<u>Note</u>: Investment Funds have typically been updated quarterly so the beginning and year-end balances are as of September 30 since the quarterly statements are not received until after the year-end statements are published. Due to a change in Diocesan Sub-Fund management, 2022 reports are not available at the time of this printing.



To the members of the Parish

LOOKING BACK TO 2022:

We ended the year 2022 with an operating deficit of \$34,363.

REVENUES: General pledges for 2022 were \$244,068, below our budget of \$275,000 and down from 2021 (\$288,604) and prior years (2020: \$267,429; 2019: \$276,350). Non-pledge payments, loose offerings, and revenue from use of the parish house and worship space were all well above budget and 2021, likely improved by our return to in-person worship. A special thanks to our Sparkles Team that was able to generate \$16,459 for the parish, higher than we had budgeted. Overall, total revenue for 2022 was \$441,942 compared to a budget of \$395,389 (and 2021 revenue of \$454,440). Our parishioners have continued to be incredibly generous during these inflationary times.

EXPENSES: Total expenses for 2022 were \$474,515, which was \$44,601 over budget. Much of that additional expense was capital projects (much of which was covered by generous donations). Beyond that, the categories of expenses most over budget were fuel (driven by an increase in price beyond what we'd budgeted), maintenance on our campus, and expenses for our music program. A special thanks to our Buildings and Grounds Committee that annually provides an enormous service to the parish through their many, many hours of skilled labor and care. THE ASSET SIDE:

Year-end cash increased slightly by \$1,314 compared to the prior year-end. The church does not have any significant long-term financial liabilities (debt or payables). The total balance in the parish's investment funds (endowment) was \$2,150,363 as of September 30, 2021. This figure is over a year old as the diocese's vendor has not been able to provide statements of our accounts for over a year. This is clearly unacceptable and the diocese is looking to replace this vendor and Vestry is evaluating replacing the diocese as the manager of our investment funds.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2023:

REVENUES:

The general pledges for 2022 are budgeted at \$290,000, much higher than we received in 2022 but close to what we were able to do in 2021. As of January 18, 2023, the Stewardship Committee reports that we have received pledge commitments of \$250,770. So, at this writing, we need an additional \$39,230 to achieve the 2023 pledge budget. We cannot emphasize how important pledges are to our financial needs and ability to budget and plan for the year. Pledges represent 70% of our total general support for 2023.

EXPENSES:

The total expense budget for 2023 is \$459,393, which is up just slightly compared to our 2022 expenses (with capital projects removed to make a reasonable comparison). Our budget for 2023 includes cost of living adjustments for staff, but does not include significant capital projects, which are difficult to predict and budget for at the beginning of the year. As many of you are seeing in your household finances, the parish has seen financial challenges from inflation as our expenses (particularly fuel, electricity, and contract labor like snow plowing) grow faster than our income.

The result is a budgeted operating deficit of \$36,893. The operating deficit can be significantly reduced if we can exceed our pledge budget, and other giving and fundraising, which we did in 2021.

As Jesus spoke during the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6:33), "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself." During my tenure as Treasurer there have been financial ups and downs, but our generous community has continually come through to support the important work that we are doing sharing God's love and message in the community.

FINAL COMMENTS:

The preparation of the budget begins with the Budget and Finance Committee (BFC). After the BFC develops a preliminary budget, it is given to the Executive Committee (EXCOM) for input and suggestions. The BFC meets again to review the EXCOM suggestions and make adjustments. The Vestry received the 2023 budget at its November meeting for initial study and comments. The BFC met again to review Vestry comments and suggestions and make appropriate additions or reductions. The Vestry continued to study the budget at its December meeting. Final Vestry approval was made at the December meeting.

Members of the BFC are available to meet with any member of the parish who might have questions or comments regarding the finances of the church. We also would welcome anyone interested to join the BFC. Please reach out to me if you have any questions or feedback.

