in recent years, but don't get confused. The basic practice is very simple. Just breathe and focus on your breath. As long as you are alive, your breath is present with you. In this sense, your breath serves as a metaphor or a sign of God's presence which is also always with you.

Here is a simple mindfulness practice with a Christian perspective that I recommend to you. Practice this at any time, but especially for at least five minutes when you feel your emotions or thoughts getting out of control.

As you slowly breathe in, say within yourself, "Breathing in, I calm my body." As you slowly breathe out, say, "Breathing out, I am at peace." As you breathe in again, say, "Dwelling in the present moment," As you breathe out once more, say, "I know that God is good." Repeat this cycle for as long as you can, allowing every other thought and feeling to float by, like clouds drifting through the sky.

In addition to busyness and long To-Do lists, change is something that can often lead to much anxiety. We have a lot of change going on now here at Saint Mary's. Reverend Jane left not too long ago, as I returned from my 10-month deployment in the Middle East. Deacon Christine retired in October and will be away from our parish family for a while. Bruce Fithian is retiring at the end of the month, making the decision to relax and slow down the pace of his life. Jeff and Courtney Morgan are ending their ministry as our Guiding RAY Coordinators at the end of the month, in response to growing demands on their schedules at their primary jobs.

All of these changes have resulted from people making good and responsible decisions for their lives, but this does not minimize the real impact such changes can have on our parish life. Any time that we are experiencing the dizzying effects of change and stress in our lives, this is a sign that we need to recenter ourselves in God's eternal and changeless presence. Remember this, my friends, this month, and every month of your lives.

Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The primary agenda item for this month is the 2023 budget. Ben Parks-Stamm presented the proposed budget. Most of our expenses are fixed costs: utilities, taxes, insurance and salaries. Revenue comes primarily from pledges and contributions by parishioners. We do receive income from weddings, use of the parish hall and church as well as income from our endowment funds.

As we all are seeing with our personal budgets, inflation has increased our costs significantly. Again this year we are dealing with a deficit budget. Prior to the pandemic, we had deficit budgets but managed to increase revenue through the year erasing the deficit. It's not clear to us if

we can do that in 2023. We are hoping that COVID-19 will

not be a major factor in 2023, but we know inflation is a reality. Our costs are up, and our parishioners may not be able to give as they have in the past.

How can we manage this? We will tighten our collective parish belt as much as we can. We are encouraging all parishioners to make a pledge intention for 2023. Adding COVID-19 lessening, we could hold another fundraiser in the summer. We are working to make Sparkles a big success again this year and plan for a robust Sparkles in 2023.

Budgets are always challenging and for many of us, frustrating. But it is essential to map out a logical budget for Saint Mary's. We appreciate the work of the Budget and Finance Committee in pulling the proposed budget together.

We also discussed the various transitions in key staff positions. In December we will welcome our new Deacon, Matt Simpson. We will celebrate Bruce Fithian's tenure with us on December 11 and welcome Kathleen Scott back to the choir loft. She will be with us through the program year as we look for a permanent replacement. And we will say thanks to the Jeff and Courtney Morgan for their leadership as our Guiding RAY leaders. Thank you, Meg Hurdman, for stepping in to be our volunteer coordinator for Guiding RAY. On December 18th, Bishop Brown will be with us for a baptism at 8 o'clock and the pageant at 10:15!

Stewardship 2023 Update - MORE THAN ENOUGH!


Helping Hands at Home: The "Magnificent Nine" Perform A Small Miracle

Falmouth Food Pantry - November Update

The Falmouth Food Pantry is currently serving just under 200 families (about 540 family members) a month, with the numbers increasing over the summer. As usually happens, when the weather becomes too cold to work outside, there will inevitably be additional requests for support. Volunteers continue to deliver boxes of non-perishable food, fresh vegetables, eggs, and meat to the homes of families who need food assistance. The Pantry has not yet returned to offering curbside assistance or to welcoming families inside the actual pantry.

The Falmouth Food Pantry is now accepting food donations from individuals. Our donation box is in he foyer of the guild room. The most helpful foods are soup in cans (but not cream soups), boxes of pasta, cold cereal, canned tuna fish, canned chicken, and granola bars.

"Another Person's Soul is a Far Country to Travel To" shared by Merle Marie Troeger

Father's Nathan's presentation about the desert elders fascinated me and reminded me that some of the wisest words that have come down to us are from the famous commentator "Anon." The elders' sayings are epigrammatic and pithy, perhaps the product of long periods of contemplative prayer or quies, translated best as "rest."

I'm not sure of the origin of this title quote, but it has the flavor of one who has lived an ascetic life in the desert. Whoever she or he was, the wisdom is so true. Someone you know, even someone you know intimately, can sometimes say or do something that makes you think "I don't know that person at all!" That's when this anonymous elder_had it right – "Another person's soul is a far country to travel to."

In this life, we get to know some people very well – and others we hardly know at all. But we do get glimpses. There was the time that he said just the right thing when I was so despondent. There was the time that she brought me a flower that brightened a day that was going so badly. And then there was the time that he did such a cruel thing I couldn't forgive him for years. And there was the time she wounded me deeply – and probably unintentionally.

The same is true of me – and you. My soul – and your soul – is a far country for anyone else to travel to – even for those who love us the most. But there is One who knows us best. This One, in the beautiful language of the King James Version (Psalm 139), "has searched me and known me!" This One knows when I sit down and when I rise up. This One knows my ways, my paths, my speech and my thoughts.



Not only that, this One has known me from before my birth. This One "didst knit me together in my mother's womb."

And there is no fleeing the One who knows us best. If we ascend to heaven, if we descend to Sheol (the traditional home of the dead), if we dwell in the innermost parts of the sea, and even if darkness covers us, that One is there. Perhaps this One knows us best when we don't want to be found. "If I say, 'let only darkness cover me, and the light about me be night,' even the darkness is not dark to thee, for the night is bright as the day; for the darkness is as light with thee."

We are known and loved by God. Another person's soul - and our own souls - may be in far distant countries, but the One, the Lord, seeks us out and is nearby.
