



## Jesus Christ is the Wisdom of Creation



History can only be understood with the benefit of hindsight, but it may now be true that humanity has recently crossed a threshold into a full-blown global climate crisis. The fact that we here in Maine are somewhat shielded from the most visceral impacts of this climate crisis does not alter the fundamental reality that we currently are – and will be much more – impacted by it. For our own sakes and for the sake of our shared human future, we must act.

Meeting in 2022, the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church recognized climate change as "an all-encompassing social crisis and moral emergency that impacts and interconnects every aspect of pastoral concern including health, poverty, employment, racism, social justice, and family life, and that can only be addressed by a Great Work involving every sector of society, including the Church."

The Rev. Nathan W. Ferrell As a Christian community, our primary contribution to this Great Work is our embodiment of the Way of Jesus. As the Incarnate One, Jesus demonstrates once and for all that God chooses to get involved in the problems of Creation, and to craft a solution through the voluntary power of Love. Jesus does not hide himself away or protect himself from the fractured reality of human experience. In the same manner, he calls us to "take up our cross" and follow him. This means we must be willing to sacrifice at least some (and perhaps most) of our comforts and pleasures for the wellbeing of others. We do this gladly and willingly for the sake of the love of God, not out of fear or guilt, not because we are forced to

do so. Just as the apostle Paul considered it a great joy to suffer for the sake of Christ, we too consider it a great joy to suffer for the sake of Christ whom we find in the lives of the poor and the vulnerable. They are the ones whom we must always consider first whenever we vote, act, decide and shop – and even when we gather for worship.

The annual Season of Creation is from September 1 through October 4. This year, Saint Mary's observance of this Season will include special liturgies and prayers, focused Sunday Formation opportunities, online Anglican gatherings, and an opportunity for hands-on involvement on Saturday 30 September. I hope you will approach this Season with an open heart and mind, and a willingness to listen for how God is calling you to respond with the love of Christ to the reality of our climate crisis.


### **Hosts Needed for the Autumn**

# Our September Focus is: Maine Council of Churches

In a time when we often feel helpless about climate change, poverty, and hunger, the Maine Council of Churches does what one single person, church, or denomination cannot do alone. Through the work it does

and the networks it builds, MCC embodies the core value of our faith, our Episcopal denomination and Saint Mary's outreach efforts: love of neighbor.

Saint Mary's funds specific non-profit organizations that independently work for social and racial justice, but MCC, a non-partisan umbrella organization, provides a unique collective voice of faith that amplifies the voices of those too often marginalized or ignored - people who are poor, vulnerable, and outcast – and gives voice to our fragile planet.

It also provides a voice for many of us who are afraid or unable to speak out on our own.

Join us at both services on Sunday, September 17 when Rev. Jane Field, Maine Council of Churches executive director, and John Hennessy, the Episcopal Diocese's director of public policy, will give a joint sermon about our calling as Episcopalians to love our neighbor.

They will also be at the Sunday Formation and both coffee Hours to answer any guestions or discuss the sermon more fully.

MCC is a coalition of seven mainline Protestant denominations in Maine (including the Episcopal Diocese of Maine) that have more than 430 congregations with 55,000 parishioners in their care. But the Council's reach extends outside the church to the "nones" and the "dones" through its mission of connecting people "within, through, and beyond the church" so that together we can create a more just, compassionate and peaceful world.

MCC carries out this mission through advocacy at the Statehouse and speaking with the voice of faith in the public sphere; through educational programs, such as a recent on-line talk with an author who wrote about white Christian nationalism; and by connecting people across denominations, faith traditions, public policy interests, races, ethnicities, sexual orientations, and gender identities.

Some Saint Marians have already participated in one of MCC's programs, Advocacy Days, which provides training to communicate effectively with legislators from the perspective of faith. For more information, contact Bonny Rodden at brodden1.br@gmail.com or 781-4978.