Rector's Report

The year 2022 at Saint Mary's continued to be affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The year began with another spike in infections, as the Reverend Jane Milliken Hague continued to serve and lead in my absence, due to my 10-month Mobilization to Bahrain with the US Navy. Things began to return to normal as the year progressed. At the end of August, Rev. Jane left us and moved on to serve as interim at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Princeton, NJ. We are very grateful for her compassionate and committed leadership in our parish during this unusual interim period. And I am extremely grateful for the flexibility and understanding of this entire parish family which supported me and my family throughout this time.

At the end of September, I returned from Navy duty and returned to Saint Mary's. Since then, parish life has increased in energy as is usual during the final quarter of the year. However, there have been several other transitions. In October, Deacon Christine Bennett retired (again) to resume her calling as an actively engaged lay



member of the Church. Unfortunately, the Bishop has asked her to do that away from Saint Mary's for at least six months, to allow for a change in roles and relationships to develop. By God's providence alone, we were able to quickly identify another Deacon who was new to our area and not yet connected with a parish home. In December, the Reverend Matthew Simpson began his ministry among us. Deacon Matthew's gifts, experiences and primary vocation are very different than those of Deacon Christine, but we are excited to see how the Holy Spirit works through him to guide us in outreach and ministry in the years to come.

The end of December also saw the resignation of our long-time Organist and Choirmaster, Bruce Scott Fithian. Bruce has been an outstanding figure in our parish life for more than 15 years. Even though we all understand and support the reasons behind his departure, he will be sorely missed for his deep passion for music as well as the other many ways that he and his husband, Kue John Lor, engaged in our community life.

The end of December also marked the end of the leadership of Jeff and Courtney Morgan in our Guiding RAY program for children and youth. Although they served in this role for only eighteen months, we will miss their warm and hospitable leadership of this program during a season of ongoing change.



Music Ministry at Saint Mary's

The Saint Mary choir continued to offer their much-appreciated contribution to Sunday worship services by leading the congregation with singing service music, hymns and presenting offertory anthems. Guest organist, Sylvia Infantine, graciously substituted for Bruce during his January stay in Long Island to visit Kue John Lor.

On January 6, a Sacred Songs and Readings service for Epiphany was celebrated with pertinent readings for this feast day, an Epiphany French carol *La Marche des Rois*, a cello piece, *Prière* (Prayer) by Camille Saint-Saëns played by John Bennet and a rousing organ piece, The March of the Kings by Carl Simone.

Another Sacred Songs and Readings service for *Candlemass*, which celebrates the young Christ child being presented at the Temple, took place on the feast day, Feb. 2. This lovely, meditative time of worship included topical readings, a *Candlemass* procession singing The Song of Simeon, hymn 34 'Christ, mighty Savior, Light of all creation,' and Hymn 25 'O gracious Light, Lord Jesus Christ' (the ancient *Phos hilaron*). Cellist John Bennet played Astor Piazzolla's *Ave Maria* as a fitting piece for meditation.

Many parishioners have admired the Gregorian Chant manuscript that was in the narthex of the church (it is now in the entrance of the auditorium). I have long loved and sung plainchant, so when I looked closely at the manuscript, I saw that it was for Feb. 13 Septuagesima Sunday (Also known as, Shrovetide, which marks 70 days from Feb. 13 to the Saturday after Easter, and is therefore a kind of 'pre lent'). So on that Sunday I sang the chant: Bonum est confiteri Domino, et psallere nomini tuo, Altissime. The words are taken from Psalm 92: It is good to give thanks to the Lord and to sing praises to your name, O Most High.

The 10:15 service began with a hymn based on this text: 'It is good to sing your praises.' For offertory the choir sang the exquisite anthem 'Lord, in thy mercy' with a text by Martin Luther and music by Felix Mendelssohn.

Further February offerings included Aaron David Miller's 'God So Loved the World,' and a solo, Bach's 'My Heart ever Faithful,' by our soprano section leader, Bethany Perkins.

