



Foundation 135: Preserving the Faith

It's a new year and a new day here at Saint Mary's! We are launching a new campaign to strengthen the foundation of our parish community and to grow our mission within our broader community. The Vestry has called this project "Foundation 135: Preserving the Faith." Each word of this title is redolent with meaning. Let's start with the number. Why 135? Because we expect this project to be complete in 2025, which will be 135 years since the first foundation stone was laid for the Chancel in 1890. Why foundation? Because one major component of this project will be reinforcing the structural integrity of the Bell Tower and the overall Sanctuary building. It is perfectly safe now (thanks be to God!), but there are concerns about water infiltration and disintegrating mortar which, if left unaddressed, will result in enormous problems in the future. We must not allow that to happen. Not on our watch!

This provides a direct connection to the task of preserving the place where our parish practices our faith in community. We have been called to be good stewards of this beautiful place; our goal must be to make sure it is standing strong for another 135 years at least, God willing. But this is about stones and mortar; how does this preserve the faith? A building cannot do that, for the Christian faith is passed along by people from one generation to another.


Another major component of our project will be launching a new Day School to serve the needs of our growing community. Access to quality childcare is an enormous need for families in the Falmouth area, and Saint Mary's is well positioned to meet this need. We have an excellent childcare facility that only requires a few small changes to be licensed by the state. We have a history of caring for children, and we have a community of people who love children. In my mind, it is not right that our childcare facility is used only 4 hours each week (on Sunday mornings) when so many families need a safe and reliable place for their children to be Mondays through Fridays. God willing, and with your energetic cooperation, we will expand our Guiding RAY ministry to be open on weekdays for a maximum of 20 toddlers and preschoolers. This is where preserving the faith comes in, because this will be an intentionally Christian childcare center. While being open to all people, our Guiding RAY ministry (Sunday School AND Day School) will embody a clear intention of passing on the faith of Jesus to the next generation. If all the pieces line up in the way we hope, our Guiding RAY Day School will open to children on the day after Labor Day (Tuesday 03 September).



I am excited about Saint Mary's taking this next step together, and I hope you are too. Please mark Sunday 28 January on your calendar for our Parish Annual Meeting. That morning we will focus on our Foundation 135 project with good visual presentations and time for questions and answers. This project will be an All-Hands-On-Deck undertaking, and there will be many different ways to participate. Come and find your unique way of contributing to the success of this project, so that we can strengthen our foundation and preserve the faith that we have inherited, to the glory and praise of God, our generous Creator.

JAN 7: <u>Christian Division and Unity</u>: what is the Great Schism? When was the Reformation? What was the Radical Reformation? Come and learn more


JAN 14: The Three Great Awakenings in America: where did the Quakers, the Shakers, the Mormons and the Seventh Day Adventists all come from?

Music Ministry: Sacred Music Series

Part 3: Christmas & Epiphany

The extraordinary beauty of music is as powerful as ever during this season. Whether it's a Christmas hit blaring away at the store or the sweet sound of choristers offering their praise to the Almighty, there is nothing quite like Christmas music to lift our spirits. While you may well have heard Christmas music before December 24, we are careful in church to observe Advent's true and powerful purpose of waiting, preparing, and keeping watch for the birth of the Christ child. Once He arrives, we celebrate for a full twelve days (during which time the secular world will probably have done away with the Christmas tree and everything else!) But it is this season of Christmas and Epiphany that contains some of the most glorious sacred music, much of which we will hear as part of the liturgy here at Saint Mary's. Please ensure that your Spotify playlists continue with Christmas selections until at least January 6 (in some parts of our Anglican tradition we even enjoy Christmas music until February 2, the Feast of the Purification, or Candlemas!)

In the bleak midwinter

Christina Rosetti (1830–1894) was born into a vibrant London family that incubated a great deal of artistic talent. The house was frequently host to poets, artists, and musicians, and Christina's brother, Dante Gabriel Rossetti, established the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood and featured her as a model in a number of his paintings. "In the Bleak Midwinter" was published under the title "A Christmas Carol" in the January 1872 issue of *Scribner's Monthly*, an illustrated American literary periodical. English composer Harold Darke set the verses to music in 1906 and published it as part of *The English Hymnal*. Darke, organist and choirmaster at the medieval London church of St Michael, Cornhill, composed a choral setting in 1909 that was named in 2008 as "the world's greatest Christmas carol." We tend to agree! The childlike simplicity of the poetry is matched by a simple yet sublime melody, sung first by the solo soprano and later by the solo tenor. The remaining verses are sung by the choir.

