



SAFE: Suicide Alertness for Everyone



One in twenty-five people is experiencing thoughts of suicide at any given moment. There are no particular categories of people for whom this is true. Such thoughts come unbidden to anyone, at any time. And when this happens, these people need a friend, a neighbor, a co-worker or a family member to be alert for the real danger that is facing them. Since many are unable to speak openly about their thoughts of suicide (due to shame, stigma, confusion or anxiety), it is absolutely essential that **everyone** be alert to the potential danger signs and be prepared to assist in creating safety for those at risk. Far too many lives have been lost to suicide because people were afraid to ask the question or were unaware of the signs of danger.

On Saturday 21 January from 2 to 5:30 PM in our Parish House, you have the opportunity to create a suicide-safer community by becoming trained in a world-class sui-

cide alertness method. **safeTALK** is a product of LivingWorks, the global leader in suicide safety training (FMI, see https://www.livingworks.net/safetalk). I had the wonderful opportunity to become a **safeTALK** trainer while in Bahrain, and I am very excited to bring this excellent resource back to our parish and our communities. **safeTALK** is useful and applicable to any person above 16 years of age and, in a four-hour workshop, it will equip you to perhaps make the difference between life and death for someone who is struggling. There is a fee of \$20 to cover the cost of materials that you will receive (this can be waived upon request). A maximum of 30 people can participate, and registration is necessary by 15 January.

Suicide IS preventable, and you are far more likely to need suicide alertness training than CPR training, even though both are very important. We cannot realistically save everyone, but each of us has a role to play in creating suicide-safer communities. It begins by being honest and open about the risk of suicide and how we all are affected on some level. If you cannot participate in this training, I sincerely hope you will register for one of the other **safeTALK** trainings that will be offered at Saint Mary's in the future.

Vestry Highlights from the Wardens



The Vestry met on Wednesday, December 14th. Representing the Outreach Committee, Stan Eaton presented the list of disbursements totaling just over \$13,000 for parish gifts in the following focus areas: Racial Justice, Food Insecurity, New Mainers, At-Risk Youth, Substance Use Disorder, International Needs.

Ben Parks-Stamm, treasurer, presented the year-to-date financial picture. Pledge payments are down, but other revenue sources are up, which is helpful. Our expenses for fuel and maintenance are higher. We have trimmed our deficit from the beginning of the year. Sparkles success (over \$16,000 net of expenses) is a huge help.

Ben also reported that two firms have responded to our re-

quest for proposal to manage our investment funds: Harpswell Investments and FL Putnam. The Diocese notified us that they are seeking a new sub-account manager. We will proceed with investigating the option of pulling our funds.

Budget 2023

Ben made adjustments to the proposed budget to update key numbers. We increased the amount that Sparkles is budgeted to raise. We added a summer fundraiser, which will hopefully net \$4,000. Other small adjustments reduced the deficit from \$52,000 to \$37,000. A big issue for us is that our expenses are growing, and inflation is hitting us hard, but our revenue is keeping up. We will need to manage that closely to ensure that we remain fiscally sound.

Our Outreach program is changing. We will have new leadership in February 2023. Ben and Betsy Parks-Stamm will chair the committee. Outreach will focus on monthly nonprofit partnerships with fundraising supporting the organizations.

We also discussed a proposal for a new bench on the campus to be a memorial for a departed parishioner. We will work with the family to ensure that the bench fits in with our grounds design.


Saint Mary's Advent Giving

Falmouth Food Pantry - November Update

The Falmouth Food Pantry is currently serving just under 200 families (about 540 family members) a month, with the numbers increasing since the summer. As usually happens, when the weather becomes too cold to work outside, there will inevitably be additional requests for support. Volunteers continue to deliver boxes of non-perishable food, fresh vegetables, eggs, and meat to the homes of families who need food assistance. The Pantry has not yet returned to offering curbside assistance or to welcoming families inside the actual pantry.

The Falmouth Food Pantry is accepting food donations from individuals. Our donation box is in the foyer of the Parish House and in the Narthex. The most helpful foods are soup in cans (but not cream soups), boxes of pasta, cold cereal, canned tuna fish, canned chicken, and granola bars.