The choir helped usher in the Lenten season with appropriate anthems: C.

V. Stanford's 'O for a closer walk,' Bob Chilcott's 'The Lord's my Shepherd,' Gabriel Fauré's *Agnus Dei*, Thomas Morley's *Agnus Dei*, and beautiful communion music: a Handel duet *Ahi, nelle sorti umane*, sung by Bethany Perkins Hall and Maria Belva, and Bach's cantata aria 'Sighing, weeping' sung by Bethany Perkins.

Bruce offered Lenten organ music with June Nixon's 'Chaconne for Lent,' Gerald Near's 'Prelude on J.S. Bach's Passion Chorale,' Gerald Near's 'Solemn Prelude on a Theme of Thomas Tallis,' and Paul Bryan's *Passacaglia*.

We enjoyed celebrating with Bishop Brown on April 3 with the lovely anthem 'Meditation for Lent', with the Guiding Ray children participating.

A Sacred Songs and Readings service for Martin Luther King's Feast day was held on April 4, and included the famous readings by the martyr as well as organ music by black composers: Prelude on 'We Shall Overcome' by Aldophus Hailstork, 'Deep River' arranged by Richard Billingham, and 'Toccata on 'Great Day' by Aldophus Hailstork.

The Saint Mary Choir offered 'Hush! Somebody's Callin' my Name,' a traditional spiritual arranged by Brazael W. Dennard, and John Bennet played the serene *Elégie* for cello and piano by Gabriel Fauré.

Holy week was ushered in with many stirring offerings: Bob Chilcott's 'God so loved the world' (the Sunday of the Passion), Felice Anerio's *Christus factus est* (Maundy Thursday), and the great Good Friday service: the chanting of the St. John Passion and Venantius Fortunatus's *Crux fidelis* for the Veneration of the Cross.

We were so fortunate to once again be able to celebrate the Vigil of the Resurrection on April 16 with hymns and anthems reflecting on the history of salvation: Hymn 412 Earth and all stars, Hymn 648 When Israel was in Egypt's land, and Richard Shephard's 'A new commandment.'

The resurrection was celebrated with the full organ playing and Gustav Holst's anthem 'Joy is come!'

After two years of smaller engagement, we were all happy to celebrate The Sunday of the Resurrection in all its glory on April 17. Trumpets, bells and joyful singing included the offertory anthem 'O Sons and Daughters of the King,' and Bruce enjoyed playing Charle-Maire Widor's thundering *Toccata* on the great Casavant organ.

For the month of May, Saint Mary's was gracious enough to allow Bruce and Kue John Lord to fulfill a dream: walking the *Camino francés*, a 480 mile trek across northern Spain arriving at the ancient pilgrimage cathedral of Santiago. This 33 day journey was truly inspirational, and in the fall, Bruce attempted to share some of these truly remarkable experiences on a Thursday Common Ground gathering. We are so grateful that guest organist and choir director, Kathleen Scott, led the music ministry during their time in Spain.

Bruce returned in June for Trinity Sunday and the choir's last Sunday

participation, and enjoyed leading Bob Chilcott's anthem 'Be Thou My Vision.'

The summer season enabled Bruce to play some favorite organ pieces during the Sunday eucharists, such as Vaughan Williams's *Rhosymedre* (Fathers Day), Organ settings of Early American Hymns (July 3), Handel's 'Arrival of the Queen of Sheba,' and Paul Bryan's 'Trumpet Air.'

For Kick Off Sunday on September 11, we remembered our dear friend Thomas Troeger by singing an anthem by Jonathan Crutchfield, based on Tom's joyful poem 'Make Our Church One Joyful Choir.'

We were so grateful to celebrate the return of Father Nathan from Bahrain on September 25 and offered the César Franck's *Panis angelicus*, featuring our tenor section leader, Ben McVety.

