



#### Do You Know What I Have Done To You?

On Maundy Thursday 28 March, it will be our intention to participate in the ancient Christian ritual of footwashing. This is one of the most unique practices within the Christian tradition. Perhaps many of you, like me, watched a surprising commercial about this during the SuperBowl. As soon as I saw the first scene of someone down on their knees pouring water over the feet of another who would be considered an opponent in the culture wars, I knew it was a "Jesus" commercial. The story of footwashing is found only in John 13. In this story, Jesus gladly takes on the role of a house servant to wash the feet of his closest disciples, including Judas who was to betray him later that night. The paradox of the story is profound, and so are the implications for those who choose to be disciples of Jesus. The Messiah, the Br

are the implications for those who choose to be disciples of Jesus. The Messiah, the Bread of life, the Light of the world, the Truth – this One chooses to serve and to bless those who would soon abandon him to save their own skins, and even one who would betray him for money.

When he finished, he asked them, "Do you know what I have done to you?" (John 13.12). What a question! How could they possibly understand all that this meant for them - and for us? Throughout the intervening centuries, many leaders have used their Christian faith to bolster their political power, but a true Christian leader demonstrates their faith by washing the feet of their political rivals. Can you imagine such a scene of cross-aisle footwashing in Congress today? Rather than impugning the character and motives of opponents, authentic leaders who claim to be Christian should actively seek ways to serve those same opponents with humility and compassion.

If you and I choose to walk in the way of Jesus, we become recipients of the highest possible honor and the most challenging duty. Our reward is that we have the privilege to do what Jesus did, to follow his example. After the footwashing, he also said, "If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them" (John 13.17). IF we do them. As Holy Week approaches, allow me to encourage you in the strongest possible terms to do these things. Come and wash feet on Maundy Thursday, either at Noon in the Chapel or at 6 PM in the Auditorium. Yes, it is awkward and uncomfortable. Yes, it requires you to make yourself vulnerable. But this is what makes it so special. The Teacher promised blessings for those willing to take the risk and humble themselves. Perhaps even more vital is the awareness that such acts of humble service are the only way that this hurting world is ever going to find hope and healing. Jesus did show us the way. Let's walk it together.

#### Foundation 135: Preserving the Faith

The pieces are slowly coming together for our Foundation 135 campaign. We will soon have firm construction expense numbers from Thornton Thomasetti. Our Project Team is working with this firm and with Knowles Industrial Services of Gorham to develop a timeline for these repair projects. Due to unrelated delays, it looks like work will not begin until autumn of this year.

In case you have never seen it, here is one photo of the old spiral staircase which leads up the tower to the bell. It is difficult to tell from this photo, but these stairs must be replaced as part of this project and much of the mortar between these bricks will need to be repaired. This will be a complicated and complex undertaking.

We are also gathering estimates from contractors for some of the other various project needs, such as tree removals and paving.



We are also gathering a team who will serve as our Development Team. With firmer expense numbers, we will soon have a clearer picture of our fundraising needs. If you would like to be part of this effort, or if you feel called to help with granting writing as a way to raise funds for this campaign, please reach out to Janet Bowne. We are also exploring the possibility of a Historic Registry designation as a means of access to restoration grant funding.

Saint Mary's is on the March 26 agenda of the Falmouth Board of Zoning Appeals to receive a Conditional Use Permit to operate our Guiding RAY Childcare Center. After this hurdle, the only other town requirement will be a Planning Board review of the Center and its possible ramifications.

We need to find a potential Director for our Guiding RAY Childcare Center. If you know of anyone who may be interested in being part of the foundation of this center, please share this name with Nathan. They must be licensed to run a childcare center or open to becoming licensed. We can certainly work with them through the process.





#### Is Not This the Fasting That I Chose?

As I was contemplating what to write for the Lenten article in March, I came across one of the Scripture readings for Ash Wednesday from Isaiah 58. The assembly is being called to fast, but far from the traditional forms of pious fasting, God through the Prophet changes the vision of what true fasting and true repentance towards God look like:

Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every voke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in.

What a world-altering vision! God's Extravagant Dream for us: that the powers of oppression, the powers of poverty, the powers of hatred and violence are torn asunder! And the Prophet calls on the people of God to replace their traditional understandings of piety with this divine dream.

It reminds me of what God speaks through the Prophet



Amos when he calls on the people to repent. The people trust in their expressions of fanciful religious piety, but God declares boldly that God detests their praise and piety; instead, God declares: "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!"

