Abba Isaiah said, "Love is conversation with God in unbroken thanksgiving. God rejoices in thanksgiving, because it is a sign of peace" (Apophthegmata Patrum Systematic 17.9).

The Messiah teaches us that the most important thing of all is to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul and mind (Matthew 22.37). But how exactly are we to do this? How do we love our Creator who is invisible and beyond human comprehension? The best way to make this happen, as Abba Isaiah explains above, is to intentionally develop a continual dialogue of gratitude. Depending on your surroundings, this can take place in the silence of your thoughts, or it can be out loud. For most of us, it requires regular effort to give thanks for the unending flow of experiences in our lives. Doing this forces us to

focus on what is working and what is going well, rather than dwelling on the few things

in the moment that are not working or not proceeding as we would like. We get to choose which set of realities will be our focus, and the outcome of this choice has lasting implications for every aspect of our lives. You may remember that the Messiah immediately added a corollary to the command to love the Lord our God. In an unexpected move, he quickly added that we must love our neighbor as we love ourselves, and that these two commands are inextricably linked. It should not be surprising then that a carefully developed gratitude practice has a similar effect on our ability to love our neighbors. If we choose to focus on the good done by those around us, rather than dwelling on the few mistakes that each person inevitably makes, and if we are careful to express our gratitude for those things that are done well, our relationships with others are sure to become healthier. Love is the natural fruit of gratitude.

In our society, November is a time dedicated to Thanksgiving. This makes it an excellent time to work on our practice of gratitude. We all know that human society is a mess, and there are a multitude of problems in the world. But the fact remains that 95% of everything in our lives works the way it is supposed to. We can and should work to fix the broken things, but let us never lose sight of the unending goodness all around us. Expressing gratitude to God and to others is a sure and simple path to love and peace. This means that growing in gratitude will by itself solve some of the painful problems of our world, if more people will stop complaining and start doing it! So let's show the world how it's done, and demonstrate the beauty of a life of unbroken thanksgiving. May it always be so!






Sunday 26 November, 9 – 12Advent Wreath Making Workshop

Music Ministry

Sacred music series part 1: Why music?

"The joy of music is that it can go beyond words... Music can express what there is in the soul."

Why is music so central to the Christian faith and particularly to celebration of the sacred mysteries? It is a question I am frequently asked, and I thought that a series on sacred music in its many and various forms would be both entertaining and edifying. Picture this: the organist plays an impressive postlude following the closing hymn. The congregation remains in the pews, intense in concentration, only to break it with rapturous applause as the final strains of the echo fade away into the ornate stonework.

What causes this music to have such a powerful emotional response? The answer is not found in the virtuosity of the performer, the impressive sounds of the organ that has the power to shake the building to the ground, or the beautiful music that was in all probability penned by a celebrated but long-dead composer.

The power, my friends, lies it the context in which the music is played. Sacred music is not a performance but an offering, and one that only makes sense—and has any real impact—when given in full deference to the liturgical celebration. As noted by French twentieth-century organist, composer, and sacred musician Olivier Messiaen in the opening quotation, music captivates the soul and elevates it beyond where even words can go.

Music is the universal language, formed before speech and shared by all of God's creatures. The fowl of the air, the fish of the sea, the beasts of the field—all of these communicate with song of some kind or another. For humans, singing is prehistoric and certainly predates our ability to speak to one another. There is no culture on earth, no matter how remote, that does not incorporate song into its daily life. In

recent decades, numerous scientific studies have documented the extraordinarily positive effects that music—and particularly singing—can have on our sense of community and particularly on our mental health.

Jesus' experience of worship at the temple and at home would have been marked by singing, as recounted by the prophetic texts and particularly the Psalms of David. Saint Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, famously encourages believers to "sing psalms and

hymns and spiritual songs with thankfulness in your hearts to God."

It makes sense, then, that music was integral to early Christian worship. It lends at once a sense of beauty, joy, and solemnity, immediately reminding us that we are in a special juncture in time and space. The spoken word is elevated both literally - in that it becomes louder and more intelligible- and also figuratively, when it appears more remarkable and therefore more noteworthy to the listener. We only have to think of certain parts of the Mass to realize how music plays an inseparable role: the Gloria in excelsis (Glory to God in the highest), Sanctus (Holy, holy, holy), the Psalms, and the Great Thanksgiving ("The Lord be with you") are all marked out from the other liturgical texts by their being sung.