It was with great happiness that after more than two years, we were once again able to offer a choral evensong on October 2. This is a cherished Anglican tradition, and we loved singing a great masterpiece by Charles Villiers Stanford: his *Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in C.* The Preces, Responses and anthem were by the eminent American composer Dan Locklair.

On October 16 we were able to thank Christine Bennett for her many years of service on her last Sunday as deacon, by singing Everett Titcomb's 'Jesus! Name of wondrous love.'

Further anthems during the fall included Mendelssohn's 'I waited for the Lord' with soloists Bethany Perkins and Maria Belva, Mozart's *Ave verum*, and William Harris's 'Holy is the true light.'

On November 13, a Sacred Songs and Readings service 'The Lord's Prayer'

was offered to reflect and honor Christ's great prayer. This included pertinent readings as well as Becky Pride's 'The Lord's Prayer: a Variation.'

Hymns with the prayer theme were sung, such as Hymn 615 'Thy kingdom come!,' and 'Our Father, God in heaven above' by Martin Luther. This last hymn was the theme used in Mendelssohn's Organ Sonata #6 which Bruce was thrilled to play. We also savored a Thomas Troeger's poem 'Let All Who Pray the Prayer Christ Taught' by singing his text to the tune of Dundee. As a prelude to a time of meditation, John Bennett played a serene work by Olivier Messian, *Louange à l'Éternité de Jésus* (Praise for the eternity of Jesus).

On November 20, we celebrated the Diocese of Maine's 200th birthday with hymns especially written for this occasion: 'O Wondrous Souls of Light,' and 'On Christ the Solid Rock.'

On November 27, it was with great thankfulness that we could one again honor the First Sunday in Advent with a service of Lessons and Carols. Similar to the Vigil of the Resurrection, the story of Salvation included readings from the Bible and anthems and hymns that reflect on the readings. These included the hymns 'Creator of the stars of night,' 'Come, thou long expected Jesus,' and 'Hark! a thrilling voice is sounding.'

The choir had worked very hard on the beautiful anthems: Peter Warlock's 'Adam lay abounden,' Vaughan Williams's 'This is the truth sent from above,' Paul Manz's 'E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come,' and David Vernier's 'I Sing Of A Mayden.'

Once again, we honored Thomas Troeger on the second Sunday of Advent with Walter Pelz's setting of Tom's poem 'The Moon with Borrowed Light.'

The annual pageant on Dec. 18 was greatly appreciated and a way to celebrate the Guiding Ray Program under the leadership of Jeff and Courtney Morgan.

Finally 2022 concluded with the joyful Christmas eve services, with Bethany Perkins beautiful participation in the 4:00 and 6:00 services, John Bennett's cello ensemble from the Portland Conservatory for the 6:00 service, and the 9:00 candlelight service fittingly enhanced by the choir's singing John Rutter's 'Candlelight Carol.' I am biased, of course, but in Reverend Jane Hague's words: 'the choir is the glue that keeps the church together,' I couldn't agree more!


Ushers

Churchyard Committee

As a reminder to all Saint Mary's parishioners, if you are thinking about where to place your remains upon your passing, Saint Mary's Churchyard (cemetery) has many spots open in both Saint Mary's Woods and the Burial Garden. Please contact Beth Shaw or Hugh Smith for more details.

The committee met in May of 2022 and reviewed a list of maintenance projects developed earlier. Several tasks were completed in 2022.

- A headstone that had fallen over was reset including adding cement to stabilize it.
- Two very large overgrown shrubs in the Old Churchyard were removed.
- A volunteer from a family with a plot in the Old Churchyard trimmed the boxwoods and other shrubs in the circle area resulting in a much-improved appearance.
- Buildings and Grounds members removed all of the pear trees lining the path through the Burial Garden and also ground down the stumps. The trees had never thrived in the shade of the oak trees and were dying.
- Buildings and Grounds members maintained the Churchyard picking up branches, raking and pruning as needed.