A recent letter from St. Elizabeth's Essential Pantry

Dear Friends of St. Elizabeth's Essentials Pantry,

As you may know, 2022 has been a remarkable year with the influx of asylum seekers needing assistance in the greater Portland area. We served 236 neighbors in need last Tuesday compared to our average of 150 this time last year. Keeping up with the demand for the essential items we offer, while costs have increased, has stretched our capability. But thanks to a larger number of wonderful volunteers, the amazing generosity of individuals like you, and assistance from our seven sponsoring churches and other partners, we've become a bigger and busier Essentials Pantry.

We distribute the following items. Can you imagine doing without these essentials?

- Toilet paper, soap bars, laundry detergent, feminine pads (weekly)
- Infant diapers, dental products, bedding, towels, kitchen wares (monthly)
- Personal care products, home cleaning products, winter hats, scarves, gloves (as available)
- Adult winter coats approx. 500, winter boots approx. 160 (seasonally)

While we are blessed with a generous amount of donated items, some of these must be fulfilled out of our budget. For example, we have a contract to buy diapers in bulk from the Southern Maine Diaper Bank at the Jewish Community Alliance. For 2022, we purchased and will distribute 51,000 diapers!

Supporting the Homeless in Maine in Augusta

A contingent from Saint Mary's joined laity and clergy from other denominations in silent prayer in the Hall of Flags at the Statehouse on December 7 on behalf of asylum seekers and others facing homelessness as freezing temperatures set in.

In response to Bishop Brown's call for Episcopalians to attend the vigil, Paul Jones, John Bennett, Bonny Rodden and Deacon Matthew Simpson traveled to Augusta, and other members of the congregation wrote letters to their legislators and the governor, urging them to take action immediately to avert a humanitarian crisis. The situation is particularly dire this year because federal rental assistance is ending and shelters are overcrowded.

Although Dec. 7 was the first day of the legislative session, which is usually reserved for the swearing-in of legislators in the presence of family and friends, both houses of the Legislature took up emergency legislation submitted by the governor. Most of the \$474 million package would have provided \$450 checks to eligible taxpayers. However, it also included \$50 million for heating assistance and \$21 million for emergency housing.

The governor had negotiated the package in advance with legislative leaders from both parties, but it passed only in the House, where it won bipartisan support. In the Senate, this bill lacked sufficient support.

Efforts are ongoing to find emergency funding for housing from federal and state agencies, but it's likely an emergency bill will be considered again in the Legislature when it reconvenes in January.

At the request of legislators, a public hearing on the emergency measure was held on Dec. 21, opening the door to the likelihood that the full Legislature will approve funding as soon as possible for heating assistance and temporary housing. In the meantime, asylum-seeking families are staying at local churches where volunteers, including a contingent from Saint Mary's, are spending evenings and overnight with them. The church program is organized by Greater Portland Family Promise, a non-profit organization that is supported by Saint Mary's.

Maybe It's All Prayer - All the Time

Let's face it. A Quiet Morning is not for everyone. It's just too meditative and, well, quiet for some. So, here's a brief dispatch from the Advent Quiet Morning in December.

We considered a delightful poem by Martin Wroe* who starts out trying to describe what prayer is.

It occurred to me that you might not know what I think I am doing When I am sitting here like this, or lying on the bed like that . . .

But the poet runs into trouble right away. He admits he's not sure if prayer can be explained. He can only come up with verbs:

waiting for a bus saying the name of a child who has lost a parent looking at that candle, wondering if there is a language of flame stopping the day, to hold it for a moment a little more carefully,

The poet also notices that his prayers often get sidetracked.

It might begin with an asking, but, later, below the detail what you notice is recalling a longing, a wordlessness

He admits prayer can be just an indescribable feeling:

The pulse of a world described by silence or grief, by music or joy.

Then he turns to the thorny question of whether prayer "works." Well, he says, prayer "works"

in the way of a walk along the shore, or a song, in the way of goodness which will not be weighed or measured Or how someone can be with you after their death

And then, of course, he has to admit prayer doesn't "work" either not in the ways of cause and effect that I can explain to you, but it definitely works

Inspired by Martin Wroe, the Quiet Morning folk turned to using single words or short phrases to describe prayer. Here are a few we came up with:

Wondering wordlessness
saying the name St. Mary's Schola music
Mystery non-verbal awareness
Restlessness woolgathering
Desiring sitting with Richard Rohr

Take a moment to brainstorm a couple of words that describe what you think you're doing when you "pray." Include them in your private repertoire of "prayer." God know about it.





And in this [my good Lord] showed me something small, no bigger than a hazelnut, lying in the palm of my hand, as it seemed to me, and it was as round as a ball.
