Frank Laubach was a twentieth century American missionary to the Philippines who labored in the field of literacy. In his small book called <u>Prayer</u>, published in 1946, he

argued that "the future is menaced by small minds." Mr. Laubach went on to say, "The most acute need of our age is for global-minded people who 'think the world thought, do the world deed, and pray the world prayer'.... Nothing has brought our world to the brink of hell but warped, prejudiced, greedy little thoughts."

His insights are profound. Each act of violence, and every war, is initiated by small minds operating in an US versus THEM framework built on previous actions recorded in history. These little thoughts do not serve humanity well, and they are entirely inconsistent with what God has brought into being through the Incarnate One. The new Way opened for us in the person of Jesus is an invitation to join the Beloved Community that loves the enemy precisely because they are an enemy! This one new humanity welcomes people from every language, nation and tribe, without concern for the fictional lines that humans draw between various groups based on subjective criteria.

My friends, as you contemplate the miracle of Christmas in these days, please think the world thought, do the world deed, and pray the world prayer. There is only one planet Earth, our one fragile home in this vast and unforgiving universe. Do not allow your thinking to be trapped by petty and small concerns. Be global-minded people who always consider what is best for all people and all the planet. By doing this, you can in fact carry the meaning of Christmas forward and move us perhaps one inch closer to that peaceable kingdom of the Prince of Peace.



#### John the Baptist: The Awkward Advent Prophet

I love John the Baptist; I'm a fan. This eccentric locust-eating wild man of the Judean countryside flies in the face of our modern Holiday Season. But I think because his personality is such an affront to our modern sensibilities we can sometimes overlook how profound, and dare I say, *moderate* this Prophet really is. First, let's look at why I argue John the Baptist is quite sensible and moderate. In Luke's Gospel account, we read some the teachings of John on what is required for true repentance to God:

"And the crowds asked him, 'What then should we do?' In reply he said to them, 'Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise.' Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, 'Teacher, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you.' Soldiers also asked him, 'And we, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages.' -Luke 3:10-14



In other words, don't lie, cheat, or steal, and if you have an abundance, give generously. This is quite sensible and moderate when we compare it to Jesus' teachings on selling all your possessions and giving the money to the poor. Hence, I think that while John is an eccentric, his teachings are actually not that difficult to swallow and digest.

Second, I want to focus on the gift of his eccentricities as wisdom during this Advent Season. John lives in the wilderness, away from the cosmopolitan centers of society. He makes his clothes and food from the land, not from the marketplace. He cares nothing for wealth, status, or how others perceive him: His one duty is faithfulness to God. John is "*The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord*," but how does he do this? John rejects the vanities of this world; he proclaims good news to the poor; and he speaks truth to power and to the comfortable. By letting go of the vanities of this world, John creates space for God to come into the lives around him.

During Advent, the outside world is going to ramp up the calls for us to consume, to party, to spend money to fix any unhappiness in our lives or the lives of our loved ones. During Advent, the outside world will try to prey on any insecurity or fear we have so that we may buy the next new product that will make us feel beautiful or safe. During Advent, the outside world through social media will continue to be a source of division, malice, and cruelty. There will be a lot of noise this season; there will be a lot of vanity.

What is the wisdom from our Awkward Advent Prophet? Prepare our hearts for the Lord; make space for Jesus. Let go of the vanities of the world; take time to separate ourselves from the false promises that consumption, beauty, wealth or fame will lead to happiness. Also remember: don't lie, cheat, or steal, and if you have an abundance, give generously. If we do these things, we shall be blessed...and maybe - just maybe - come to welcome hearing of John the Baptist during Advent.

# Sacred music series part 2: Advent & Christmas

I heard the bells on Christmas Day Their old, familiar carols play, And wild and sweet The words repeat Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's oft-quoted 1863 poem, *Christmas Bells*, sums up in many ways the epitome of sacred music at this time of year. The carols tend to be "familiar," "old," and "sweet." Like Charles Dicken's *A Christmas Carol*, the poem speaks very much to our current celebration of Christmas replete with a vast array of apparently ancient traditions and customs. But it was not always so. Until the middle of the twentieth century, the majority of Anglican Communion traditions celebrated their principal Christmas service on Christmas morning. It was not until the popularization of the so-called "Midnight Mass" by the Roman Catholics in the 1950s that a celebration on the eve became the more popular of the two services.

Despite the constant extraneous sights and sounds of Christmas during the month of November (and sometimes even October!), Christmas does not officially begin in the Church until midnight on December 25; (it continues until the Twelfth Night, January 6, and, in some traditions, continues until February 2, the Feast of the Candlemas). Before that we experience the penitential season of Advent. Liturgically, the colors of the vestments are changed from the "ordinary time" colors of green or white. The Advent wreath, with its four candles representing the four Sundays of Advent, is lit. The Gloria in excelsis (Glory to God on high) is replaced with a less celebratory Song of Praise, and we focus in on the creation of the world, the Holy Family, and the Old Testament prophets proclaiming the birth of the Savior. Here are some lesser-known facts about Advent and Christmas traditions that we will enjoy over the course of the following four weeks.

#### **Christmas Carol**

The world "carol" comes from the Old French world, "carole" meaning a secular circle dance accompanied by singers. The form flourished during the Early Middle Ages. While carols may have been sung as devotional offerings in association with Feast days (not necessarily just Christmas), they were not offered as part of any liturgy, which had texts prescribed (in Latin) that were specific to the readings and themes

of the particular day. Following the Reformation the incorporation of folk and folk-like words and music into the services proved a popular move, and the tradition developed considerably during and since the nineteenth century. The word is now virtually synonymous with Christmas religious celebrations.