Be Still: Centering Prayer on Monday Evenings

In response to the pandemic lull, Be Still: Centering Prayer on Monday Evening also transitioned from Zoomonly to hybrid gatherings – simultaneous Zoom and in-person, masked gatherings in the Chapel. A small group of parishioners, members of other Portland-area churches and folks "from away"--as far as Colorado! – join together each Monday evening at 5 PM. Led by Jennifer Gregg, we begin with a short Taize chant (digitally accompanied) before entering into 30 minutes of silent reflection. There follows a short reading from scripture. Compassion

In a response to the many people voicing their anguish during turbulent times, St, Mary's began to offer a daily reflection of comfort. As we watch the news, our hearts break for so many who are caught in a struggle for power and who have no peace. Since February 2022, we have been sending out a daily poem, scripture, or inspiration to lighten our sorrow. This is for all who seek a direction and compass for their prayers.

Merton Group

As with other formation groups, Merton Group transitioned to hybrid mode as the pandemic allowed, with the in-person participants meeting in the Chapel from 3-4 PM on Wednesdays. This is a small, spiritually diverse, inquisitive, tolerant, open-minded and supportive group of self-described seekers. We meet to read and discuss a selected work that draws from the Christian and other faith traditions in an effort to help us reflect on our own and world's spiritual roots and fuel personal growth. Because we read aloud to each other, there is no homework, regular attendance is not necessary, and the nature of the reading lends itself easily to those who wish to join the group mid-book. Quiet Mornings

Lenten Quiet Morning, on Saturday, March 5, 2022. The theme was the Anointing Woman who appears in all four gospels. Again, we used the biblical texts in various translations, poetry and art to illuminate the story. Merle Marie planned the program and Becky Pride led the quiet morning adding her own materials and selected poetry. Advent Quiet Morning, on Saturday, December 10, 2022. The theme was Prayer and the title was <u>Postcards from the Soul</u>. We looked at the traditional forms or payer (intercession, thanksgiving, petition, confession, praise) and we identified other ways we pray as well (action, silence, meditation). We considered what names we use for God, how and why prayer works and the ways we pray that we might never have called prayer before.

Sacred Ground

Throughout 2022, about 20 people at St. Mary's have participated in a program called Sacred Ground which explores the stories of Indigenous, Black, Latinx and Asian/Pacific-Americans as they intersect with those of European Americans. The curriculum consists of a series of 10 sessions and includes powerful documentary films, articles and 2 books, all relating to racial healing, racial equity and whiteness. A key component of Sacred Ground is the formation of dialogue circles that study, meet and pray together. Within the safety of these circles, people tell their stories. For instance, where does my family's history intersect with larger historical events? The creation of the State of Maine? The Atlantic Triangular Trade? The voluntary and involuntary migration of persons to this country? Colonial-era land acquisition, seizure and settlement?

Sacred Songs and Readings

Bruce Fithian and John Bennett spearheaded and planned four special evening services that included music, poetry and prayer. They did not follow a particular order of service such as Evening Prayer or Compline. They were intended to be quiet and contemplative, with periods of silence built in among the other elements.

The Sacred services occurred on:

January 6, 2022, celebrating Epiphany February 2, 2022, celebrating Candlemas April 4, 2022, celebrating the feast day of Martin Luther King, Jr November 13, 2022, reflecting on the Lord's Prayer

Wisdom Seekers

On Tuesday mornings from 10:30 - 11:30, there is a Bible study group called **Wisdom Seekers**, coordinated by Nadine Timberlake, that meets in hybrid form, either in person or on Zoom. We study Scripture appointed for the upcoming Sunday, examining the historical background, how people living at that time understood God's message, and what is it saying to us today. We have seven and 10 people who join in a lively discussion, sharing our thoughts and ideas. It is a great way learn more about the Bible and to prepare oneself for the coming Sunday. All are welcome to join at any time during the year.