Time and time again, we religious people try to get closer to God by individual and collective forms of pious expression. And time and time again in the Prophets and through Jesus Christ our Lord, God reveals that if we want to get closer to God, we must treat each other better: we must care for each other better, especially the least among us. May we embrace and live into this wild dream and vision God has revealed to us through the Prophets and in Jesus, our Savior!

#### **CONFIRMATION, RECEPTION & REAFFIRMATION**

<u>Concerning the Service of Confirmation</u> (from the BCP p.412): "In the course of their Christian development, those baptized at an early age are expected, when they are ready and have been duly prepared, to make a mature public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptism and to receive the laying on of hands by the bishop. Those baptized as adults, unless baptized with laying on of hands by a bishop, are also expected to make a public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptism in the presence of a bishop and to receive the laying on of hands."

#### **Who are candidates for Confirmation?**

- 1. Those who have been baptized.
- 2. Those who are ready to make a public statement of their identity as a follower of Jesus.
- 3. Those who are between 14 and 114 years of age. Each young person must at least currently be in high school.

#### Who are candidates for Reception?

- 1. Those who have been baptized and confirmed in another tradition which also has bishops in apostolic succession.
- 2. Those who wish to make a public statement of their identity as a member of The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion.

#### Who are candidates for Reaffirmation?

- 1. Those who have already been confirmed by an Episcopal or Anglican bishop.
- 2. Those who feel called, after time away from the church or after an important life transition, to make a public statement about their renewed commitment to Christ.
- 3. Those who desire the Bishop of Maine to lay hands upon them and to pray for the Holy Spirit to strengthen and uphold them.

If you are one who fits any of these three categories, and if you feel led to pursue Confirmation, Reception or Reaffirmation, please contact Fr. Nathan. We have an Episcopal Visitation scheduled for **Sunday 10 March**. It may be possible to be confirmed, received or reaffirmed at that time with Bishop Brown here at Saint Mary's, but plans must be made soon in order for this to happen.

#### Music Ministry: Sacred Music Series - part 5

# Sacred music series: the King of instruments "To my eyes and ears the organ will forever be the King of Instruments."

For almost a thousand years the pipe organ has been a cornerstone of the Christian musical tradition. Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart wrote the famous line in a letter to his father in 1777 after playing on an organ built by his friend, J A Stein. Take a look at countless Judeo-Christian sanctuaries in the West and you are sure to be struck by the presence of a pipe organ. They are often visually compelling, designed to complement the architecture of the church and accommodate the physical requirements of the instruments themselves. Listen to the services and you will be certain that the organ plays a significant role in leading the congregation in song. The organ has established itself as the pre-eminent instrument to glorify God through its ability to elevate the liturgy and inspire our hearts, minds, and voices towards a closer relationship with God.

The organ has its earliest roots in ancient Greece, where the engineer Ctesibius of Alexandria is credited with inventing the hydraulis, a portable instrument that was used to accompany secular gatherings. The instrument continued to be used in that fashion throughout the Roman Empire until 812 when Charlemagne (748-814), King of the Franks commissioned a pipe organ for his chapel in Aachen. The instrument grew in size and technical complexity during the Middle Ages and became increasingly commonplace in large churches and cathedrals. Instruments in Northern Europe in the late seventeenth century featured up to four manuals (keyboards), pedals to be played by the feet, and thousands of pipes. Since then, organs have been adapted to take advantage of the latest technology, including electricity, hi-tech computer controls, and digital reproductions.

A 2007 document by our Roman Catholic sisters and brothers summarizes the appropriateness of the organ beautifully: "Among all other instruments [...] the organ is accorded pride of place because of its capacity to sustain the singing of a large gathered assembly, due to both its size, and its ability to give resonance to the fullness of human sentiments, from joy to sadness, from praise to lamentation. Likewise, the manifold possibilities of the organ in some way reminds us of the immensity and the magnificence of God." While

the Episcopal Church does not have an official statement on the use of the organ in worship, our Anglican tradition bears witness to an incredibly rich and thriving culture of organ music in worship and in concert.

Saint Mary's has been fortunate to house two instruments in its fascinating history. The first was installed in the 1920s by the Austin Organ Co. as their Opus 1553. Still based in Hartford CT, Austin was responsible for thousands of in-

struments (including the mighty Kotzschmar Memorial Organ in Merrill Auditorium). Our modest instrument had 13 ranks and was installed in the tower ceiling, speaking through a center grille. The console from which it was played was located on the left side of the chancel, behind the choir stalls. Commissioned in 1977 from the Quebec firm of Casavant Frères, the current instrument was installed on a newly constructed gallery at the west end of the church. It was designed by the renowned German-born organ builder, Gerhard Brunzema, and takes as its inspiration the Baroque organs of Northern Europe of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. It has two manuals and pedals, 26 ranks of pipes and 20 stops (individual sounds). It is acoustically and visually stunning and, apart from the electricity used to provide the air, is entirely mechanical in its operation. It is approaching its 50th anniversary and is in need of some cleaning and updating, but it will continue to serve us indefinitely if kept in the best of conditions.