The best sacred music draws us together, whether as listeners or participants, towards the divine praise of almighty God, and the Episcopal Church proudly boasts an extraordinarily rich and varied treasury. I look forward to exploring music for Advent and Christmas in the next installment.



Last Sunday Offering Saint Mary's Monthly MISSION FOCUS



St. Elizabeth's Jubilee Center is sponsored by eight Episcopal churches in the greater Portland area. We partner with local schools, other faith communities, and local businesses and community groups to serve the people of Portland.

St. Elizabeth's is a low-barrier pantry serving non-food essentials to all those in need, including new Mainers and Mainers whose families have been here for generations.

A Jubilee Ministry is a ministry of joint discipleship in Christ with poor and oppressed people, wherever they are found, to meet basic human needs and to build a just society.

Every Tuesday at no charge, we provide basic, daily essentials to those living in need that cannot be purchased with SNAP funds.

On the *1st Tuesdays of each month*, we distribute **infant diapers** through our collaboration with the <u>Jewish Community Alliance of Southern Maine's diaper bank</u>.

On the 2nd Tuesday, we distribute bed and table linens.

On the 3rd Tuesday, we distribute kitchenwares. (Saint Mary's week!)

On the 4th Tuesday. we distribute oral health care products.

St. E's connects people with resources in the community for housing, furniture, language acquisition, job search assistance, and other social needs. On average we serve nearly 285 individuals each week. St. Elizabeth's derives its name from St. Elizabeth of Hungary (1207-1231 A.D.) who committed her life to serving the poor and the sick. The Center began its ministry in 2001 and was housed in several different locations before finding a home at St. Luke's Cathedral in 2007.

Falmouth Food Pantry

The Falmouth Food Pantry serves close to 200 families a month and needs donations from individuals. Our donation box is in the middle closet of the Parish House and in the Narthex. Helpful foods are soup in cans (but not cream soups), boxes of pasta, cold cereal,

To date St. E's has been able to distribute 143 coats!

We are looking for:

- Men's and Women's coats that are clean and in good condition;
- ♦ ADULT sizes (all sizes welcome, but especially large and extra-large);
- winter-weight socks (not light-weight dress socks) could be cotton, wool, or other material, preferably black/navy/dark gray in addition to white; could be hand-knit or other; boot length as well as shoe sized;
- ♦ ADULT sized, warm winter Gloves: leather or fabric;
- warm blankets and quilts that are clean and in good condition; identify size;
- ♦ KNITTERS ALERT: we would love to share any winter gloves, mittens, scarves, socks, and hats you might have available to share.

Of course, contributions of kitchen wares (pots, pans, plates, cups, etc.) and house wares (matching sets of sheets, blankets, towels, etc.) will continue to be received to supplement the weekly distribution of toilet paper, laundry soap, bath soap, and feminine hygiene products. These items can come from house or camp cleaning, unsold items from yard sales or estate sales, down-sizing, clearing out to move to a new home, etc.





In September the children learned the Bible is like a library...a collection of books including history, prophecy, and poems. The Old Testament is the story of God's Chosen People (the Jews). We learned the Bible also teaches us lessons about what is right and what is wrong. There are many examples of good behavior to follow and bad behavior to avoid. We learned the New Testament teaches us about Jesus and to spread the Gospel (the Good News).

In October we talked about Creation, and how human beings are created in God's image. I asked the children, "Does this mean (physically) we look like God?" Their immediate answer was "no." The children understood the image of God means His essential nature. And because human beings are created in God's image, every person deserves to be treated with compassion, dignity, and respect.

In November we will be teaching about God's Covenant with Noah. In December we will cover the Christmas story through the eyes of Matthew & Luke. I have a map of the Holy Land that identifies the places where Jesus, the most famous Jew in the world, taught his followers about light in a dark world. He was referred to as "Rabbi," which means "teacher." The children enjoy locating the holy places where Jesus walked, talked, fed the hungry, healed the sick, and performed miracles.

In 2016, I had the privilege of visiting the Holy Land. We toured sites holy to Jews, Christians, and Muslims. The Israeli government protects these sites so they can be visited by people of all faiths from around the world. (Israel hosts about 3 million pilgrims and tourists every year.) We had an Israeli guide for most of the trip, but also a Palestinian was our guide in Bethlehem. In addition to the city of Jerusalem (the old city is divided into four quarters: Jewish, Christian, Muslim and Armenian), we visited cities that are predominately Jewish (Tel Aviv) and primarily Arab (Nazareth). We traveled through the West Bank (Judea & Samaria), south to the Dead Sea and north to the Galilee, and we walked where Jesus walked.