While we would have preferred to have had more volunteer involvement, but we were able to manage the ministry well between ourselves (Jeff and Courtney), playing games, and learning about God's love through a weekly

Middle School Youth Group

The pandemic interrupted the meeting of this group since March of 2020. In the meantime, these young people have been encouraged to participate in the online offerings of our diocesan Youth Ministry.

Hospitality Ministry

Although we have not yet filled the position of Hospitality chair and COVID has caused us to cancel many fellowship gatherings with food, we were so fortunate to have Robin Webber stepped forward to head up the Coffee Hour planning for which has made many people happy to see it return. We hired Cinnamon Girl (owned by Melissa Cott - a former parishioner) to cater the Kickoff Sunday coffee hour to start the 2022-23 program year.

COVID-19 did put a halt to other gathering events: the Annual Meeting brunch, the Memorial Day Parade refreshments, and the Summer dinner and fundraiser which takes months to plan and the Kickoff event. We are hoping someone will step up to take over leadership of this vital aspect of our community, and that new members will join this ministry! Coffee Hour Ministry

The Coffee Hour Ministry was redefined halfway through the year. Coffee Hour is the time that parishioners can gather together, newcomers can be welcomed, and special events can be held. In order to attract new Hosts, we streamlined the Coffee Hour requirements. A helpful parishioner (usually Dana – thank you!) sets up the coffee urn, carafe, paper cups, tables, and some treats for the Coffee Hour following the 8am worship. The Host of the day piggybacks on this setup for the Coffee Hour, keeping it simple to ease cleanup. The Host also provides the food, with either homemade or store-bought baked goods, cheese and crackers and fruit in some form. Coffee Hour is accommodated by a number of people helping to carry it out.

It can be reported that the roster of parishioners signed up to Host expanded to include both regular Hosts and people new to the experience. We intend to keep this momentum going in 2023 by making it as easy as possible to participate, whether streamlining cleanup or making sure that no one is Hosting alone. Prayer Shawl

The Prayer Shawl Ministry involves knitting shawls using *large needles-size 13* and a *quite simple pattern*. You need not be an accomplished knitter to learn how to create these practical messages of comfort. They are called "Prayer Shawls" because the work is initiated with prayer, and the shawls are blessed prior to being given. One simple pattern involves casting on 57 stitches, then knitting three stitches and purling three stitches—representing the Holy Trinity. Most knitters enjoy repeating "Father, Son, and Holy Spirit" with the stitches. There are other more complex patterns available, but all involve a three-stitch pattern invoking the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. If you need a packet with all supplies needed, contact the Parish office.



Our supply of completed and blessed shawls is on the low side, so we could use some replenishing. With our Eucharistic Visitor ministry as well as the CARE Team, we hope more parishioners and friends in the hospital, nursing homes, new mothers or someone just needing support will be given one. Red Cross Blood Drives

Since COVID began, Saint Mary's has coordinated with the American Red Cross to serve as a primary donation site in the greater Portland area. We are proud to be such an important part of this effort to save lives and keep our community healthy.



Here are the total collection amounts from drives at Saint Mary's during 2022, according to an email from our primary contact at the Red Cross in Portland:

"We ran a total of **16 blood drives** at the Episcopal Church of Saint Mary, which is just incredible. During 2022 Saint Mary's and the American Red Cross were able to collect a total of **457 units of blood** which equates to **1,371 lives** potentially saved. What an amazing achievement!

Buildings & Grounds Committee

The Buildings and Grounds Committee (B&G) had a very busy year in 2022. This was driven in part by available members meeting on many Tuesday afternoons from the spring into the fall to work on a wide variety of tasks. These tasks included regular maintenance items and other work identified by the committee, parishioners and staff. The highlights of this work are:

- A major reconstruction of the lychgate including support structure and completely new roof. The project was supported by an anonymous parishioner in memory of G. David Fenderson.
- A significant repair of the support columns and sill of the Rectory front porch.
- Repair a drain leaking from the water fountain into the lower-level hallway and repair the ceiling and wall damage.