The Three Kings

"Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern" (translated in the *Hymnal* 1982 as "How brightly shines the morning star") is a hymn by Philipp Nicolai written in 1597 and first published in 1599. It is based on Psalm 45 and imagines Jesus as both the bridegroom and morning star. The melody, also purportedly by Nicolai, has been adopted by a host of composers over the centuries, including Johann Sebastian Bach, Felix Mendelssohn, Max Reger, and Hugo Distler. The choir will sing an extraordinarily beautiful setting this January by Peter Cornelius, which

sets the *chorale* against the backdrop of an eloquent, baritone melody.

Christ unser Herr

Sometimes you will see the titles of preludes or postludes in German. During the 17th and 18th centuries, it was common practice for composers to adorn well-known hymn melodies in the form of organ chorale preludes. This tradition continues to this day, although by far the most celebrated and arguably the most skillful practitioner was the great Johann Sebastian Bach. In the Lutheran tradition, Bach knew these chorales intimately, as did his congregation. Bach composed a prelude, (which you will hear played on the magnificent Baroque organ at Saint Mary's) in the chorale, "Christ, unser Herr, zum Jordan kam" ("When Jesus went to Jordan's Stream," page 139 in the *Hymnal 1982*.) In addition to presenting the chorale melody (played by the feet), Bach provides a rolling accompaniment for the hands that ingeniously recalls the flowing Jordan River, and an eight-note figure that suggests the shape of a cross, the symbol of which blesses us all at Baptism.

Enjoy the gift of music this Christmas and Epiphany season!


First Communion Retreat & Celebration: February 10 & 11

At 5 PM, the entire families of our First Communicants are invited to join together for a potluck supper. At that time, we will discuss what we learned in the Camp and go over all the details for the next day.

On Sunday morning February 11 at our 10:15 Eucharist, our First Communicants will be "the stars of the show" as they carry their candles into the church, lead us in singing a song, and become the first ones on this day to receive Communion, using the bread that they made the previous day! Partners for World Health.

In January, our Outreach Mission of the Month will be an organization based in Portland, Partners for World Health.

Join us for a coffee hour (watch eNEWS for the date) to learn more about PWH, a non-profit that sends worldwide medical supplies which

otherwise would have been thrown away. Volunteers help out by sorting medical supplies at PWH's warehouse on a date to be determined. Thanks are due to Joyce and Len Verey, frequent volunteers at PWH, who introduced parishioners to PWH at a volunteer day last year and will continue again this year with various activities for Mission of the Month.

Established in 2009, PWH collects medical equipment and supplies from healthcare facilities, manufacturers, other organizations, and individuals. PWH sorts, evaluates, repackages, and prepares these supplies and equipment for distribution to individuals, communities, and healthcare facilities in need, both locally and internationally. This work limits the impact on the environment by diverting materials from landfills, lowers healthcare costs by lowering disposal fees, and provides healthcare resources to those in need. PWH aims to improve

health conditions by sending medical personnel on medical missions to the developing world and educating New England communities about global health issues.



PWH has now grown each year to become the largest agency of its type in New England. In 2023, it will have diverted more than a million pounds of surplus medical equipment and supplies from landfills, and it will be sorted, evaluated and prepared for shipment perfectly usable items for local and global use. By the end of 2023, PWH will have shipped seventeen 40-foot containers of medical equipment and supplies valued at \$345,000 each to 15 different countries and four shipments via air. PWH will ship a total of 24-30 containers and air freight shipments in 2024. PWH's Ukraine Response has sent more than \$4,140,000 worth of urgently needed medical supplies to Ukraine directly by air or sea. PWH has also equipped dozens of doctors, nurses, EMTs, and other volunteers traveling to Ukraine or those countries supporting refugees, free of charge. PWH also responded to the Turkish and Syrian earthquakes and shipped three containers and an air freight to the earthquake region, and PWH is now readying its response to Israel and Gaza with our overseas partners. 