#### **Lessons & Carols**

Far from being an ancient tradition, the traditional service of nine lessons and carols, famously broadcast from the

chapel of Kings College in the University of Cambridge, began life in 1880. At this time, Christmas carols were sung by choirs who would go from doorstep to doorstep, (a practice replicated in a great many Christmas movies). The Dean of Truro cathedral in Cornwall invented the format of nine lessons, and nine carols for choir complemented them, to which were added carols for the whole congregation to sing. The format has remained pretty much as it was first conceived. It has proved immensely popular. King's College continues to broadcast the service live on radio, as it has done since 1928.

#### Hark! the Herald?

What if I told you that one of the most famous and iconic Christmas carols started life with a different name AND a different tune? Well, that is the case with "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing." The original text, penned by Charles Wesley in 1739, was "Hark, how all the welkin rings / 'Glory to the King of Kings." ("Welkin" is Old Saxon for Heaven.) Furthermore, the tune that Wesley originally used was that sung to "Jesus Christ is risen today" (207 in The Hym*nal*). Try singing the first few lines to that melody! The familiar version of the words was set in 1753 when Wesley's text was published in George Whitefield's Hymns for Social Worship. The now-familiar melody was adapted from an existing piece by Felix Mendelssohn (apparently to the composer's chagrin). Since its publication in that form in 1857, the text and tune have become inseparable.

So, there we have it. Behind the apparently ageless musical and liturgical traditions of the Advent and Christmas season lie a great many surprises, diversions, and new creations. In any case, I cannot wait to celebrate this most magical of seasons at Saint Mary's.







Tis the Season, and we are making plans for Advent and Christmas. A group of parishioners worked on Advent wreaths during both coffee hours on the Sunday after Thanksgiving. Thanks to all the volunteers who helped.

We will be teaching with music in December. Miss Mel (Melissa Roland) is dusting off the hand bells, and we are hoping to have a children's bell choir participate in one of the services at the end of December. During class time, we will review the Christmas story and use songs and bells during class time. If you are musical and can help on Dec. 3<sup>rd</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, and 17<sup>th</sup>, let Meg know.

Our new pageant director, Emily Rodgers, is working with our music minister, James Kennerley, and Father Nathan on a script for the morning service on Christmas Eve.

The Christmas story is told in only two of the four Gospels. The pageant script is a compilation of details from both Matthew and Luke. From these gospels we learn different bits of information that help us see Jesus was born during a tumultuous time. Both gospels open with a description of an engaged couple (Mary and Joseph). Both identify Joseph as descended from the line of King David and have Mary conceived by the Holy Spirit. The overlap notes the Holy Family lived in Nazareth, but Jesus was born in Bethlehem. That is where the similarities end.

Matthew's gospel records that the visit of the Magi (kings or wise men) from the East, probably Persia (Iran) who are not mentioned in Luke. Luke tells the story of the shepherds, who are missing from Matthew. Luke mentions a Roman census but does not record the slaughter of infants or the resulting flight of Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus to Egypt.

The timeline is vague, but the events are dramatic. They include an empire-wide census, a miraculous conception and birth, a very bright star, several kings, a massacre, an escape, and eventual return. Matthew and Luke both reported the events they each believed to be the most significant to frame Jesus as the promised messiah and a fulfilment of Biblical prophecy.

It all comes to you on Sunday, December 24 at 10:15 AM.

# Vestry Highlights from the Wardens

The Vestry met on November 15.

Peter provided a financial overview and reported our revenue is currently 15% above our 2023 budget. Attendance at our Sunday services has increased over recent months and loose offerings have exceeded our budgeted amount. To balance our revenue, expenses have been higher than expected, due in large part to added expenses within our music program. We received a generous gift from the Galli family, and we discussed proposed upgrades to our kitchen including a new dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer, knife set and aprons. Building and grounds is doing

some additional research and will report back to the executive committee. Peter and Garret B worked on and presented a draft budget for 2024. The Vestry acknowledged and voiced appreciation to both for their ongoing work on the budget.

Janet and Steve have done more investigation, and it appears that having the Sanctuary building designated as an historic building is not as restrictive as it first appeared. If we are approved to be considered an historic building, then we become eligible to apply for federal grants to help with the church restorations needed in 2024 and 2025. Vestry approved that we move ahead and begin the National Register Application Process.

Foundation 135: Preserving the Faith will be our campaign name for restoration work to be completed in 2025, which is 135 years after Saint Mary's was begun. Thornton Tomasetti have been hired as our structural engineers and Knowles Industrial will be the contractor for the work. Mapping has been completed using a drone, and digital plans are being finalized. Additional information will be presented to the Parish at the annual meeting on January 28.

Guiding Ray Day School: We continue to move forward with the Town of Falmouth and the State of Maine Dept of Health and Human Services to receive the needed approvals. The zoning for the neighborhood needs to be adjusted. Hopefully this will all be completed by May of 2024. Nathan feels strongly that this should be the mission component of the Foundation 135 campaign.

Patrick Murray provided a wonderful review of fees charged and received for the use of our Auditorium, other parish rooms, and the Sanctuary as well. The Vestry had a robust discussion regarding balancing our desire to remain open, welcoming, and available for the community, while being cognizant of the cost to maintain and heat the buildings. Since we had not increased any fees for 7 years, a slight increase to several of the rental fees was suggested.



#### **WANTED! Eucharistic Ministers and Lectors**

If the Holy Spirit may be tugging at your heart to offer this ministry occasionally at Saint Mary's, please be in touch with Fr Nathan or Deacon Matthew. We will plan either individual or group training, depending on the response.