- Cut down and grind the stumps of the dying pear trees in the Burial Garden.
- Removal of several dead trees throughout the campus including hiring the removal of one next to the Chapel.
- Apply two coats of stain to the Rectory deck, backsteps and bulkhead.
- Repair the ceiling in the Guiding Ray great room damaged by a spill in the auditorium above.
- Install a temporary fix to a leak at the top of the church spiral staircase and place Plexiglas in the slit windows to keep rain off the steps.
- Hire a structural engineer to do an initial analysis of masonry issues in the Church previously identified by committee members.

While committee members provide hundreds of hours maintaining our campus, there are nonetheless tasks that require professionals. Unfortunately, the elevator has been less that reliable of late and required several visits from Pine State Elevator with issues continuing into 2023. Other significant expenses including repair of the Rectory refrigerator, hiring an arborist to remove a tall threatening tree and engineering consultation. These and other normal expenses resulted in being significantly over budget for the year.

In 2022, the committee lost its longtime chair, Jim Stoddard, as he and Betsy moved to New Hampshire. We are grateful for his leadership, hard work and countless hours he put in.

Meal Train/ Casserole Ministry

This is another ministry that COVID-19 affected greatly as our mission is to share meals with parishioners who are temporarily unable to cook for themselves, and this kind of contact has not been allowed. The Meal Train consists of dozens of Saint Mary's cooks who prepare and deliver meals to folks in our community who are in need and unable to cook following surgery or recovering from an illness or other life-changing events, such as the arrival of a new baby or other needs.

Without formal meetings and relying on internet and telephone contact, we provide meals to numerous families in our church community. In some cases, it has been for one or two days while for others we have provided weeks of meals seasoned with kindness and care.

Outreach Committee

Outreach at Saint Mary's continues to focus on our relationship with God's creation, human and otherwise. The committee tries to offer as many possibilities for parishioners to build relationships with the immigrant community, the recovery community, those dealing with food insecurity, families in need, at-risk youth, as well as racial justice matters and caring for creation.

This year Outreach continued its hallmark programs. Parishioners cooked and served members of the community twice a month at Souper Supper, even once by candlelight when the power failed and curbside when Covid made it unsafe to eat inside. They volunteered at St. Elizabeth's Jubilee Center, providing those in need with items not covered by general assistance. The church community responded to the need as well, loading the St. Elizabeth's box in the Parish Hall with coats, diapers, pots, and pans, and more. Under another program, Helping Hands at Home, a loyal contingent returned this year to rake leaves for a very grateful parishioner.

Nourishing the committee and the entire parish with prayer again this year, Merle Marie Troeger offered her "Quiet Mornings" of reflection in Lent and Advent.

There was a significant change on the Outreach team when Jennifer Gregg retired as chair after years of dedicated leadership. The other committee members are Stan Eaton, Anne LaFond, Dana Madison, Marian McCue, Vanessa Record, and Bonny Rodden.

Some of the highlights of the year were:

- Helping the Vembas, our adopted family from Angola, settle into their new home in Westbrook while they await a permit allowing them to work. Big news for 2023! Belinda is expecting a third child in March!
- Providing the Falmouth Food Pantry with fresh vegetables from the gardens of Guiding Ray and adult parishioners as part of the Grow-A-Row project. And making apple crisp and volunteering at the Community Dinner which raises money for the Pantry.
- Socializing with homeless families of asylum seekers and watching over them at night when they were sheltered for two weeks at the Congregational Church in Falmouth.

Outreach Financial 2021 Disbursements

Another role of Outreach is recommending to the Vestry how to spend 5% of pledges from last year that are designated for outreach. This year, \$15,200 was distributed to Souper Supper and 18 non-profits. The criteria were: non-profits with whom we have a mission relationship, those for which individual parishioners volunteer, and those organizations in Maine and internationally that serve people in need. 


202nd Diocesan Convention of The Episcopal Diocese of Maine: 22 October 2022