Unfortunately, this fragile status-quo erupted in violence on Saturday, October 7. Horrific acts of torture, rape, murder, and mutilation were carried out against our Jewish brothers and sisters by Hamas terrorists. To quote Thomas Brown, Bishop of Maine, "We condemn Hamas's heinous attack against Israel and innocent civilians. We pray for an end to this senseless and inhumane violence. We pray for leaders throughout the world to work

together so there is peace between Israel and Palestine." I would only add that while we pray for peace, we cannot be silent in the face of evil.

God has given us free will, so every person has the capacity to do good or to do evil. But how can we recognize evil? A fundamental Christian principle, often called the golden rule, is to treat others the way we want to be treated. Does this mean simply avoiding what is evil? Or does it mean striving for the presence of good...to love one another as Christ loved us?

Vestry Highlights from the Wardens


The Vestry met on Wednesday, October 20, 2023. Father Nathan began the meeting with a teaching moment focusing on Saint Luke. Luke was not one of the original apostles. He was a physician and often depicted with an ox and is the patron saint of physicians and healers. The ox represents the burden carried by medical people to save us from diseases and injuries.

Building and Grounds:

Thornton Tomasetti, a consulting engineering firm, has begun the work to map the issues with the tower masonry. It will take some time to complete the mapping. Knowles Industrial Services Corp is slated to do the work needed.

The B & G team has selected a new plow company that will result in a savings for us of over \$4000 from the previous contract.

We are having a Campus Clean-Up Day on 11/12. We can all attend church in our work clothes. The project list includes both indoor and outdoor activities, and of course, good food will be a reward for all the hard work! We thanked the B/G team for their devotion to keeping our buildings and grounds in excellent shape.

Financial Review

Peter Guyton, treasurer, reported that our projected budget surplus is dwindling, but we hope to end the year on budget.

We are moving short-term funds out of Bank of America to an interest-bearing account at Harpswell that will allow funds not needed immediately to earn interest. We have quick access to the funds when they are needed but the interest rate will provide extra income.

Peter also presented a preliminary budget for 2024. As with past budget presentations, the Vestry understood that most of our budget is made up of fixed costs like utilities, salaries, insurance etc. We also have seen a trend of parishioners offering generous support but not pledging, meaning that the Vestry doesn't know what our biggest revenue line will generate. To avoid a deficit, we either add more revenue or cut expenses, which are largely fixed. The goal is to have a final budget for vote at the Vestry's December meeting. We thanked Peter for all his work on our financial matters.

The Nominating Committee will stop taking nominations at the end of October and will begin reviews in November.

Stewardship

Janet Bowne reported that Stewardship packets have gone out to the parish. Our pledge goal is \$300,000. We will have messaging throughout November and December. We have such a generous parish, but people, especially younger members, often don't pledge. They prefer to give as they feel called to do so. As a result we don't have a

good picture of what to expect from giving, which hampers our ability to plan financially. We will need to raise money for the various projects related to capital work on the tower and rectory. The campaign will be tied to the 135th anniversary of the church. We are working on names and potential donors. We are also seeking grants, but many of the most lucrative grants are federally based and require a designation of historic significance which can severely restrict our ability to do repairs that are sustainable.

ByLaw Change

We approved a bylaw change that changes the language of our auditing. Rather than electing an auditor, we have changed the language to appointing an auditor annually.

Rector's Report
Nathan and Pat Peard will follow up with the town of Falmouth to clarify the steps with the town so work with the state can begin regarding a future day care.
Common Ground discussion/dinners started before the pandemic but were put on hold. Nathan would like to re-

start these in February 2024. Thank you to all of the vestry for sharing the guidance and vision for Saint Mary's!

Due to the tragic events in Lewiston, the Community Supper put on by the faith communities of Falmouth was cancelled for 2023. The importance of community was not totally lost, however, in that leading up to the event, 188 people had volunteered to work together and provide and/or cook turkeys and squash and apple crisp, wait on tables, roll out the rolls, dish out the dessert, and clean up the kitchen, among other jobs.

In addition, many families fostered community by inviting neighbors over to eat together and share hope. In several cases the families had not even met their neighbors! 

Advent Quiet Morning: SAT 16 December Getting Directions to the Kingdom of Heaven