Today a wide range of instruments are used in worship services ranging from piano to rock band, brass ensemble to full orchestra. But the organ, due to its ability to uniquely support and inspire the singing of the gathered assembly, still reigns supreme. Our pipe organ is a tremendous asset to the church, and its effectiveness is borne witness in the lusty and joyous singing of our congregation. While the organ will take a modest break during Lent, providing more somber accompaniments, rest assured that it will return in full force at Easter!



Homelessness remains at "crisis level" across the United States, including in our own state and the Greater Portland community. Families with children are the fastest-growing segment of the homeless population, and Portland is currently experiencing the tightest rental market and largest influx of asylum seekers in its history, making the need to keep families housed especially urgent.

Greater Portland Family Promise's mission "is to help families experiencing homelessness and low-income families achieve sustainable independence through a community-based response."

GPFP is dedicated to preventing family homelessness. The Family Promise model is based on partnering with faith communities and other social service organizations to create a community-based a system of care for families. In addition to providing temporary housing, Family Promise will provide case management services, thereby truly addressing the needs of children and their families who are experiencing homelessness.

The current sheltering of families is in the basement of Williston-Immanuel Church in Portland.

## **VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY** with *In Her Presence*!!

For those of you who aren't familiar with IHP, it is a nonprofit based in Portland that reaches out to immigrant women with different cultures and backgrounds. IHP hosts English classes and a variety of educational workshops, providing a platform

for Maine immigrant women to better integrate and succeed with their new life in Maine.

IHP's newest program is supported by a grant from the Gorman Foundation, in partnership with Mercy Hospital. IHP has taken The Frances Warde House (a former convent nursing home in Portland owned by the state) and turned it into a 15-bed residency for homeless, pregnant immigrant women, providing shelter, meals, and community. Mercy Hospital provides the residents with clinical care needed for pre- and post-partem mothers. Once their baby is born, they have a year to find a new home.

A wish for IHP is that these women at FWH have "friendship mentors." Volunteers can visit once or twice a week taking them for coffee, a walk, or a visit to the library and providing them an opportunity to get outside of the FWH and practice their English while learning about their new home in Maine.



#### Youth Christian Formation



Guiding RAY is a fun, fellowship-oriented time on Sunday mornings for children in preschool through 6th grade. During the program year (Sept. - June), we offer our children an opportunity to learn Bible stories and to develop their relationship with God. Our hope is to guide them to the safe harbor of God's everlasting love where they can grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

According to Oxford University Press, the slang word of 2023 was *rizz*, a colloquial noun defined as a mix of

charm, confidence, magnetism, persuasiveness, and style. Older adults might use the word *charisma* instead. From its pop-culture and internet origins, the word *rizz* has entered daily use among young people. On TikTok the word *rizz* has billions of searches and views.

In English, charisma was used among early Christians to refer to a gift or favorable power bestowed upon a person by the Holy Spirit. In Greek the word charisma means "gift" and comes from the verb *charizesthai* "to favor," which derives from the noun *charis*, meaning "grace." Today we use the word as a reference to social (rather than divine) grace, as evidenced by the new slang word *rizz*.

Jesus was charismatic beyond any known person in history. People were so attracted to him they tried to make him an earthly king...by force. Crowds gathered wherever he went. He could not enter towns unnoticed; he could not eat a meal without interruption, and he could hardly sleep. In the gospels there are references to Jesus avoiding the crowds so he could find a quiet place to pray. The gospels repeatedly use the word "multitude" to describe the crowds. The crowds listened to his teaching and sought his healing power. So, we can say with confidence Jesus had *rizz*. Some people were curious; some were desperate outcasts afflicted with disease and other chronic conditions. But did the crowds become his followers?

In March we will be learning about Jesus, the Jewish Passover, the Last Supper, and how those relate to the Holy Communion we celebrate every week at Saint Mary's and around the world. We will learn about charisma and what happened with Jesus and the crowds culminating on Palm Sunday, followed by Holy Week, the agony of Good Friday and the joy of Resurrection Sunday.