Thank you for your generous support! The overflowing boxes of donated pots, pans, cups, plates, sheet sets, blankets, towels, and other kitchenware and houseware has been very appreciated by the neighbors of St. E's through the summer!

### **FALL DRIVE BEGINS!**

St. Elizabeth's Jubilee Center (St. E's) is a low-barrier pantry serving non-food essentials to all those in need. Every Tuesday morning (8:15-11:00am), we provide (at no charge) basic daily non-food essentials that cannot be purchased with federal SNAP funds. The Center is located at the rear of St. Luke's Cathedral, at 134 Park Street, Portland, ME.

### As Fall approaches, here is an update on what is happening at St. E's:

We distribute the following items in a typical week. Can you imagine doing without these essentials? Toilet paper: 600 rolls [\$375]; 31,200 rolls annually [\$9,000]

Soap bars: 285 bars of bath soap [\$163}; 14,820 bars annually [\$8,476] Infant diapers: 4,500 diapers weekly [\$600]; 54,000 diapers annually [\$7,200]

**As well as:** Eco-friendly laundry detergent (enough for 724 loads weekly / 37,650 loads annually), Feminine pads (875 weekly / 45,500 pads annually), and monthly distribution of dental products, bedding, towels, kitchen wares. Other special products seasonally.

# **Falmouth Food Pantry - Update**

The Falmouth Food Pantry is currently serving just under 200 families (about 540 family members) a month. It is very appreciative of the generous donation from St. Mary's Last Sunday Offering at the end of February! Volunteers continue to deliver boxes of non-perishable food, fresh vegetables, eggs, and meat to the homes of families who need food assistance (the pantry has not yet returned to offering curbside assistance or to welcoming families inside the actual pantry).

The Falmouth Food Pantry is asking for certain food donations. The most helpful foods are soup in cans (but not cream soups), boxes of pasta, cold cereal, canned tuna fish, canned chicken, and granola bars.

t-shirt/shirts (7/8)



# Vestry Highlights from the Wardens



The vestry met on Wednesday, August 16 after Mass on the Grass on a beautiful August evening.

Buildings and Grounds reports the engineering contract with Thornton Tomasetti has been signed to move forward with planning for repairs to our beautiful church.

We are waiting for the final write up of the Knowles contract for the contractor side of the project. The design portion will take place in September and October, and the physical repairs are scheduled to begin in the spring.

A Building Committee is being formed of 5 to 8 people; contact Steve if interested. We are still looking for the chairper-

son for the Fundraising committee which will include 5 to 8 people.

Financial Review by Peter G. reflected that we continue to do well on the revenue side, although expenses are a bit over budget. Peter also reported that the transfer of our investment funds has been completed to Harpswell, and we have much more control over our funds as well as access to daily balance reporting. Nathan provided an update regarding the ongoing hope to host a childcare/preschool center in the fall of 2024. Pat Peard has carefully investigated the rules and regulations regarding offering a Child Care Center at Saint Mary's. We do need approval from both the Town and the State. The State requirements are quite straightforward. Difficult issues have arisen with the ordinances of the Town of Falmouth as Saint Mary's is in a restricted zone and as such would not be approved for such a use. The way the ordinance is written, many current uses of the Parish Hall are not allowed. Nathan and Pat will continue to work on the issue in conjunction with Pastor Amelia Edson of the Falmouth Congregational

Church.

Summer Soiree was held inside due to rain throughout the day. Steve C reported on the good turnout, the wonderful evening filled with excellent food and a very lively auction. No final count on the funds raised, but we know it has exceeded expectations.

Kickoff Sunday, September 10th. Plans are not yet finalized but the Cinnamon Girl Truck will be here to serve food. James Kennerly will be starting as Music Minister on Sunday, August 20th. Meg Hurdman will continue as Family Minister, and the Nominating Committee will get started early in September as slate needs to complete in December.

The Sparkles Christmas Fair has been a highly anticipated event in our community for many years. Let's make 2023 a year to remember.


